HIGH ACADEMY OFFICIAL CALLS FOR ADMISSION OF FEMALE CADETS

ATTACKS PRESENT SYSTEM OF EXCLU-SION AS CHAUVENISTIC

Poll of Cadets Shows Their Support AOC'S Strongly Back Him

One of our highest ranking Academy officers called in your editor for an exclusive interview yesterday morning. "Chaplain," he said, "I'm tired of this pussyfooting around. I want you to feel free to quote everything I say to you this morning. I'm not afraid to say it and be quoted. I just don't want you to use my name."

"What's your message, sir?" I said, rubbing my hands together in anticipatory eagerness.

"Women cadets should be admitted to the Academy without further delay. Heck! The Air Force has been the leader in recognizing that women have a vital role to play in carrying out its mission. We had the first female general. We were the first to admit them to ROTC. Our Academy was the first to have a female faculty member. Our branch of service was the first to have a pregnant officer. We can't turn our backs on all that!"

Major P---, one of the AOC's with a long history of combat experience, and himself a graduate of the Academy, said that "these proposals are long overdue. Women can no longer be considered second class citizens. They have the same education, the same experiences, and, today, the same dress as men. Uni-sex is in, hetero-sex is out! They'll be welcome additions to the AF Academy scene." When asked if their admission would make any difference in the way he operated as an AOC, Major P--- replied, "Not in the least. The day they're admitted l'll resign!"

A poll of cadets taken at the Cadet Barber Shop showed them in favor of the recommended new admissions policy by a majority of four to one. Barely able to speak, because of the emotions bubbling up within him, one cadet said, "I haven't seen a real American woman since my mother came here for Parent's Weekend. If girls are admitted here, maybe I'll even lose my tics!" His comrades nodded solemnly in agreement.

Ms. E. Taylor, leading exponant of woman's lib, said, "I could kiss that man, whoever he is, only my male chauvinist husband would kill me."

Chaplain Robert Browning said, "As a graduate of the Academy, I feel that training should be provided at the Academy for all career fields in the Air Force. There's a Woman's AF, so women should be trained here."

PROTESTANT BACCALAUREATE SPEAKER

Born in Kalamazoo, Michigan in 1931, of Syrian-English heritage, Tom Haggai spent his early formative years in Pennsylvania. At the age of nine, his family moved to Boston. It was in Boston that Tom Haggai, age 12, preached his first sermon. Heading south, Dr. Haggai graduated from North Greenville Junior College where he lettered in athletics. He completed his studies at Furman University with majors in political science and history. In 1963, a group of 120 business and professional leaders from a broad spectrum of American commerce formed Tom Haggai and Associates Foundation. This non-profit foundation's purpose was to further Dr. Haggai's basic message of "patriotism through religion." He is equally well-known for his five-minute, six-day-a-week radio show, "Values for Living" that broadcast over 100 stations from Maine to Montana. Dr. Haggai speaks to more than 300 groups a year. Methodist High Point College set precedent when they honored Tom Haggai with a Doctorate of Divinity. In June 1966 he received a Doctor of Humanics degree from Salem College, Salem West Virginia. His civic involvements include Board of Trustees of the American Humanics Foundation; and member-at-large of the National Boy Scouts of America Council, Board of Region VI, BSA. In Atlanta, Georgia, on May 28, 1971, Dr. Haggai was recipient of the Silver Buffalo Award, both nationally and internationally, the highest honor bestowed upon an individual by the Boy Scouts of Amer-

JEWISH BACCALAUREATE SPEAKER

Chaplain Kalman L. Levitan has been on active duty with the U.S. Air Force for twenty-two years. He is presently assigned as Command Chaplain, Headquarters Command, Bolling Air Force Base, D.C. During his distinguished career in the chaplaincy, he received the "Chaplain of the Year" award for work in the field of inter-group relations. He has served tours of duty in Alaska, Greenland, Newfoundland, the Far East, Europe and the Continental United States. He served for two years as a member of the Armed Forces Chaplains Board and Consultant on Jewish Affairs, and is a member of the Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy of the National Jewish Welfare Board.

Rabbi Levitan was born in New Jersey, March 4, 1917. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree at Yeshiva University in New York, his Master of Hebrew Letters degree and Ordination as Rabbi at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, seminary for Reform Rabbis. His graduate studies include work in law at Harvard University and group work and community organization at Columbia University. He has been in the active rabbinate for twenty-six years. His wife, Dora Lewis is from Greensboro, North Carolina. The Levitans have two sons, David 19, and Daniel 18 years old.

CATHOLIC BACCALAUREATE SPEAKER

The Reverend Henry J. McAnulty was elected the ninth President of Duquesne University on October 8, Born in Pittsburg, the son of William J. and Catherine (Calpin) McAnulty, he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from Duquesne University in 1936. That same year he joined the congregation of the Holy Ghost, receiving the Bachelor of Theology degree from St. Mary's Seminary, Ferndale, Norwalk, Connecticut. Father McAnulty was ordained to the Roman Catholic priesthood in 1940. From 1941 to 1944, Father McAnulty served as National Secretary of the Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood. He was commissioned a First Lieutenant, Chaplain, USAF in 1944, and began a tour of duty which sent him to Germany, Japan, and various bases throughout the United States. In 1956 he was appointed Deputy Director and Instructor at the Air Force School for Chaplains, and two years later was transferred to the Air University at Maxwell Field, Alabama. Father McAnulty advanced through grades to Lieutenant Colonel, USAF in 1958, and was separated from the regular Air Force in September of that year to become Assistant to the President at Duquesne University. This position he held until his appointment as Acting President in June, 1959. He held the rank of Colonel, Air Force Reserve, from 1964 until 1968 when he was promoted to Brigadier General. Duquesne University's President serves on the Boards of: Pittsburgh Regional Industrial Development Corporation, Pittsburg Symphony, National Conference of Christians and Jews, and United Fund. Honorary degrees awarded to Father McAnulty include an LL.D from Loyola University, Los Angeles, 1958; D.Ed. from St. Vincent College, Latrobe, Pennsylvania, 1961; and an L.H.D. from the University of Pittsburgh,

"RIGHT!" he shouted. "The next time you run his picture call it 'Antique of the Month!"




