

### A YEAR LATER...

It was just a year ago that mandatory Chapel ended. It was for cadets and Chaplains alike an unlamented demise. The situation had been artificial at best and the sound of weeping and wailing was not heard in the land.

There were, of course, dire prophesies of empty chapels and unemployed chaplains. For a while it seemed that these might in part come true. Attendance dropped sharply thru March. Then, however, it began to climb again and is now at a very encouraging level. In addition to this, attendance in our non-worship events, i.e., discussion groups, retreats, etc, has been better than before.

Most important, however, is the change in the climate of worship. Everyone is there because he wants to be. No one is doing his homework or sitting stonily in the back pew. There has been a warmth and a joy that was not always present before. This is, perhaps, our greatest sin-

gle gain.

It may also be appropriate to comment on what has not changed. The ruling forbid compulsory participation in worship. Implied within this, we feel, is a restriction on undue pressure to make someone "volunteer" to come. However, there is no restriction (nor should there be) in training about religion. It is a large fact of life and as Air Force officers we all are, or will be, confronted by it. Therefore, we will continue to use opportunities during normal training and academic sessions to present programs about religion. Each cadet needs to know the significance of the religious beliefs of others, even if he doesn't share them.

For example, what do you do with a Christian Scientist who refuses to go to a doctor when you, as his commander, feel that he should? What do you do with a Seventh Day Adventist who refuses to participate in a Saturday formation? What do you do when an Orthodox Jew says he will need special food in the Dining Hall? What do you do when a group wants to start Bible Study and Prayer groups in the barracks? All these are questions commanders face. We will continue to confront you with programs about religion that you may be better prepared as an officer.

However, we will also continue to respect your freedom to participate in whatever way you choose -- even if that means no participation at all. In this spirit we invite you to taste and see that the Lord is Good. Try it, you'll like it!! JWC




