#### ARDC PLANS REORGANIZATION

The Air Research and Development Command will be undergoing far-reaching changes in the near future, according to a recent release by Lt/Gen. Bernard A. Schriever, Commander of ARDC. The command will be reorganized into four separate divisions, headed by ARDC deputy commanders.

The Directorate of Systems Management and major elements of the WADC Will be combined to form a Wright Air Development Division, responsible for aeronautical and related systems programs.

An AF Command and Control Devilopment Division will be established at Bedford, Mass., to take over the present AF Cambridge Research Center. It. will direct communications and electronic control systems.

An AF Research Division will be set up in about six months in the Washington area to manage the research program.

#### CARGO HAUL TO SOUTH POLE BY C-130

A Tactical Air Command Troop Carrier unit from Sewart AFB, Tenn., will help provide airlift of general cargo to the Navy's Operation Deep Freeze in the Antartic next year.

Seven C-130's will be equipped with special ferry and pylon tanks to enable them to fly cargo from McMurdo Sound to scientific South Pole Stations about 800 miles away. The skiequipped C-130s will journey to Christ Church, New Zealand, the staging base, before heading for their Antartica base for the chilly operation.

#### NAME CHANGE

The mission is the same, but the Air Technical Intelligence Center was remamed the Aerospace TIC last month. In line with the recent renaming of many unit to modern configuration, ATIC is located at Wright-Patterson.

#### 9TH SQUADRON SPONSOR SETS RECORD

The 9th Bomb Wing, Mountain Home AFB, Idaho, the sponsor of the 9th Cadet Squadron, AFCW, recently set a SAC record.

A B-47 chalked up its 1,000th consecutive flight, accomplishing all mission requirements, in what SAC believes to be a record. In racking up the four-figure, crews piled up more than 6,400 hours of flying time.

#### CONSTRUCTION OF BONG AFB CANCELLED

The AF recently announced the cancellation of construction of Richard I. Bong AFB, Wisconsin, It explained that the B-58 mission planned for the base can be handled at other bases which will become abailable as the result of certain B-47 units being phased out.

#### SCHOOL OF AVIATION MEDICINE HEAD NAMED

Colonel Robert H. Blount, veteran AF flight surgeon from Mart, Texas, has been named Commandant of the USAF School of Aviation Medicine, Brooks AFB, Texas.

#### NAVY HAS NEW ANTISUB HELICOPTER

The Uss Hazelwood has received the new DSN-1 drone helicopter and homing torpedo and is currently undergoing trials off Newport, R.I. Attached to the Atlantic Fleet, the DD-831 has a greated kill capability at greater ranges than does the conventional destroyers without the DSN-1 copter.


#### TO CONQUER SPACE

This is the second in a series of articles featuring cadet evaluation of enrichment courses. No effort is made to discourage cadets from taking particular courses, but if it is listed as being especially difficult, chances are that a talk with your faculty advisor might be in order.

Aero 451. Fluid Mechanics. Unfortunately the Aero Department feets that evaluation is the most significant aspect of their special course program. Therefore their courses are difficult, and many times unrewarding. This one and Aero 453 are the most illustrative examples. There is, however, sufficient information to warrant taking the course if you have sufficient interest and ability.

Aero 452. Airfoil Theory. The best of the Aero courses. The writs are fair; and the material is by far the most interesting.

Aero.453. Gas Dynamics. A real son of a gun. Not recommended unless aero is definitely your field.

English 207. Modern Drama

A course not offered this semester, modern drama was tought by Colonel Moody, the Professor of English, and was one of the finest courses from the standpoint of pure enjoyment and education offered at the Academy. It did include a play or two in Denver when originally instituted, but recent developments inticate that this will not be the case in the future. It did emphasize a great deal of testing, but made up for this inconvenience, thru Colonel Moody's comments.

English 455 Great Books
Major Carpenter is an expert in this
field and teaches both semesters. The
works include writers from Boccaccio
to Joyce and class discussion often
domes to the conclusion that great
writers are just as great as their
readers. Again a fine course for an

English 205 Creative Writing
Not offered this semester, the course
was originated by Major Richter, who
spiced the course with a study of
Joyce and critical self-evaluation of
techniques and content. Short essays,
poetry, short stories and descriptive
essays were included and the course is
valuable for any would-be writers.

English 353 Shakespeare

A well-taught, expertly-prepared course instructed by Lt. Col. Thompson who is as good as he is enthusistic. It is a flexible course, spiced with stories of Generals Vandenberg and Arnold and theirrelation to the plays studied. Well-worth the effort for its enjoyment as well as education. Films and records highlight the plays.

English 351 Speech
Although it hasn't been taught this semester, this course is one of the most valuable of the enrichment program, especially for future officers. Speeches composed of nothing but counting to 20, extemporaneous speech, and various types of talks, highlight this humorous and enlightening course, designed to build confidence and to give experience.

English 451 Fine Arts

A two-semester course that may be taken in one or two segments, according to the whims of the cadets. It is valuable primarily to those interested in a major in English, but is an excellent course for those who wish to round out their education. Excercises in sculpture, painting and critical evaluation enhance the cadet's appreciation for and knowledge of the fine arts. The course includes a fine lab.

Englishmajor as it does include a great deal of reading.


