
- 1) SALLY B'S SWEET SHOP is an excellent choice for a post game snack.

- 11) Good food and the best in atmosphere combine in making LA TUNI-SIA an ever popular stop. 75bestalive.org





"America's Greatest Fair" the State Fair will open on Saturday, 6 Oct. and this year will be presented as a spectacular "Exposition of Nations" featuring exhibits from many foreign nations. Among the many outstanding attractions this year are several free exhibits such as an experimental Space Kitchen, the 46th Annual Southwestern Auto Show, "This Atomic World" prepared at the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies, "Playtime USA" featuring exhibits for the sportsman, an antique auto show, museums of art and natural history and of course many displays of the agriculture and livestock of Texas.



The Falcon Soccer team coasted to a 4 - 0 win in their first league game with Colorado Mines in a Shrine benefit played in Pueblo. Led by Hank Hoffman's three goals and Jim Renschen's penalty kick, our soccer players attributed the win to team play and superior conditioning, two points very much stressed by coach, Capt. Bob Strickland. Mines' weak offense enabled Coach Strickland to empty the bench, providing experience which will be essential against some of the stronger teams in the Rocky Mountain area.
