





Jim Renschen led the scoring with three goals, while Al Ross, Jim McComsey, Bill Hoilman and Jim Perry each chipped in one. Bill Hoilman, Jim Renschen, Al Ross and Don Heide played a particularly outstanding game according to Coach Bob Strickland. This week's game with Wyoming promises to be one of the season's toughest challenges as the Cowboys and CU were picked with the Falcons to be the three best teams in the Rocky Mountain area. With last week's 4-2 victory over CU, Wyoming became "the team to beat" and almost a must game in the race for the NCAA championship of this area.

The cross country team suffered its first defeat of the season by a score of 24-34 in a dual meet with West Point Saturday. Running on a wet and hilly five-mile course, Tom Cardoza and Dave Brown were the top performers for the Falcons, placing 2nd and 3rd respectively. As fate sometimes dictates in cross country running, the team as a whole had a poor day and they are expecting to reverse the outcome in their next meeting with WooPoo in November's NCAA Finals.
