





Pep Rally Ops Plan

To: The World

- 1. Purpose: to provide some degree of organization and to integrate the military training system into the spontaneous display of Wing Spirit known as the Pep Rally.
- 2. Attendance: same as for Chapel.
- 3. Report: Form 27 will be submitted by each element sergeant to Security Flight not later than 5 minutes after release from quarters the following morning.
- 4. Schedule: Pep rallies will be held on each Wednesday night prior to a home game and on each Thursday night prior to an away game. If no game is scheduled, a practice Pep Rally will be held on Friday night. First call will be at 2215 and contact time will be at 2225. All activities will cease promptly at 2244:30 so that each cadet will have a reasonable amount of time to return to his room by 2245 taps (Note: no extensions of taps will be granted).
- 5. Marching: Squadrons will form up in their squadron areas facing South. Wing Sgt. Major will command.
- 6. Uniform: the uniform for the first group will be bathrobes w/shower clogs, towel, and soap. CG 2 will wear Parkas and skivies w/rain cap covers (no footgear is authorized). CG 3 will wear old khaki trou and shirts w/no buttons--combat boots will be worn. CG 4 will wear pajamas and carry blankets. CG 5 will wear Service Alpha and carry computer decks (Note: any uniform discrepancies resulting in indecent exposure will be reported to the Ethics Committee).

7. Each AOC is encouraged to attend and supervise his squadron.
