
# THE BRIE

It's always heartwarming to know that people care and the guys were really glad to see all those AOC's out there for drill the past few weeks (one/squadron).





# - Miller Central Central I

High atop a ridge line overlooking a local metropolitan cow town stands that citadel of learning, the pinnacle of American manhood, the last outpost of truth, Justice, and the American Way--the Cheyenne Mountain Zoo. A few miles north on 85-87(also known as "Bonneville Fast") is the First Class Parking Lot and its administrative facilities (also known as USAFA). Peculiar to this institution is a bi-annual display of feats of physical prowess unmatched in the civilized world, called by natives the PFT. Here's how you, too, may join the select native fraternity, known as the "hoo".

First of all, to excel pass the PFT you must prepare your body for combat. This requires approximately two months of rigorous training to accomplish; this is why all Cadets are given at least a four-day notice before they take the PFT. So let us follow this select example of American manhood

through his preparation for initiation rites into the "400".

First in the deeply symbolic PFT is the "pull up". Designed to show man's constant attempts to rise through the ranks, the pullup must be executed at least seven times.

This shows the Cadet that he must never give up; he must continue to try even though his first efforts are not always successful.

Next comes the broad jump.

(contrary to popular belief, the broad jump was not so named for its utilitarian value in apprehending unsuspecting females along Colfax avenue.) 

The situp is designed to demonstrate to the Cadet how he must rise above the level of the mundame and lift his head to see beyond new horizons. Once again, the exercise is performed repeatedly to emphasize that one must never be content with one set of horizons. (This is in conjunction with USAFA's "man-whole" concept, which is illustrated at left by C/1C Arvid J. Garfgrass, who performs all five PFT rituals at one time.)

The final agony of the PFT is the 600-yard run. Symbolizing the life cycle, the run teaches the Cadet that he must never give up but must press on to the finish line, whose red stripe symbolizes death in the true military sense. At right we see C/2C Harvey M. Trackburner practicing for his chance at the PFT. The restraining line held by C/1C Striver symbolizes the restrictions of those on top over those who are trying to reach the top. It also gives a fairly accurate "feel' of the frictional force resulting from the contact of the gluteus maximus with the floor, a not unusual phenomenon in the PFT, due to extreme exhaustion from the four previous phases.






