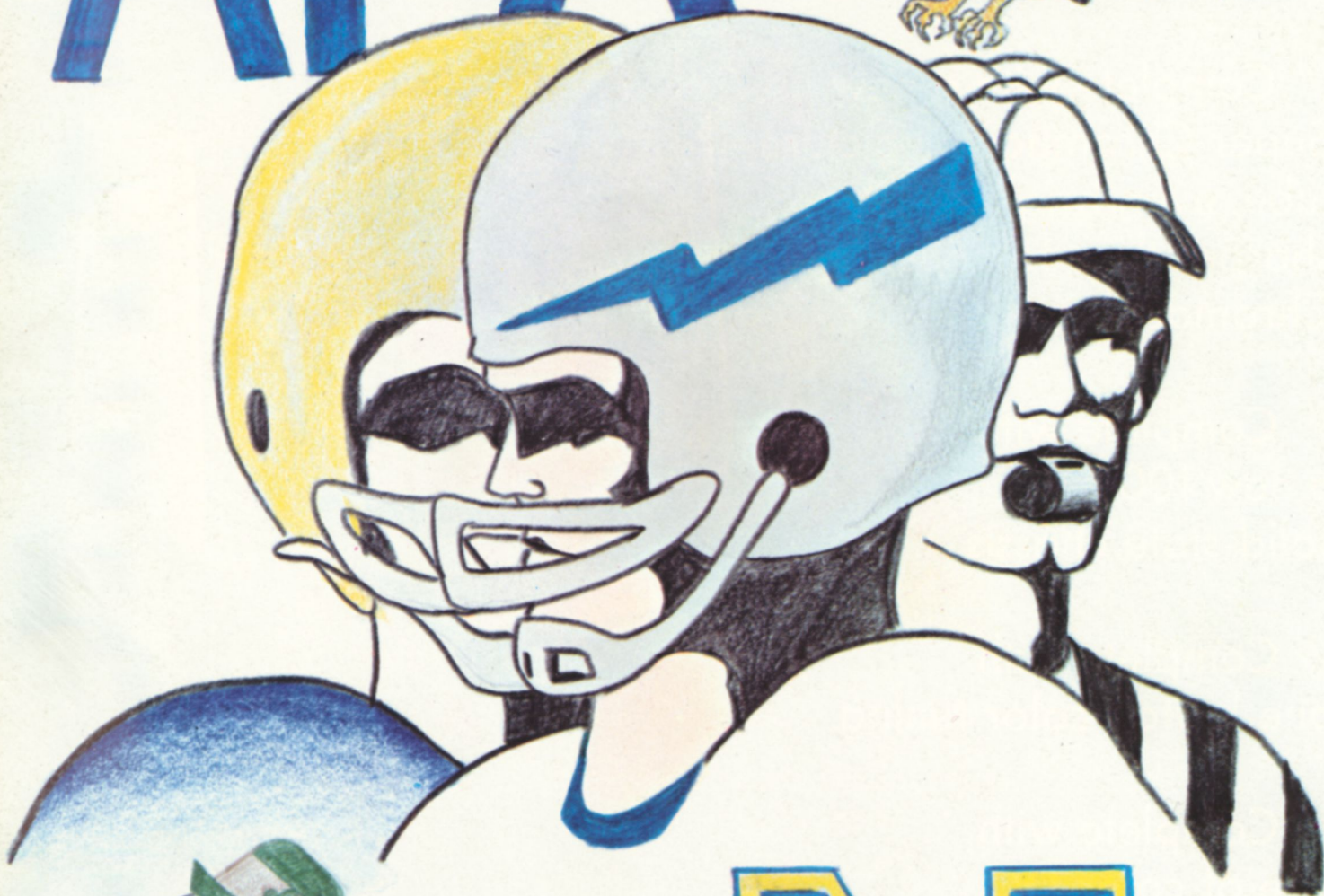

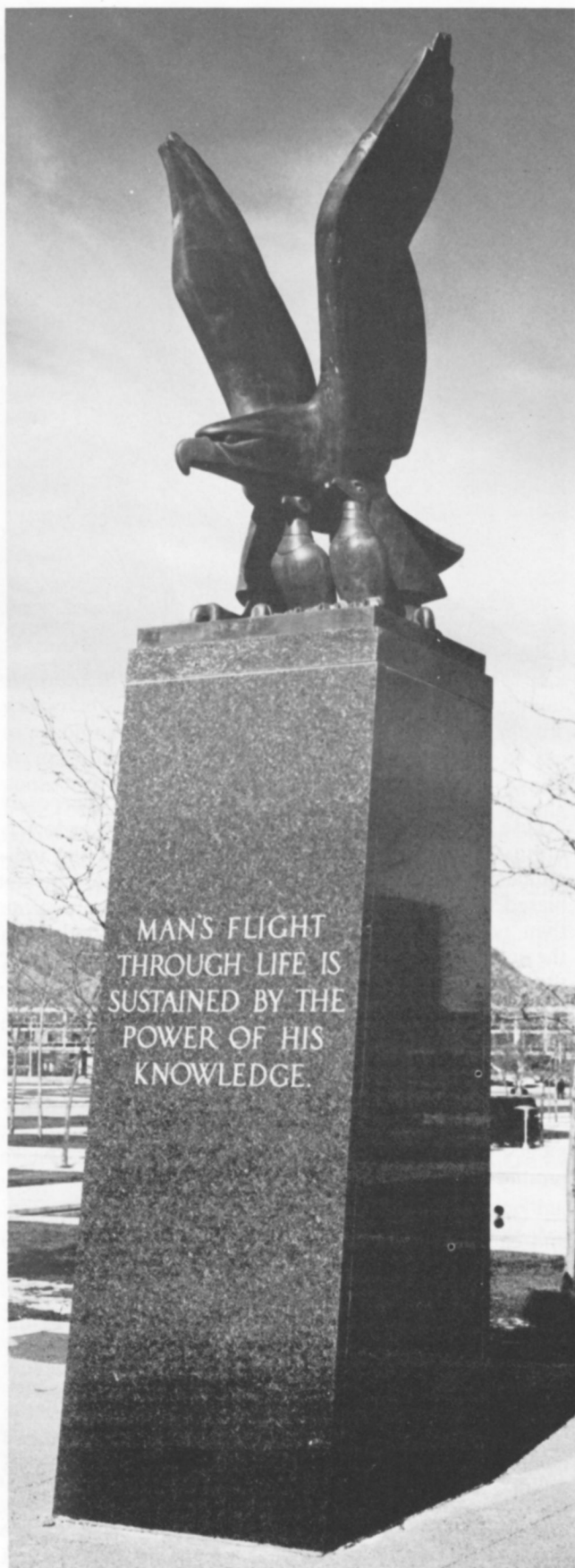

COACH DICK SMITH TALKS

Rhythm, grace, poise and beauty. Such words are generally reserved for the lips of ballet instructors. However, there are always exceptions and Dick Smith, diving coach at the Air Force Academy, is one.

When the coach says something about swimming, and particularly his first love, diving, there is a tone of authority with which there is very little question. The immediate evidence of that knowledge and authority is represented by the fact that Smith coached the U.S. Women's diving team for the Olympics held in Tokyo in 1964 and the U.S. Men's diving team for the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico. When he talks about rhythm, grace, poise and beauty, Smith is describing a body portrait; a split second picture painted in mid-air.

Coach Smith is rated as one of the best in his field in the United States and perhaps in the world. His brown eyes, salt and pepper hair and small frame conceal the almost angry drive he displays when he talks about such things as discipline, attitude and courage among divers. Smith says, "if you don't have those qualities, you can't get to the top."

One of the issues that probably gets Dick Smith fired up more quickly than any other is the subject of judging, and the criticism voiced about it, during the recent Olympic Games in Munich. The coach measures his words, but when they come forth there is no missing his point.

Smith went to Munich to attend the international meeting of the World Diving Coaches Association of which he is vice president and as chairman of the International Age Group Diving Committee. The objectives of both groups are to establish guide lines for divers, judges and all others who take part in the competition.

"In my opinion," Smith says, "there is not as much conscious bias in judging as people think."

"Conscious bias is that which comes about when a judge or an official intentionally rates his favorite competitor higher or lowers the scores of the other divers who are in competition with his favorite. Unconscious bias, on the other hand, is when a coach as a judge, rates his diver higher or lower because the diver has performed a dive which is better or worse than the coach expects.

The coach says "the main reason there has been so much said about the judging of the divers in Munich is that more people saw the games than ever before. The problems, he says, were the same in the past but they were not brought home through the excellent coverage via satellite or direct television.

"There is the same bias found in some non-coaching judges who, for whatever reason, will bend over backwards not to show favoritism. The unfortunate fact of the matter is that the judge may in no way be aware that his bias exists.

"It is a very serious matter for anyone to purposely accuse a judge of cheating by willfully raising or lowering a competitor's score. Who is to say that the individuals making an issue of the judges' position are not biased? "This," Smith says, "is probably more often than not the case since the person finding fault with the judge is more concerned with the final outcome of the competition than is the judge."

"Since the judges at Munich were supposed to be the very best from each country represented, it seems fair to assume they were concentrating on the individual dive when it was made. Their findings should therefore be more than just a passing observation. After all, judges make their decision based on training, background and experience."

One of the elements which Smith feels is disturbing and causes a judge to make errors is a lack of concentration. "Sometimes judges carry on conversations about the event they are judging or they may be talking about personnel issues and not paying attention to the event; or they have the pressure of audience, peer groups and national feelings."

Coach Smith says "judges should be placed in sound proof booths or at least some sort of partitioned enclosure which would bring about more rigid attention to what is going on."

The coach also feels the diving jury should pay closer attention to the actions of the judges. Should

the jury feel a judge has displayed incompetency in his judging the judge in question should be confronted with the problem and be given a choice of establishing his worth as a judge or not judging.

Smith says "one way to make the decision is for the judge in question to score a dive with a judge who has not been questioned. Both men would judge a series of dives before a committee of judges agreed to by the judges being tested. If there is a discrepancy, the judge involved would be asked to explain his scoring. Should the explanation be not satisfactory to the panel a video tape playback of the dive is used so that the judge can explain his score.

"None of this should be done in the presence of the other judge, who would then be asked to follow the same procedure to establish his difference in scoring.

Smith also says "video tapes should be made from directly behind the judge, in order to display the aspect of the dive, so the judges can see the dive repeated on tape, I know it works because I've tried it!"

Dick Smith is a man who calls 'em as he sees 'em. Should you still have some question about that, here is what he says concerning diving/swimming facilities at Munich, "the best in the world." The diving pool was great; it could be changed in a matter of minutes to accommodate water polo, swimming or other aquatic events; Smith said. "The steps across the end of the pool were nice, but were one of the extras that could have been eliminated. The steps caused the spring board stands to be cantilevered too much. The dark blue tile in the pool was outstanding since it helped the divers judge the water level and depth," he said. Numerous aerators in the bottom of the pool caused bubbling in the water so the divers could judge the distance to the surface of the water." Dick Smith says "the same basic facilities should be available for all Olympic competition, but without the frills. Each country should not try to outdo the others as has been the case in the past."

Since he had the opportunity to make some comments about the Olympic facilities it seemed logical to ask Smith to evaluate the Academy pool. "Here," he says, "are probably the best pool facilities in the United States. The multi level access has teaching and coaching potential built in. The acoustics and equipment are outstanding and the depth of the water in the pool is perfect." "An additional advantage at the Academy," Smith says, "is that, the diving pool facilities can be kept separate from the swimming area by virtue of movable bulkheads."

Smith says "facilities are as important in the development of a top flight diver as coaching and the factors which set one champion diver apart from the others; dedication and a winning attitude. Those traits come when the ability of the diver is combined with his desire to become the greatest athlete the world has ever seen."

Two divers cited as examples are Air Force Captain Micki King, women's gold medal winner and Dick Ritz, men's silver medal winner. "Both," he says, "are the very best and they displayed to the world the courage and stamina which is necessary to make them the champions they are. They gave everything."

What about the next Olympics? Dick Smith says, "the divers, from all nations should be outstanding at the next games. The coaching, training and judging will be back on a level where they should be." The U.S. has learned, as have the other nations, we cannot live on past performances and enter the competition with the feeling we are invincible. We are not, and it caught up with us."

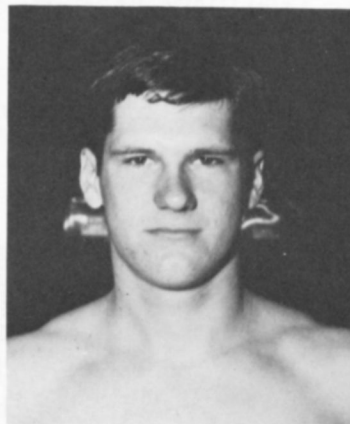
Smith says, "in most instances the divers got what they deserved from the judges."

Does the Academy have any likely prospects for a gold medal in diving? "Yes sir!," says Smith, "there are two outstanding performers, Richard McAlister, a sophomore who displays great promise from the one and three meter boards and, Air Force Lieutenant Phil Boggs, one of the greatest spring board artists this country and perhaps the world will ever see."

Smith concluded the interview by saying, "it's my most earnest desire to see a standard guide for divers and judges. A standard which will cover local, national and international competition. More and more top coaches are refusing to subject themselves to unnecessary harassment by simply refusing to judge under any circumstances." "This," Smith says, "is already resulting in hard feelings and difficulty in finding competent judges for all national events. Think of that next time you find fault with a judge."

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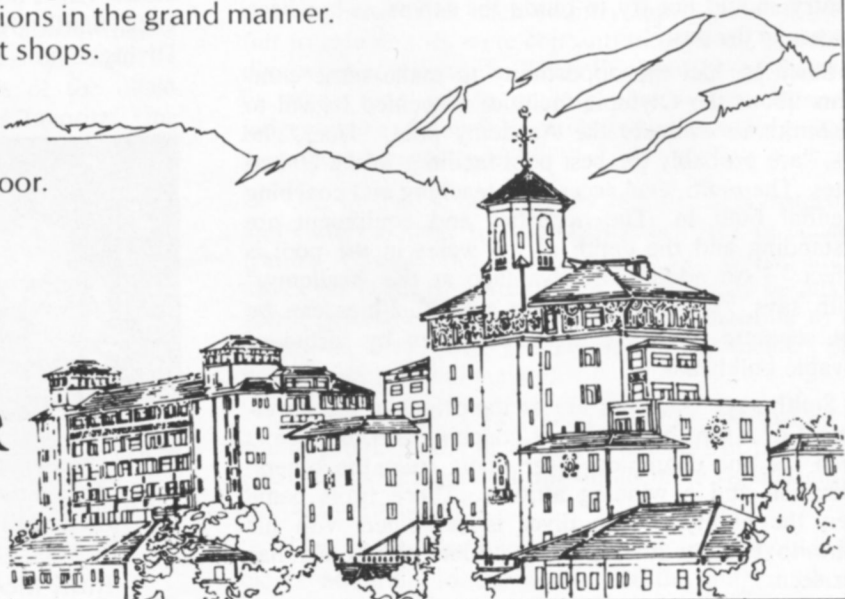

Today's Game | AIR FORCE vs. NOTRE DAME

Today is Homecoming at the Air Force Academy and a special welcome goes out to all those alums returning for today's game.

Today's opponent needs little introduction to any football fan. Notre Dame is well established in college football lore and although the Fighting Irish will be playing in Colorado for only the first time in eight years there are few in the stands who are not aware of Notre Dame and its brilliant football history.

Through the years the Fighting Irish have perennially been among the nation's best so it is only fitting that the Irish come into today's game sporting a high national ranking and a 6-1 record.

Although the Air Force-Notre Dame series is relatively young it has all the earmarks of being an excellent one. There have been only two games played in the series so far and the Irish have won both.

In their first and only appearance in Colorado until today Notre Dame defeated the Falcons 34-7 at Falcon Stadium in 1964. The only other game in

the series also was a Notre Dame victory by a 13-6 count at South Bend in 1969.

Today's game will have special significance for several Falcon players since they played their high school football in the shadow of the Golden Dome at Notre Dame.

Offensive captain Orderia Mitchell (The Big O), the starting center for the last three years, hails from Elkhart, Ind., only a few miles east of South Bend.

Senior tailback Joel Carlson and his sophomore brother Dana are from Coloma, Mich., which is right across the state line from South Bend.

Although he is only a junior, quarterback Rich Haynie is already in the Falcon record book several times. His latest entry came at West Point last Saturday when he threw two touchdown passes to raise his career total of 25, equaling the mark set in 1969 and 1970 by Bob Parker.

Haynie has 17 T.D. passes so far this season and probably will wind up with just about all the career passing and total offense records by the time he graduates.

Haynie already holds several baseball records as a pitcher and was the most valuable athlete in that sport last spring.

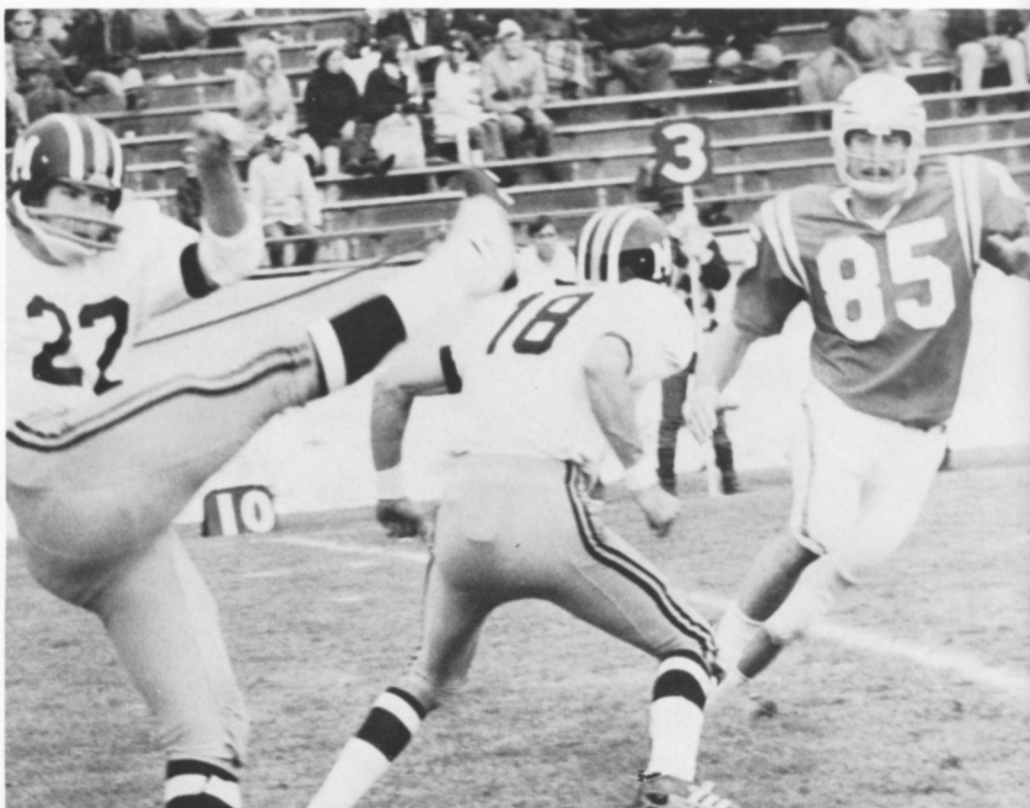
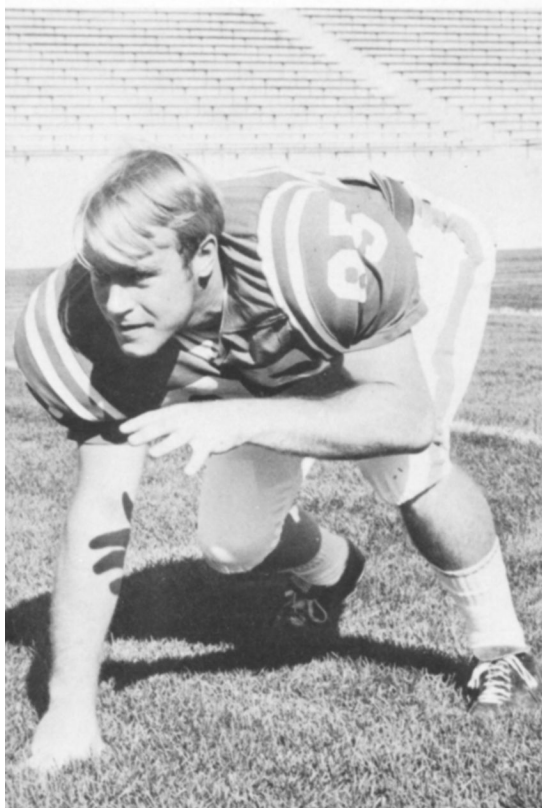
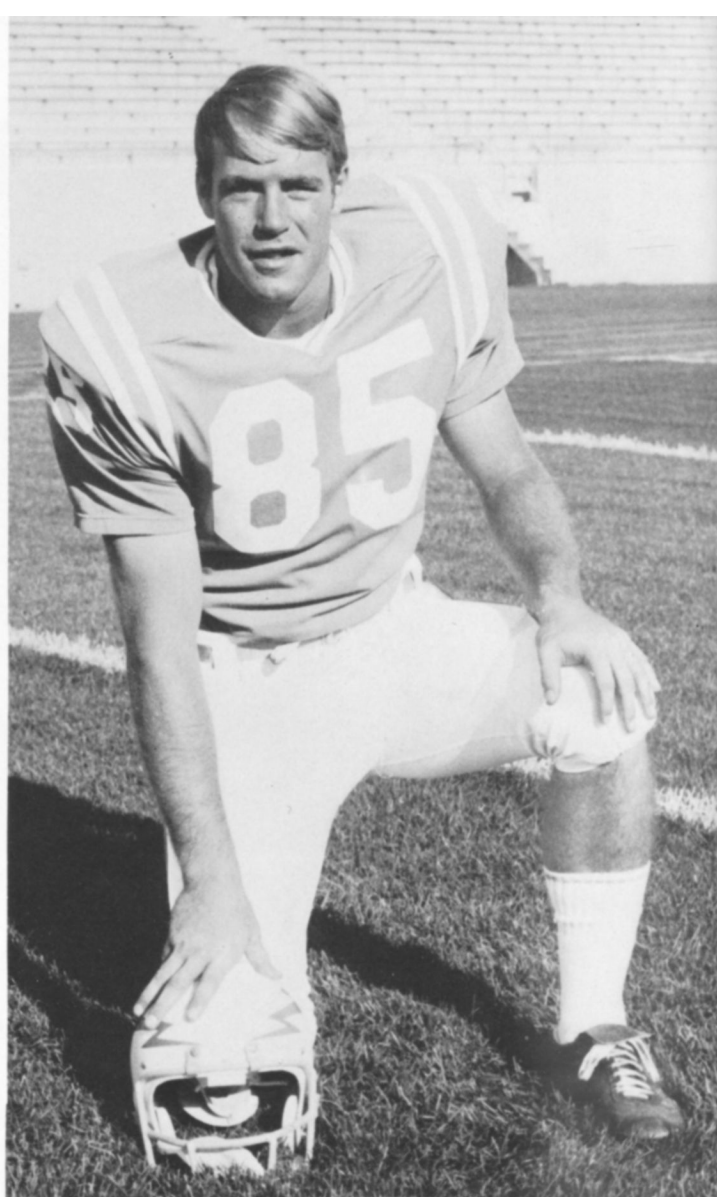
**6-0, 196-pound senior defensive end

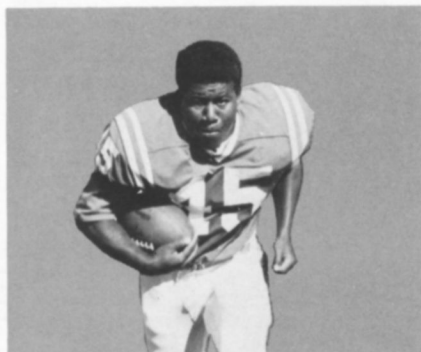

Earned all-state honors in high school also lettering in wrestling. His father, Elmer, is a high school mathematics teacher.

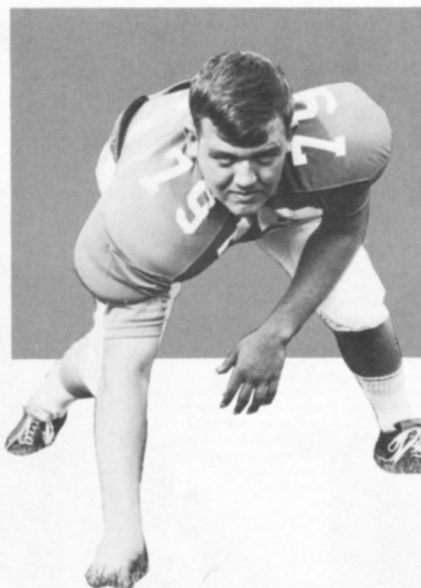

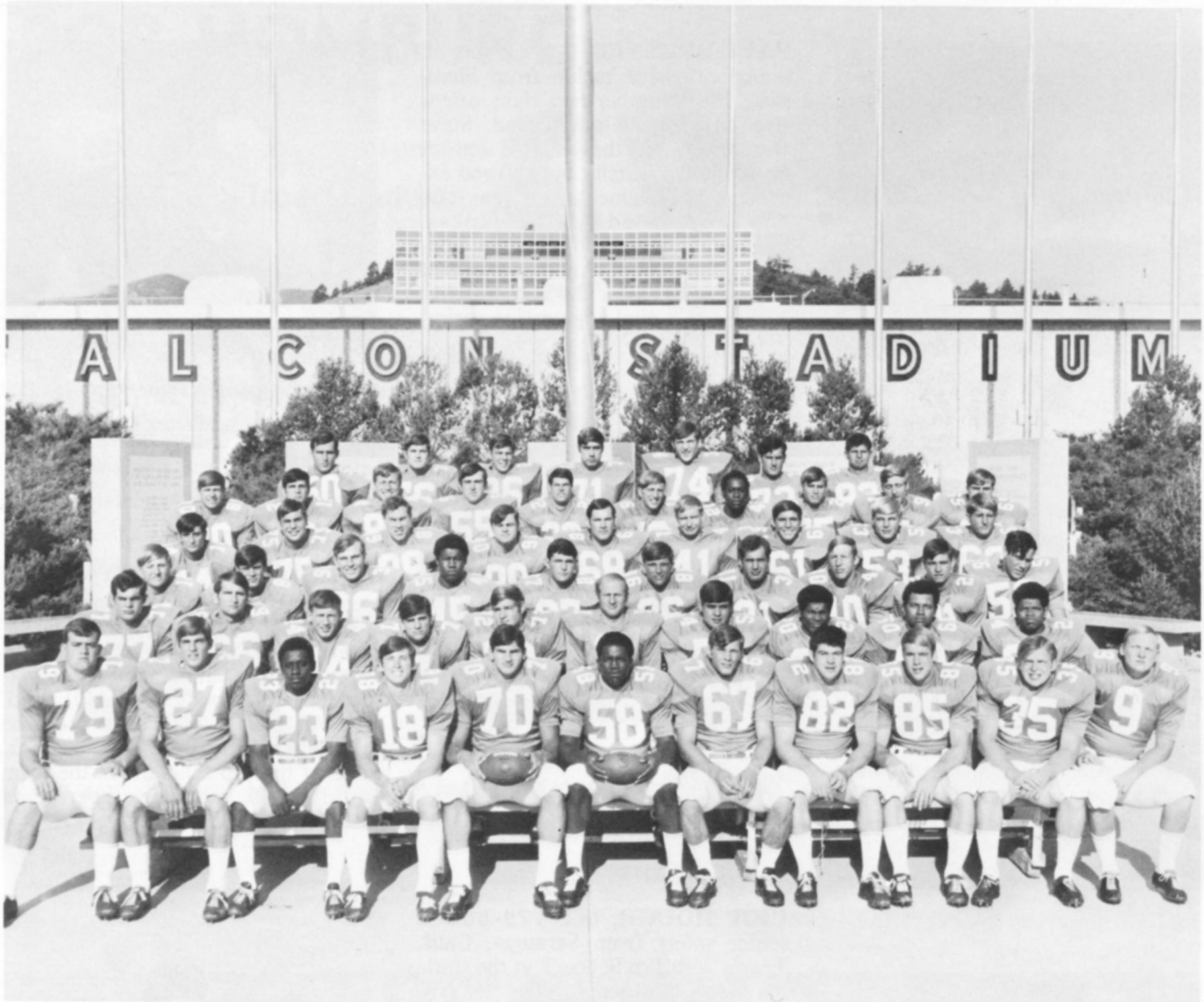

UNIVERSITY OF NOTRE DAME

The University of Notre Dame was founded in 1842 by a young priest of a French missionary order called the Congregation of the Holy Cross. Father Edward F. Sorin started his school in the northern Indiana wilderness with about \$300 and three log buildings in bad repair, and in 1844 he received a charter from the state legislature. His initial educational program adopted the classic liberal-arts curriculum to the needs of the frontier. Science entered the curriculum in 1865, and in 1869 a Department of Law, now the oldest American law school under Catholic auspices, began functioning. Engineering was founded in 1873, a graduate program in 1918, and a College of Business Administration in 1920.

The University was governed by the Holy Cross Fathers until 1967 when it became the first major Catholic university to transfer governance to a lay Board of Trustees. The 12 Fellows are divided equally between Holy Cross priests and lay persons. While certain powers are reserved to the Fellows, the Board of Trustees, which currently has a membership of 30 lay persons and seven Holy Cross priests, is the primary arm of governance. Faculty and Students share in the administration of the University through such groups as the Academic Council, the Student Life

Council, and the individual college councils.

Notre Dame's 1,250-acre campus, with its twin lakes and wooded areas, is located just north of the city limits of South Bend, Indiana, which has a population of around 130,000. Its physical plant of more than 95 buildings has an insured replacement value of \$167 million. Some two dozen buildings, valued at around \$80 million, have been erected during the last 20 years, including the world's largest collegiate library building.

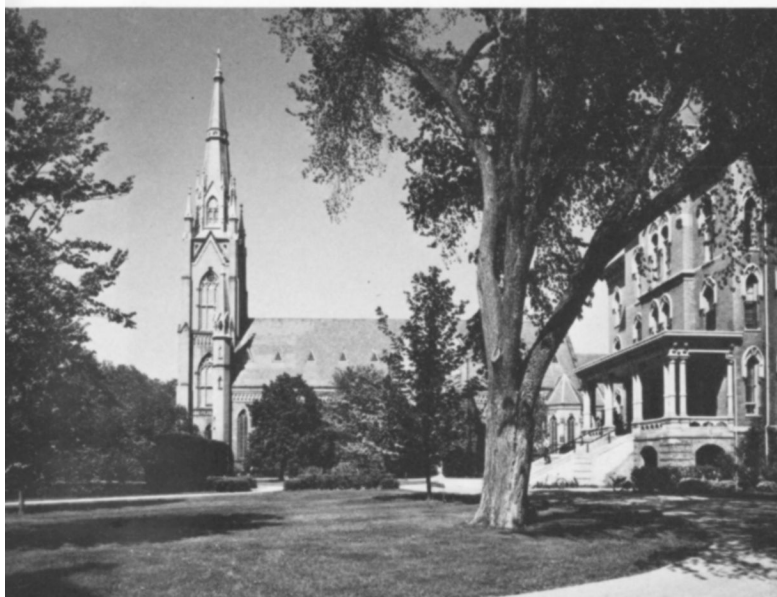
Notre Dame's main academic units are the four undergraduate colleges—Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering, and Business Administration—and the Law School. There is no separate Graduate faculty, but virtually all the academic departments also offer advanced degree programs.

There are also five University Institutes: The Center for the Study of Man in Contemporary Society; Lombard Laboratory (for germfree animal research); the Radiation Laboratory; the Institute for International Studies, and the Institute for Urban Studies.

Notre Dame's teaching and research faculty numbers about 600, almost all full-time. There are an additional 150 persons classified as professional specialists and research

fellows. Nine of 10 members of the faculty are lay persons, and about 70 per cent of the entire faculty have doctorates or the equivalent.

Notre Dame is one of a handful of truly national universities—its student body comes from all over the nation, with the largest contingents from Illinois, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Indiana. (There are also about 350 international students from 57 countries.) It is also a residential university with more than 5,200 undergraduates (out of 6,600) living in 20 campus dormitories. While intercollegiate sports particularly Notre Dame's legendary football teams, are an important facet of student life, the University's varsity athletes meet the same academic standards required of all students. Notre Dame stands third behind Yale and Air Force Academy in the number of postgraduate NCAA scholarship awards given to its athletes.

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. **No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.**

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 48,628 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

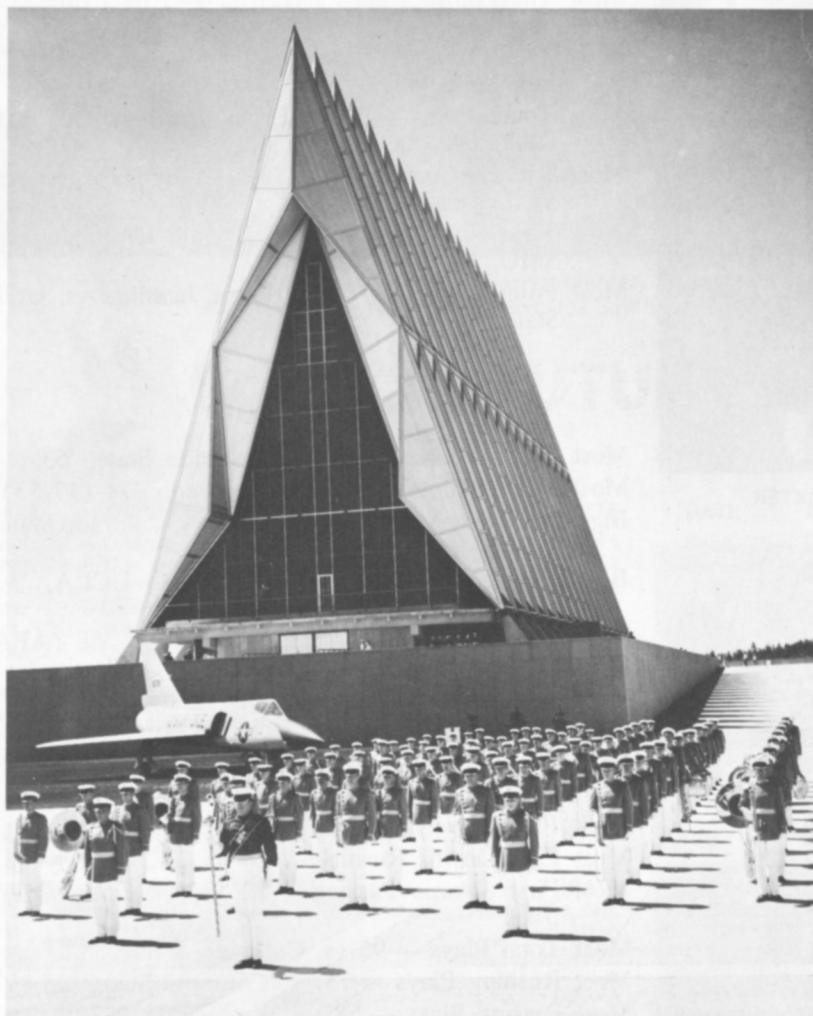

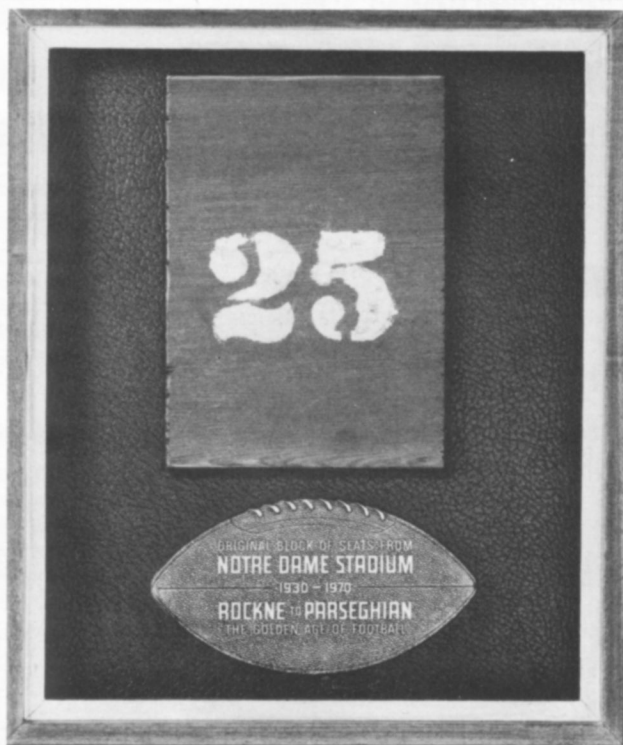

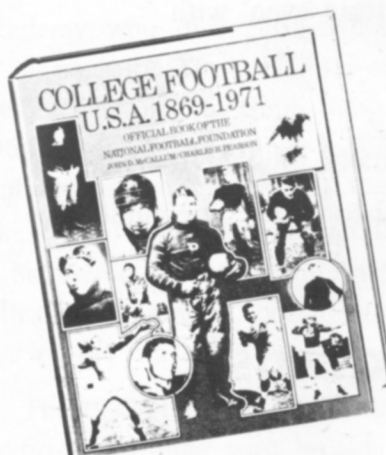

'62 CELEBRATES ITS TENTH!

The Class of 1962 entered basic cadet training at Lowry Air Force Base, Colorado, on June 27, 1958.

In mid-August the Cadet Wing moved to its present site. This was the first class to spend four years at the permanent Air Force Academy site.

The official History of the Academy for the year 1 July 1961-30 June 1962 said of '62:

The Class of 1962 was popularly referred to as the "Red Tags" and was the most mischievous and independent thinking class which had entered the Academy to date. The class had been so labelled from the red tags they wore during basic cadet training, their red bathrobes and the red blankets on their beds . . . When they were the Fourth Class in 1958 they were unusually resourceful in 'getting even' with upper classmen and not being caught . . .

The motto of the Class of 1962 is "Invictus Virtute." Originally thought to mean "unconquerable virtue or courage," it is now widely believed to mean "unconquerable only by virtue!"

Welcome Home, All Redtags!

This morning alumni and the Cadet Wing participated in a Memorial Service to honor USAF Academy graduates who have died in the service of their nation since the 1971 Homecoming. Colonel Robert C. Oaks, Class of 1959, was the senior graduate present at the ceremony and stood in the reviewing party with the Superintendent, Lt. Gen. Albert P. Clark, the Commandant, Maj. Gen. Walter T. Galligan, and the Dean of the Faculty, Brig. Gen. William T. Woodyard.

The Memorial Ceremony was followed by a Wives Coffee in Arnold Hall attended by nearly 300 ladies and a Discussion Program participated in by approximately 350 alumni.

During halftime ceremonies today, Mr. Donald R. Eckelberry, one of America's leading wildlife artists and ornithologists, will present on behalf of himself and the Frame House Gallery of Louisville, Ky., his painting of "Baffin," the beautiful white gyrfalcon mascot of the Cadet Wing to the Association of Graduates. The Association will in turn present it to the Cadet Wing for permanent display at the Academy. "Baffin" will make his first public aerial demonstration today. A limited edition of reproductions of Mr. Eckelberry's painting is being sold through the Association of Graduates.

Tonight, the alumni and their ladies will attend a banquet in Mitchell Hall. The highlight of the evening's festivities will be the presentation of the fifth annual Jabara Award for Airmanship. The award is named in memory of Colonel James Jabara, America's first jet fighter ace, and is presented each year to a graduate of the USAF Academy who distinguishes himself in the field of airmanship. The 1972 Jabara Award will be presented tonight to Capt. Steve Ritchie, Class of 1964. He served two tours in Vietnam, flying 147 combat missions over North Vietnam. On August 28, 1972, while flying his 339th combat mission in Southeast Asia, Captain Ritchie shot down his fifth MIG-21 aircraft, becoming the first Air Force Ace of the Vietnam War.

GABRESKI TROPHY

In addition to renewing the football rivalry between Air Force and Notre Dame, today's game also marks the establishment of the Gabreski Trophy, presented jointly by the Denver Falcon Quarterback Club and the Notre Dame Alumni Club of Denver.

The trophy honors Colonel Francis S. Gabreski, USAF (Ret.) who shot down 37½ planes during World War II and the Korean Conflict. Colonel Gabreski attended Notre Dame in 1939 and 1940 before beginning his distinguished Air Force career. He is presently with the Grumman Company, Bethpage, New York. The inscription is as follows:

"Honoring Colonel Francis S. Gabreski, USAF — dedicated to the men of the United States Air Force Academy and the University of Notre Dame du Lac who have given their lives in the pursuit of peace — they have honored their God and their Country — presented by the Falcon Quarterback and Notre Dame Alumni Clubs of Denver."

The trophy is scheduled for retirement over a five-year period and will be held by the victorious team from year to year. The first team to win three games will have permanent possession. If after five years the team records are 2-2-1, total points will retire the trophy. Possession after tie games will be determined by a flip of the coin.

The 1973 and 1974 games will be played on the South Bend campus with the game returning to Colorado Springs in 1975.
