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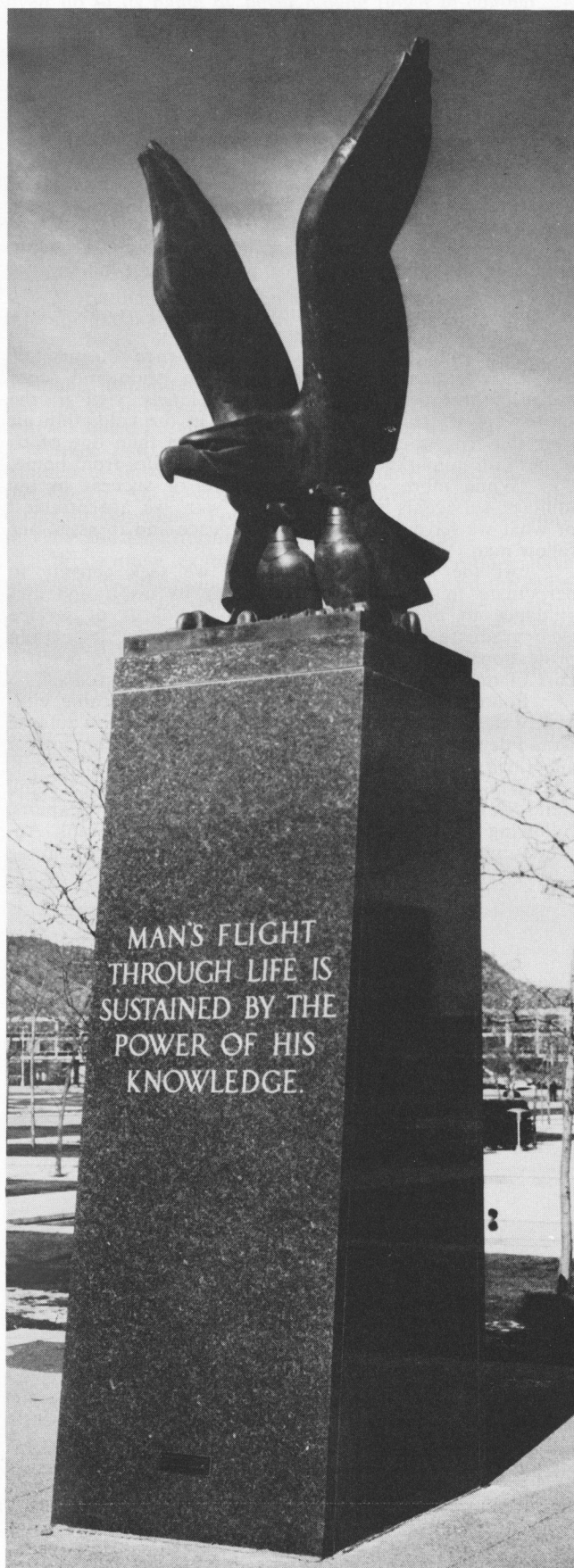

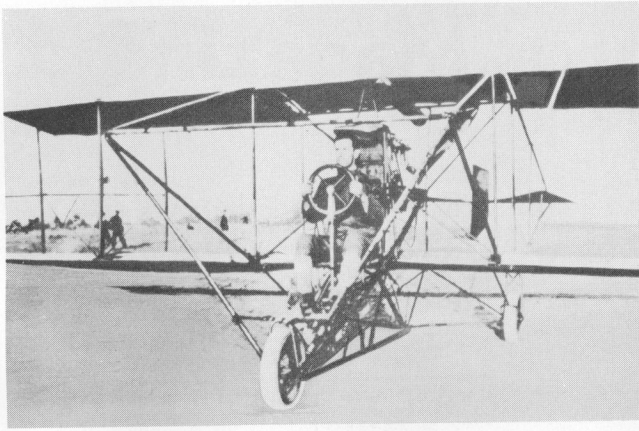
TODAY'S COVER ARTIST

"Those who serve today in the Air Force Blue have abundantly proved their unshakable commitment to meeting the challenges of national defense. They stand ready to respond to any threat to our freedom and security. They represent the highest ideals of America and of a people staunchly dedicated to liberty and peace."

Those are some of the congratulatory remarks by President Richard M. Nixon to Air Force Secretary Dr. Robert C. Seamans, Jr., on the occasion of the Silver Anniversary of the Air Force Sept. 18, 1972.

In reality Air Force heritage did not exactly start with the National Defense Act signed by President Harry S. Truman in 1947. The roots go much deeper.

From the time of the United States Civil War, military men have ventured into the air.

Just a lifetime ago, heavier than air flight occurred from a mound of land named Kill Devil Hill near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina.

It took 12 horsepower to lift that frail Orville and Wilbur Wright craft from the sands, and propel it 105 feet... a flight which today could be effected with room to spare inside the C-5A Galaxy.

Sixty-five years have gone by since the War Department created the aeronautical division of the Chief Signal Officer of the Army. It was then that Army Captain Charles deForrest Chandler took charge of "all matters pertaining to military ballooning, air machines and all kindred subjects."

Captain Chandler directed a staff of two enlisted men and a civilian clerk. Today the United States Air Force consists of about 1.7 million men and women. The figure includes more than 750,000 military personnel on active duty (126,000 officers, 624,000 airmen and 4,000 cadets at the Air Force Academy).

Also, there are more than 319,000 civilian employees and some 627,000 members of the Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve. It was just a quarter century ago on Sept. 18, 1947 that the Air Force became a separate department and military service with its own Secretary and Chief of Staff.

The present Air Force Chief of Staff, General John D. Ryan recently stated, "Despite our youth in comparison to other institutions and military services, we are mature in experience and achievement. The lessons of four decades of flying had already been logged when we began in 1947.

"During the past 25 years, the possibility of a direct attack on the United States and Western Europe has existed.

"The fact that neither has occurred is attributable in large measure to the ability of the Air Force bombers, fighters, interceptors and missiles as well as the men who

man and control them to make the cost of major aggression too great for even the strongest opponents."

Almost as young as the Air Force is the Air Force Academy. It was in 1948 that the Air Force appointed military educators to plan the curriculum for an Air Force Academy. Authorization for the Academy was made by Congress in 1954 and work on the Colorado Springs site got underway in 1955. By 1958 construction had progressed to the extent that occupation was practical.

Classes however, were conducted prior to that time at Lowry Air Force Base, Denver. The first formal class was sworn in on July 11, 1955.

Since that time thousands of Air Force Academy graduates have served the free world in time of conflict and peace.

Academy Superintendent Lt. General A. P. Clark stated upon this Silver Anniversary,

"We can reflect upon our experience during this first quarter century with considerable pride and sense of accomplishment. We have stood lonely vigil in the snowswept wastes of the Arctic and in the cold, thin air over the fringes of the free world. More than one of us rests in an unmarked grave thousands of miles from home.

"While more often the measure of success in the military service is performance in war, we are proudest of what we have done to keep the peace and to assist our fellow man.

"At the Air Force Academy, we seek actively to perpetuate this heritage and to offer its inspiration and guidance to our cadets. The high standards of service each graduate carries with him attests to the dedication, professionalism and sacrifice which have been so much a part of our history during the past twenty-five years."

Following victory in World War II it became eminently clear the Jet Age had arrived and that future defense would depend on how well we maintained our technological superiority.

While many of the nation's leaders advocated a rapid stand down following the war, far sighted air experts, following the footsteps of men like Mitchell, Frank Andrews and "Hap" Arnold fought against overwhelming

odds to develop and produce the B-36 "Peacemaker" which lived up to its name by never having flown in combat.

The 10,000 mile range aircraft became the mainstay of our national policy of strategic deterrence.

There was little fanfare when the Air Force came into being, but a great deal of planning for the future . . . that planning goes on today.

The first active operation for the Air Force came just about one year after its new banner was raised.

Berlin was cut off from the outside world!

General Curtis Lemay, Commander of U.S. Air Forces in Europe and William Tunner, developer of the "Hump in Burma" supply route, started an airlift to supply Berlin's daily needs known as "Operation Vittles."

More than two million tons of goods were airlifted into the blockaded city. The Operation lasted a total of 17 months (13 during the actual blockage and four months following) and has been recorded as one of the most dramatic humanitarian accomplishments of our time. The attempt to starve the people of West Berlin by the communists failed because American air power was there.

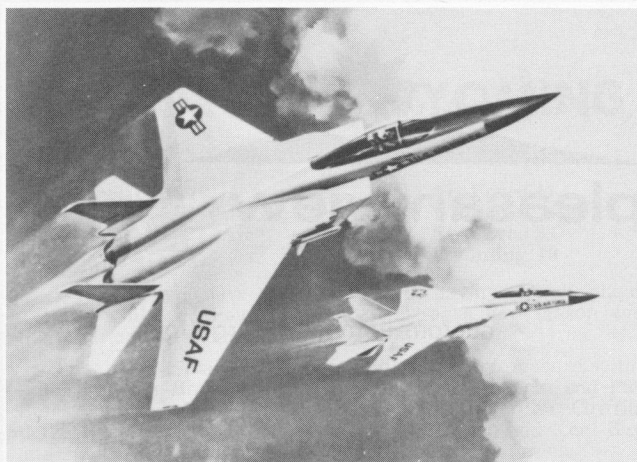
Since that memorable time the Air Force has contributed to the welfare of people in many lands: In 1962 the Congo Air Evacuation; the lifesaving aid to earthquake stricken Chile, Yugoslavia, Iran and Peru; Mississippi in 1969 and the aftermath of Hurricane Camile.

While these examples of Air Force operations have demonstrated the values placed on human life, on the relief from suffering and the importance of the welfare of mankind, the primary duty has been and continues to be "safeguard the greatest of all human rights . . . the right to be free and the right to live with dignity and without fear."

And so, in 1950, the United States Air Force was there when the Korean War broke out . . . first to rally forces for its initial mission, the evacuation of American Nationals which set the pace for the conflict that followed. The Korean War saw jets edging their way into the skies

and the propeller fighters and interceptors slipping into the past.

The North Koreans sent in their Russian built MIG 15s only to have them knocked from the air by the American F-86 Sabrejets.

The grueling struggle produced Air Force Aces such as: Captain Joseph McConnell, Colonel James Johnson, and Captain Manuel Fernandez and Captain James Jabara, America's first jet ace for whom the Jabara Award for Airmanship is given at the Air Force Academy.

The award is administered by the Association of Graduates and has been presented each year since 1968 to the outstanding Academy cadet in the Airmanship program.

In the war in South Vietnam, which as of Aug. 11, 1972, became an all U.S. advisory and air activity, (the last American ground combat unit furled its colors on August 12), Allied air supremacy has been maintained from the very start of the action involving U.S. forces.

In South Vietnam the absence of enemy fighters allowed our forces to use hundreds of helicopters and other special performance air vehicles with no losses due to enemy air power.

For the past 25 years the United States Air Force has measured up to the tasks it has set out to accomplish. The mission today remains essentially the same as set down in the charter in 1947.

It is recognized that many Americans have grown weary of defense spending and are anxious to turn the country's resources to the problems at home. However, it is also true that history tells no stories of security and progress at home being enhanced by military weakness.

General Ryan points out that concurrent with the nuclear threat and the limited conflicts that have been fought since 1947, there also occurred a string of crises that were never allowed to reach even the limited war level. Most were controlled as quickly as they arose because the United States Air Force was ready to respond and did.

When the day comes that there is stable peace on a world wide basis, the men and women of the United States Air Force would like to think they are one of the sustaining elements in that achievement.

General Ryan is quick to add, "the commemoration of past accomplishments is done in sober realization that these accomplishments were, after all, part of the job. More important, the job is not yet finished. What must remain constant as we look toward the next quarter century is the dedication to duty and country that marked the service of Air Force people during our first quarter century."

Six decades of history, rich in tradition and accomplishment, lend confidence and faith that the future of the Air Force will be as distinguished as the past.

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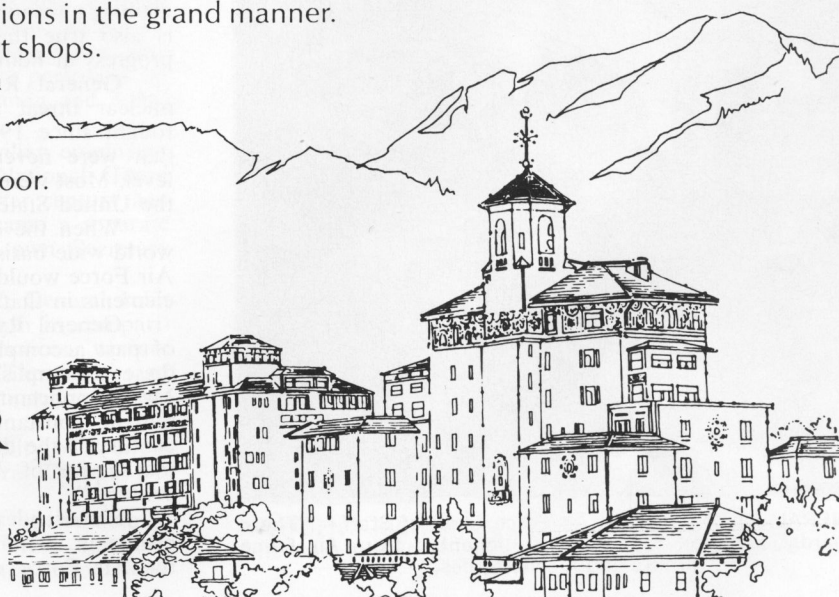

AIR FORCE vs. WYOMING

Before getting into the details of today's game, we would like to say hello to two groups who are with us today.

First of all, I would like to extend a welcome to the famed Casper Troopers of Wyoming, who will be performing at halftime. The Troopers have appeared at Falcon Stadium before and have always put on a good show.

Another hello goes to the government employees who are here today. Your interest in Air Academy football is greatly appreciated.

One of the Air Force's oldest football rivalries and one of the best in the Rocky Mountain area will be renewed today when the Falcons face always tough Wyoming.

The Cowboys got off to an impressive start last Saturday by defeating Idaho State, 30-14. They also remember the outcome of last year's game when the Falcons scored on the last play of the game to pull out a 23-19 victory. Quarterback Rich Haynie passed 15 yards to split end Greg Smith to win the game and both will be starting for the Falcons today.

That victory gave the Falcons a 6-5-2 lead in the series and indicates how close the rivalry has been over the years.

Wyoming will have the advantage of having already played a game while the Falcons will be starting a new season with the usual new faces in the lineup.

The biggest losses from last season include record-setting tailback Brian Bream, fullback Kevin Brennen, tight end Paul Bassa, defensive tackles John Greenlaw and John Griffith, defensive backs Jim Janulis, Charlie Richardson and Kent Bays and linebacker-punter Darryl Haas, a two-way threat.

Returning players familiar to Falcon fans include, of course, Haynie and Smith. Haynie, a junior who was also the Falcons most valuable baseball player, passed for 1,335 yards last season, the most yardage ever picked up by a Falcon sophomore quarterback.

Smith is the starting split end after playing flanker last season, while other top offensive returnees include senior tailback Joel Carlson, All-America center Orderia (The Big O) Mitchell, tackles Steve Hansen and Steve Waller, and flanker Frank Murphy.

Top defensive returnees include All-America defensive end Gene Ogilvie, senior defensive end Bob Homburg, junior linebacker Jim Morris and senior defensive back Chip Hough.

Carlson is a very explosive-type runner who beat Army with an 88-yard touchdown run last season. Hough was one of the nation's top punt returners last season while Morris is an extremely tough tackler. Let's not forget Ogilvie, an agile senior who caught opponent backs 17 times for 97 yards in losses last season.

All in all, it should be another interesting season for the Falcons, who will be seeking their fifth straight winning season after a 6-4 campaign in 1971.

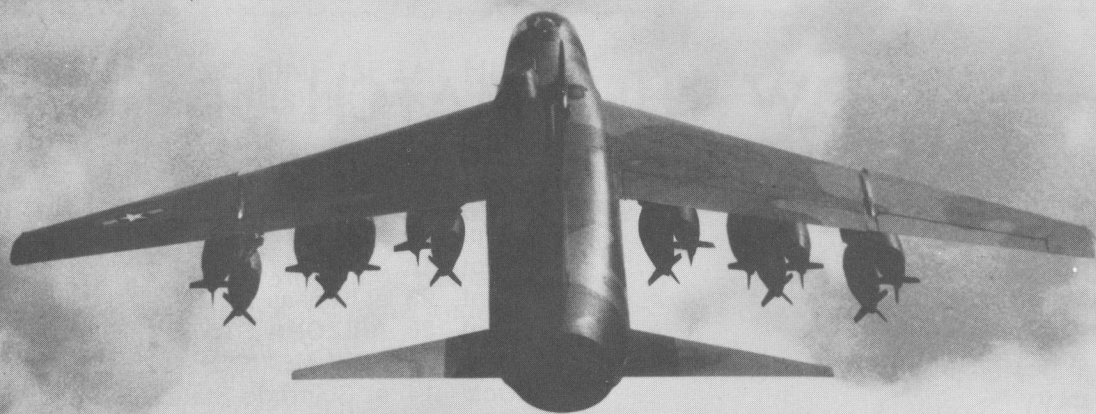

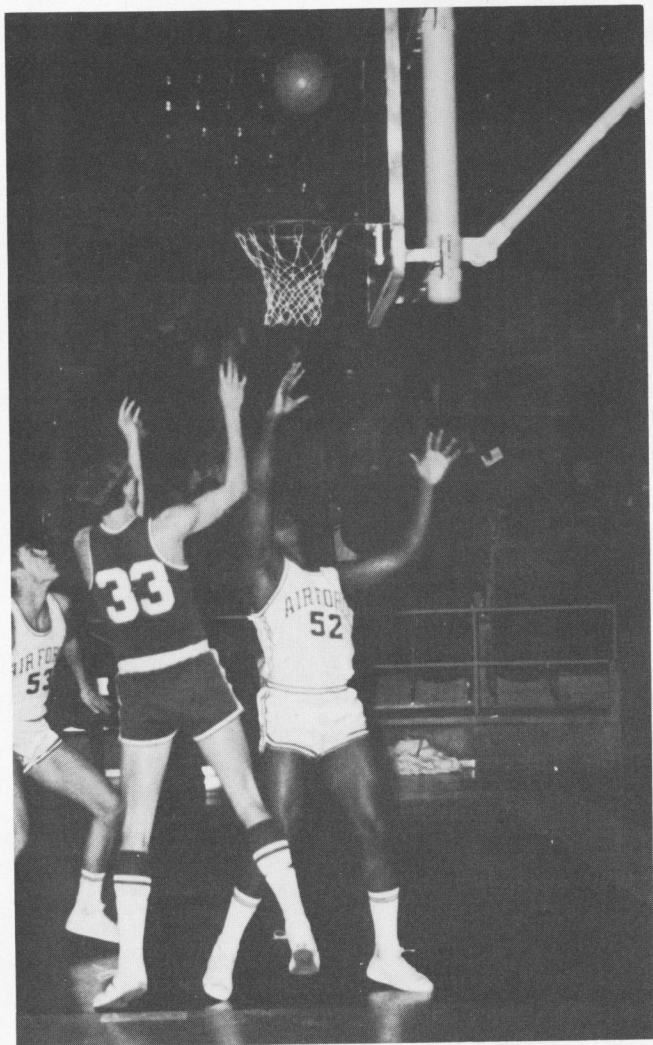

from Elkhart, Ind.**

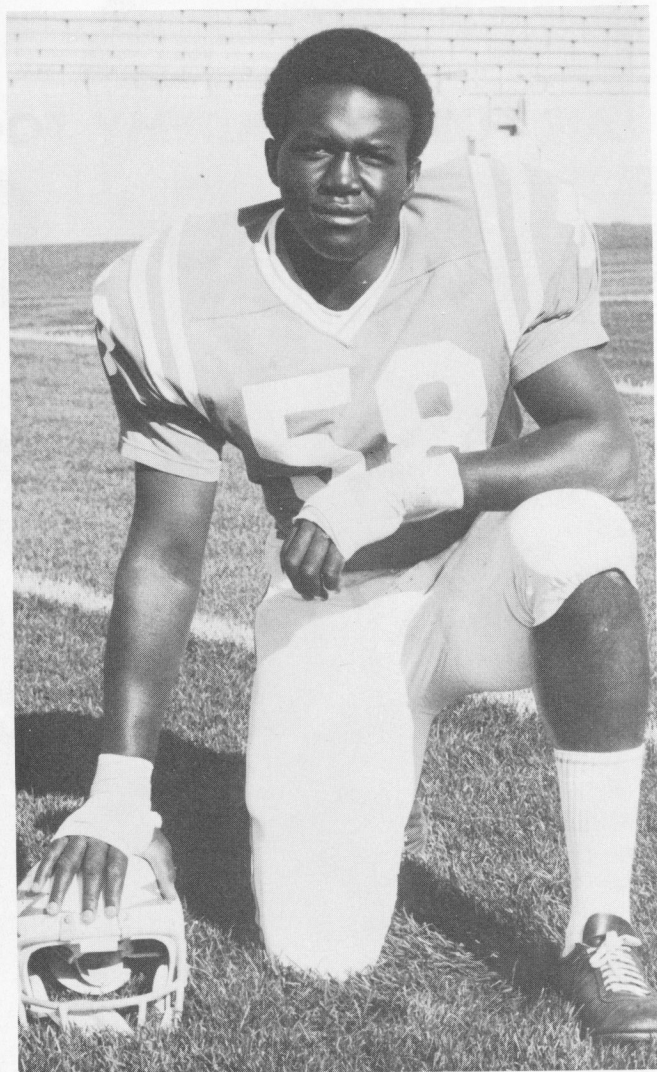
One of the top offensive linemen in the nation this fall will certainly be Orderia Mitchell, or "The Big O," as he is nicknamed.

The 6-3, 224-pound senior from Elkhart, Ind., has received some All-America mention the last two seasons and will be a prime candidate again this fall.

Already acknowledged as the best center in Falcon football history, he was named to the Sophomore All-America team in 1970 and made the Black Sport All-America team last fall.

Blessed with excellent speed, Mitchell logged 307 minutes as a sophomore and added 264 more last season, making him the Falcons' most experienced player. He has started in every game the last two years.

A versatile athlete, he also earned a varsity letter in basketball last winter, starting several games at forward, a rare feat in major college athletics these days. He is also an excellent student and had a 3.49 average (based on a 4.0 system) in a life science major last semester.

NEW DRAMA CENTER OPENS AT WYOMING

Drama will become a new experience for Wyomingites after the University of Wyoming Department of Communication and Theater settle into the new Fine Arts Center this fall.

An expanded drama program will be one of the many benefits of the \$5½ million Fine Arts Center which promises to become the cultural center of Wyoming.

The new facility will accommodate theater in the round, thrust theater (audience on three sides of the stage) and proscenium theater.

There will be two theaters, the larger will seat 400 and the smaller experimental theater will seat 140. Plays will run five days in the large house and twelve days in the small house.

The facility will have fully equipped stages, dressing rooms, storage rooms, costume shop, design shop and a costume design studio.

E. C. Reynolds, professor of communication and theater said the Center will offer endless opportunity to the student and audience.

Previously, plays in the Arts and Science auditorium ran for three days, drawing an audience of 2000. According to Reynolds, a three day performance is limited learning experience for the student.

Due to the smaller seating capacity of the new theaters, plays will be run over longer periods of time. Tickets will be sold on a reserved seat basis.

Sharing A and S facilities with other departments limited the expansion of the drama program.

Reynolds feels these limitations provided a minimal education for the drama students.

"Plays develop and mature the longer they run," he said. "The new facility will give the serious drama student a place

to make mistakes and the expanded opportunity to learn from them."

Reynolds said the smaller experimental theater will not become the second class theater common to many two-theater centers because plays will be presented in the theater best suited to the script.

The first play, which has not been selected yet will be presented in the experimental theater Sept. 26-October 7.

Official dedication ceremonies will be November 8, during the run of "A Man for all Seasons" which will be performed in conjunction with Governor's Day.

"Ultimately we hope the Fine Arts Center will become the cultural center of Wyoming," Reynolds said.

Tentative plans for the new theater facilities include college drama exchange programs, statewide high school presentations and guest artist performances.

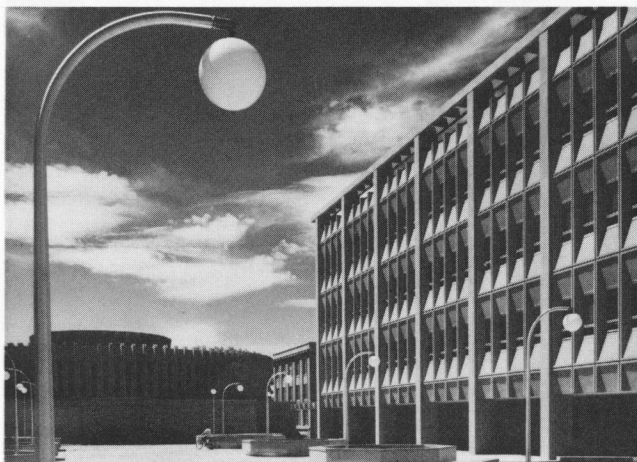
Five plays are scheduled this year in the Public Performance Program.

"We ought to have as many kinds and styles of plays as time, talent and budget will permit," Reynolds said, "the new center will make this opportunity available."

Reynolds, who came to UW last year, has taught at the University of Wisconsin, Ohio State and was head of the theater department at Michigan State.

He said UW support of the drama program is extremely generous. Such support lessens the necessity of making a profit from each play. This takes pressure off the student and enhances the learning experience.

He said many schools demand that each play must be a profit making venture.

Selecting All-American Team... It's Tough Job

Perhaps you were amongst TV viewers of ABC's August presentation of the pre-season All-America team selected by the Football Writers Association of America.

If so, you might have had one of the stereotyped reactions:

"That Arkansas end must have an uncle who's a vice-president at ABC-TV."

"Some super publicity man must have silver-tongued that Duke tackle on to the team."

"That Arizona State running back must have made it because the TV folk had some good film footage left on him."

"These All-America teams are picked geographically. They've got to have a player from near all the big cities so they can sell the program to sponsors."

"One guy picks these All-America teams—during his fourth and fifth martinis some evening when he doesn't have anything else to do."

Etcetera, etcetera.

In the case of the Football Writers' pre-season team showcased on ABC-TV, none of the above is true.

So how did the team come into being?

To give you an oversimplified answer: Slowly and carefully.

To go into more detail:

Started in January

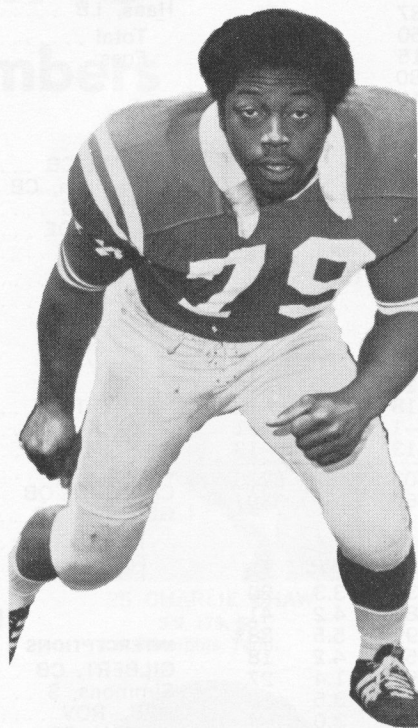
As president of the FWAA, I was notified in early January by Dick Snider, general manager of NCAA Films, that ABC-TV had given the go-ahead for a pre-season All-America. The FWAA was to pick it, NCAA Films was to film it and ABC-TV was to air it.

I started assembling committeemen who had time to do the considerable work required and who could make a mid-February meeting with Snider and Terry Jastrow of ABC-TV.

Committeemen were Smith Barrier, Greensboro, N. C. Daily News; Arnold Burdick, Syracuse, N. Y. Herald-Journal; Si Burick, Dayton, Ohio News; Mickey Holmes, Missouri Valley Conference; John Mooney, Salt Lake City, Utah Tribune; Tom Siler, Knoxville, Tenn. News-Sentinel; Sam Skinner, San Francisco, Calif. Skinner Syndicate and Jim Trinkle, Fort Worth, Texas Star-Telegram.

Eleventh hour casualties because of illness or conflict were Siler, Barrier and Holmes. All had done their research well, however. I used material compiled by the former two and handled their proxies. Holmes briefed, and was replaced by, Don Bryant of the University of Nebraska.

Committee members didn't just get a free ride to New Orleans. Many hours had been put in contacting sources not only for All-America candidates but also for information and ideas on other subjects we'd touch: A possible Heisman Trophy winner, a national Top Ten, trends in football, and interesting feature angles on players.

Listed Top Candidates

In the New Orleans meeting, as in the post-season picking session in Chicago, I started by asking each committeeman to list the top, and only top, All-America candidates in his area. These were placed by positions on the board. No fewer than four were nominated for any position except center, where there were two.

One way to get closer to who's going to make the team is to find out who doesn't HAVE to make it. So, after everyone had had time to study the nominees, I asked if any committeeman had a candidate he was willing to "scratch" from the board. Several, seeing the handwriting on the wall—or chalking on the board—did.

Next step was for committee members to present the facts, figures and propaganda for their candidates.

You always hear that in All-America meetings several positions are decided by "deals." There were deals at this meeting but not in the sense of "I'll give you Harvey Hero if you'll let me have Max de Most."

The "deals" were made to get the best players in a certain area on the team. For example, if Sam Massive had a chance to make offensive tackle but was only the fourth-best player in his area, the committee gave the tackle post to a guy who was more highly recommended in another area.

Because of such "dealing" and the way committee members had done their homework, no position came to a vote during the New Orleans meeting, which produced this team:

Selected Teams

Offensive—Ends Mike Reppond, Arkansas, and Charles Young, USC; tackles Ed Newman, Duke, and Jerry Sisemore, Texas; guards John Hannah, Alabama, and Frank Pomarico, Notre Dame; center Tom Brahaney, Oklahoma; wide receiver Johnny Rodgers, Nebraska; quarterback Joe Ferguson, Arkansas, and running backs Woody Green, Arizona State, and Greg Pruitt, Oklahoma.

Defense—Down linemen Gordie Guinn, Washington, John Grant, USC, Joe Ehrmann, Syracuse, and Bruce Bannon, Penn State; linebackers Randy Gradishar, Ohio State, and Bud Magrum, Colorado; nose guard Rich Glover, Nebraska, and secondarymen Joe Blahak, Nebraska, Jackie Wallace, Arizona, Brad Van Pelt, Michigan State, and Clarence Duren, California.

Predicting a Heisman Trophy winner proved the toughest thing the committee did. Six players were nominated: Ferguson, Pruitt, Rodgers, Glover, Van Pelt and Washington quarterback Sonny Sixkiller.

Surprisingly, when a vote was taken, it produced an oddity: Pruitt was the only offensive player among the top three and his margin over secondaryman Van Pelt and middle guard Glover was razor-blade thin. Actual Heisman balloting, of course, practically never sees any recognition of defensive players.

Long distance calls had to be placed to ailing committeemen Siler and Barrier before Pruitt got the nod over Van Pelt and Glover by a 12-8-7 margin with top three votes being figured on a 3-2-1 basis.

There was neither voting nor argument over our Coach of the Year pick. It was Nebraska's Bob Devaney unanimously.

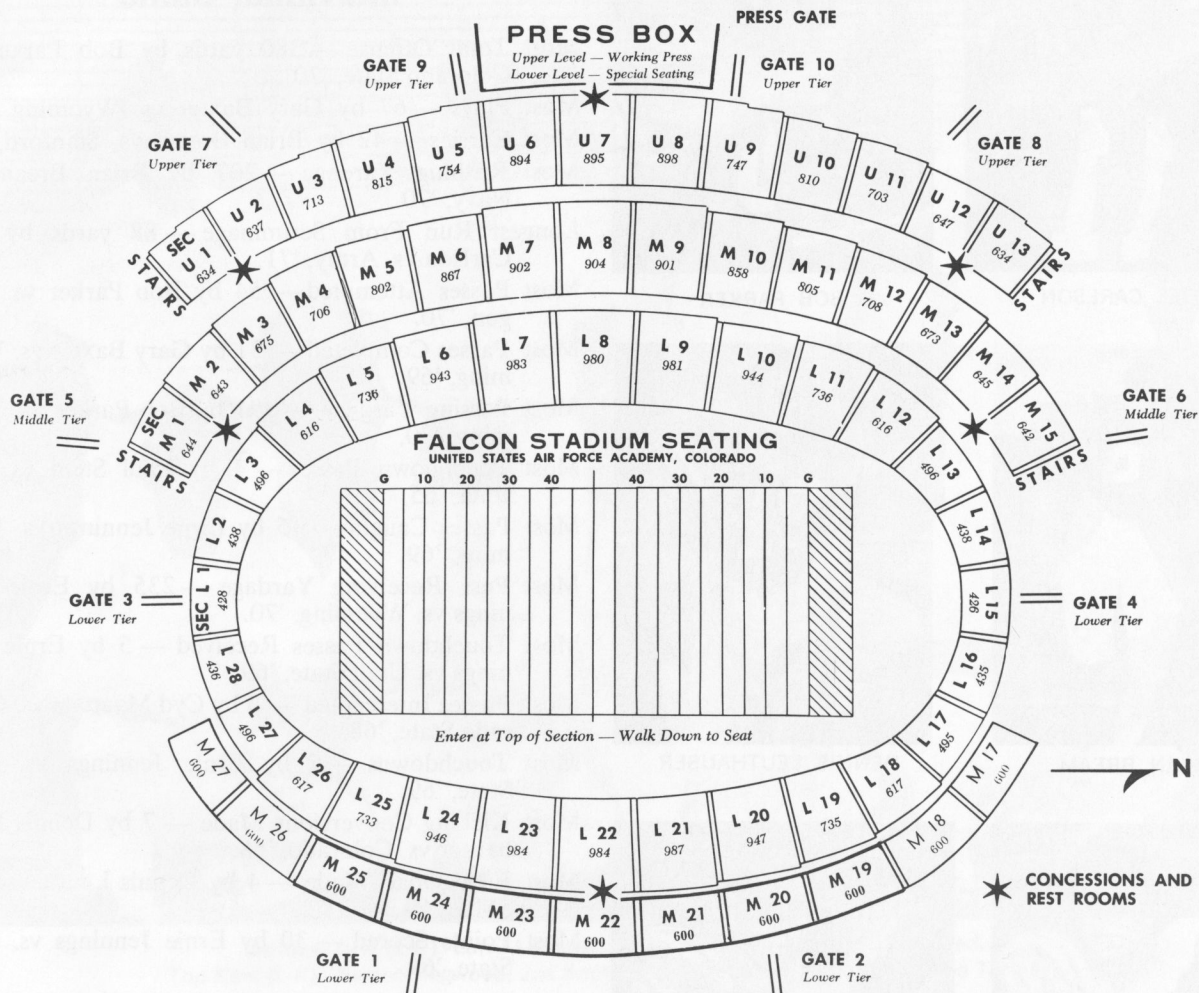
Devaney wouldn't have made it unanimous on our next choice, however. That was tabbing Nebraska to win an unprecedented third straight national championship. Nebraska got eight of the nine votes, the other going to Arkansas.

Top Ten balloting did produce another surprise, however. The committee predicted another 1-2-3 sweep for Big Eight Conference teams. The only change from the 1971 season finish was Colorado moving ahead of Oklahoma into second place.

The ranking of 16 teams receiving votes: Nebraska, Colorado, Oklahoma, Penn State, Arkansas, Michigan, Ohio State, Arizona State, Tennessee, Notre Dame, LSU, Washington, Texas, Alabama, USC and Illinois.

The committee did its work well. How well it did its predicting remains to be revealed.

STADIUM FACTS

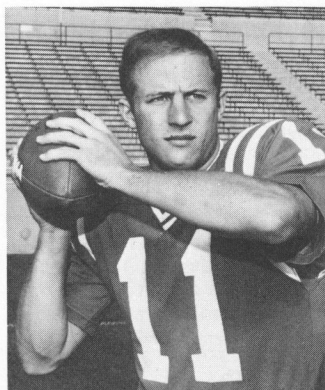
For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 48,628 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

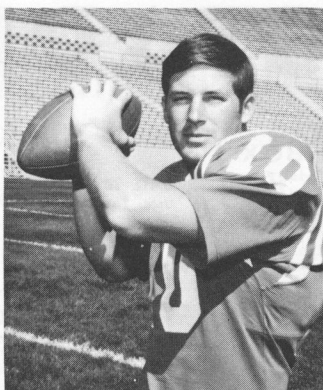
The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

While the football team plays Wyoming this afternoon, Air Force cross country opened its season this morning against the Cowboy harriers at Eisenhower Golf Course.

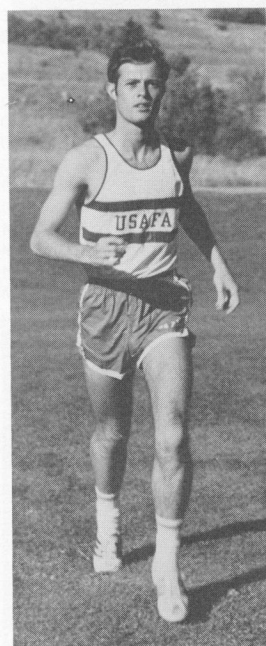
