Poday's Game | AIR FORCE VS. COLORADO

With today's game the curtain falls on the 1972 season for Air Force but it will be a year not soon forgotten.

One of the high points of the season was the clinching of a fifth straight winning year for the Falcons of head coach Ben Martin.

The streak started in 1968 with a 7-3 mark, then followed a 6-4 year in 1969, 9-3 in 1970 and 6-4 last year.

During that span and not counting today's game, the Falcons have won 34 games and lost only 17 games, one of the top marks in the nation during the last five seasons.

The Class of 1973 will be playing its last varsity football game today and like the classes of both 1971 and 1972 it has never experienced a losing season at Air Force.

Playing their final game today will be some of the top players in Falcon football history, headed by center Orderia Mitchell and defensive end and tackle Gene Ogilvie, the team co-captains.

Both were three-year starters while other top players during the past three seasons have been defensive end Bob Homburg, tailback Joel Carlson, and offensive guard Glyn Ottofy.

Building a winning tradition is never easy for a new school such as the Air Force Academy but the Class of 1973 made a substantial contribution to the Falcon record. This may be the final game of the season but it is not too early to think about the 1973 season, which will be here in 43 weeks.

Once again the Falcons have a six-game home schedule with the first three games at home. Oregon starts the season on Sept. 22 followed by New Mexico and then national power Penn State. Later in the season, there are three more home games, also all in a row, with the Falcons meeting Davidson on Oct. 27. Then come games with Army and Rutgers.

New Mexico, Penn State and Rutgers will be playing in Falcon Stadium for the first time. In fact, it will be the first time Air Force has ever met Rutgers, one of the schools that started football in 1869.

Away games are against Colorado, Navy, Arizona and Notre Dame.

It's a challenging schedule but it is also one that Falcon fans should find interesting.





The second-leading tackler on the team behind Jim Morris, he has also intercepted three passes, also the second-best mark for the Falcons.


Last year, he helped break open the Tulsa game with a 37-yard touchdown on an interception.


MEET THE FALCONS



BOB THOMPSON, 5-11, 172-pound sophomore quarterback from El Cajon, Calif. Second team signal caller behind Rich Haynie. Despite limited action he has completed 50 percent of his passes including an 87-yard TD toss to Bob Farr and has yet to be intercepted. The left-handed quarterback threw for 10 scores for the frosh last year.



BOB FARR, 6-1, 175-pound sophomore wide receiver from Glendale, Calif. Has seen action at both the split end and flanker positions this year. Is second on the team with four touchdown passes and is averaging nearly 30 yards a catch. Earned all-league and all-area honors as a prep in both football and baseball.



LARRY FARISS, 6-0, 214-pound sophomore offensive guard from Medford, Ore. Has moved into a starting position at one of the guard slots and has shown good progress. Named an all-stater in high school and twice placed third in the state wrestling meet. Majors in geography.

CU BOASTS TOP LIFE SCIENCE PROGRAM

Like football, biological research requires good equipment, a talented team, excellent team effort and a good coach. CU has all of these ingredients, and they add up to one of the nation's leading life sciences programs.

Basic research aided by the latest instruments and techniques are a vital part of the University of Colorado Department of Molecular, Cellular and Developmental Biology, located in the \$4 million Biosciences Building just west of Folsom Stadium.

The "coach" is Prof. Keith R. Porter, department chairman internationally known for his work in cell biology. Under his leadership, the department has developed since its establishment in 1968 into one of the fastest-growing research and teaching facilities at the University, and its graduate programs already are recognized as among the best in the nation.

Twenty University scientists in the department are engaged this year in research under more than 2 million in grants and contracts from CU, federal and private sources, and the talented "team" includes some of the nation's and the world's leaders in their respective research fields. The building was completed in the spring of 1971. It is one of the finest structures of its kind in the United States, containing 65,000 square feet of laboratory and research space especially designed to meet the individual needs of researchers.

The team's goal is one of the most important mankind is attempting to achieve: In addition to answering age-old questions which man has about life, research in the CU building and in similar biological science facilities throughout the world may hold answers to the medical problems which beset man, Perhaps


a cure for cancer could be the result of basic biological research which is attempting to discover exactly how the cell functions normally, and what happens when it does not function normally.

Basic information about the cell also would be important to scientists working on immunity and immunization from diseases; on development of humans and other animals; on ways to stop viral infections—perhaps man's most formidable enemy, and on techniques for the successful transplantation of organs within the body.

Installation this year in the building of a one-million volt electron microscope gives CU the second nationally and one of the few in the world devoted primarily to biological and biochemical research. One of the first aims of CU scientists will be to determine the capabilities and the limitations of the instrument for biological research.

There is evidence the microscope will make available on Rocky Mountain area scientists three-dimensional information on the fine structure of cells and tissues in studies of relatively thick biological system preparations, and there is a remote possibility the new facility will enable a study of wet preparations of living systems.

Teamwork is important, and the department of close working relationships and cooperative programs with chemistry, physics, psychology, engineering and other departments in the University community. Porter believes the addition of the molecular, cellular and developmental biology department puts the University's biological science community among the top 10 in the nation, and he says the Biosciences Building, new physics and psychology buildings, and the Department of Environmental, Population



CU's high-voltage electron microscope is one of a few in the world devoted primarily to biological research. Located in the Biosciences Building west of Folsom Stadium, the facility is expected to go into full operation later this year. CU has received U.S. Public Health Service grants totaling more than \$450,000 in support of the program, and grants for a proposed five-year program to learn of the machine's potential for biological research are expected to total \$1.4 million.

and Organismic Biology move to the Ramaley Building just west of Biosciences gives CU a science complex unsurpassed in the Rocky Mountain region.

A two-way closed circuit television link between the building and the CU Medical Center has enabled faculty members and students from both campuses to exchange research ideas, to hear lectures and watch demonstrations of basic science techniques presented at the other campus, and to take classes offered at the other campus without having to travel between Denver and Boulder. This link recently was expanded to include the Engineering Center, and some programs have been made available to Boulder area physicians wishing to attend Medical Center sessions without having to go to Denver.

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on third tier of the west side, directly under the press box, The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 48,628 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.





Youth Holds Key To Cage Season

Youth will once again hold the key to the fortunes of Air Force basketball.

Hank Egan, starting his second season as Falcon head coach, has five returning lettermen and lost only three but all three started on the front line.

Gone are starting forwards Dave Kapaska and Truman Hall and starting center Dan Pflueger. Returning starters include Tom Blase and Mark Englebretson at the guards. In addition, Air Force has returning lettermen Rich Nickelson, Steve Gulasey and Steve Gast.

"We have guards and forwards returning who gained good experience last year," said Egan, whose Falcons were 12-13 in his first season. "We

will also get some help at forward and guard from sophomores. The biggest problem will be to fill the middle position. As it looks now, incoming freshmen will supply some needed size."

A size problem is nothing unusual at Air Force. Nickelson is 6-5, Englebretson 6-2 and Blase 6-1.

Blase, the team captain, led the squad in scoring last year with an 11.6 average, and also paced the team in free throw shooting, assists and minutes played. Nickelson was the second-leading scorer at 10.8, while Englebretson averaged 6.3 and shot a good 47 percent from the field. Gulasey averaged 5.3 and Gast 2.0.

Top frosh scorer last season was 6-4 forward Jim Eken who averaged 17.5 and was also tops in rebounds with an 11.2 mark, Jim Dearien, a 6-3 sophomore guard, was the second-leading scorer with a 13.5 average while 6-2 guard Dan Kraft averaged 13.0.

Three freshmen are considered good bets to stay with the varsity, and all three could help the Falcons' height problem. They are 6-7 Jeff Steig, 6-6 Greg Schneider and 6-5 Mike Sevier.

"The accent is definitely on youth," Egan added. "The key to the season will be how fast the young players develop. The schedule is tougher, particularly early in the season, so we will find out about the young players very quickly."

FALCON ICERS FACE BUSY SCHEDULE

A feeling of cautious optimism prevailed among the coaching staff of the Air Force ice hockey squad as the team opened the 1972-73 campaign yesterday following a 25-6 record last season.

A look at the roster, where 15 lettermen are listed, is enough to give the mentors an optimistic feeling.

A glance at the schedule, however, gives them cause for concern.

The 33-game slate includes N.C.A.A. champion Boston University and N.A.I.A. titlist Lake Superior State, Other powers making an appearance are Minnesota-Duluth, Denver University, Colorado College, St. Louis University, Michigan State and the Royal Military College of Canada.

Coach Vic Heyliger states it is the toughest list of

opponents the Air Force has ever scheduled.

Another problem facing the Falcon icers is the loss of Air Force's all-time scoring leader, Bob Ross. Assistant coach John Matchefts says, "To replace Ross with equal talent is impossible. However, his loss is not as critical as one might think, because we have more experience this year and added depth to the roster."

While the loss of Ross cannot be replaced, the attack will remain potent with the return of last year's scoring leader Dave Skalko, who scored 27 goals and had 49 assists in 31 games last season.

Other returning attackmen are Mike Henehan, Dave Stangl, Jim Skalko, Dave Bunker, Pat Carmichael, Mike Lucca, Marlo Mellum, Fred Whitican and John Koelling.

Freshmen who will get a long, serious look are Chuck Pribyl, Bill Kolstad, Jim Jorgenson and Kevin Pederson.

Ross' absence may necessitate juggling the available forwards to obtain balance in the three lines unless one of those freshmen is capable of stepping in immediately.

The Falcons appear set at goal where sophomore Allan Morrison returns after a fantastic first year with the varsity. He'll be backed by junior Bob Ligday and freshman Bill Noonan. Heyliger feels Ligday and Noonan give the Air Force tremendous depth in the nets.

Defense will be stronger than a year ago with five of six starters returning. Team captain Steve Mullvain leads the quintet of lettermen and will be joined by Greyson Morrow, Jerry Droppo, Todd Zejdlik and Gerry Micheletti.

Battling for the vacant sixth slot will be Tim Kline, Phil Gronseth, Bob Potter and Roger Collins.

Overall, look for the Falcons to have more depth and better balance than a year ago which is vital with such a demanding schedule.

ACADEMY COMMUNICATIONS

"Bringing a regular aircraft in for a landing is easy, but have you ever tried to get a sailplane or a parachutist to go around for another try?"

Chief Master Sergeant Andy E. Rubick describes one of the jobs which makes the 1876th Communications Squadron at the Air Force Academy unique to the Air Force.

Rubick is chief controller of the Academy's flight control tower which monitors more than 130,000 cadet training flights each year. The 1876th controllers are the only group in the Air Force who simultaneously handle conventional aircraft operations, parachute training jumps and sailplane missions.

Other unusual duties are not as visible as the tower operations, but some of them are highly audible. Public address (PA) systems in the cadet field house, gymnasium and Falcon football stadium add color

to athletic events while a similar system covers every classroom, laboratory and hallway in the cadet academic building.

The squadron also provides technicians and maintenance men for the most extensive closed circuit educational television system in the Air Force and sound for religious services in the Cadet Chapel.

An Air Force Communications Service (AFCS) unit, the 1876th is also a part of the Academy command. Its sole purpose is to provide service to the Academy.

Routine tasks performed by the 1876th, like other AFCS units, include managing telephone service for the Academy's offices and maintaining a message center to transmit and receive communications between military organizations.

"We are definitely a service unit and our people support virtually every segment of the academy," said

Most visitors to the Academy are aware of the busy airfield activity located at the southern end of the installation, but few people consider the men who insure the training operations are carried out safely.

"It gets interesting when 10 T-41s are operating in addition to several sailplanes and a jump aircraft," said Technical Sergeant Jim Keon, a controller.

"The airborne sailplanes are always in the immediate vicinity of the airfield and the parachutists land on their target just a few yards west of the runway.

"We have to' keep all these activities separated — not let a jumper come down the same time a T-41 or a sailplane is taking off or making a landing approach," Keon said.

Three controllers are on duty whenever training missions are underway. One monitors soaring and parachute drops and the other handles T-41s and other aircraft. The third man is a supervisor who also serves as an extra pair of eyes for the controllers.

The PA section is the only one of its kind in the Air Force.

There are three areas in the cadet field house equipped with sound — the basketball and ice hockey areas and the artificial turf-covered multipurpose area. The section also maintains radio and television outlets in a press box which is centrally located to cover either basketball or hockey.

In the gymnasium, address systems are installed in the swimming pool arena; gymnastics room, indoor rifle and pistol ranges; and several other areas. All sites in the gym can be covered separately or simultaneously.

The sound circuitry in Fairchild Hall, the academic building, is even

more extensive. A control panel located on the sixth floor is equipped with 540 switches which can pipe sound to individual student work rooms and hallways. A master switch allows messages to be broadcast to all points of the building at the same time.

A console placed near the organ in the nave of the Cadet Protestant Chapel allows an operator to provide sound to the other naves in the Chapel.

Two men are responsible for the operation of the entire sound system, and they are backed up by a maintenance section of three men.

Closed circuit television allows large numbers of cadets to receive information at one time and also gives them the opportunity to critique classroom and laboratory exercises. Television service is provided to more than 300 classrooms.

While television announcers and programming personnel are assigned to the Dean of Faculty, all technical and maintenance work is done by 1876th technicians.

The squadron's biggest production comes each June when a new crop of officers are graduated from the Academy. Not only does the squadron arrange for all graduation day activities in Falcon Stadium to be broadcast and recorded, they provide sound for all events during June week's five days of social events leading to graduation.

During the past four years the squadron has installed equipment to service national television and radio reporters who have covered the speeches of the President, Vice President, Secretary of Defense and Secretary of the Air Force.

"It's the mission of the Academy which makes our unit so different," Lurie said. "Our people have adapted to it and most of our equipment is designed especially for our unique jobs."






