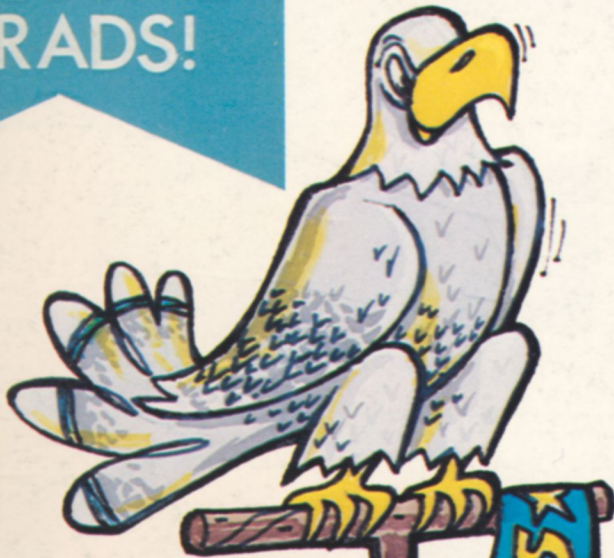

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Basic Cadets Take Assault

Tough? Man, you grabbed the right word!
Demanding physically? Oh, believe it!
Competitive? Every rugged step of the way!
These words echo the sentiments of 1,500-plus young men who underwent basic cadet training (BCT) at the Air Force Academy last summer.

The Class of 1978 (freshmen) entered the Academy on July 1. They then entered six weeks of basic military indoctrination, the completion of which marked their transition from civilian to the cadet way of life.

Run, Run, Run

"Run? I've run more in the past four weeks than the rest of my life put together!" gasped Basic Cadet Todd R. Cripe, 18, of Carmel, Ind., a 1974 graduate of Carmel High School, during a short break in the training.

His brother, Second Lieutenant Robert Cripe, graduated from the Academy in June and is now training at Columbus Air Force Base, Miss., to become a pilot.

The speaker stood at the finish of the bayonet assault course in Jack's Valley, the scene of summer field training for the newcomers.

He gestured around the area.

"Looks great - yah! But paradise it ain't!"

Across the way a cadre of cadets were practicing unarmed combat in the sawdust pit. Further east basics were hollering as they scrambled over 40-foot high obstacles on the confidence course. Westward, chattering rifle and pistol fire came from the weapons range.

Cripe breathed easier as he removed his protective helmet. Sweat ran in rivulets down his temples while face and neck were covered with gummy dust.

Suddenly Cripe laughed.

Combat In Sawdust

"We run constantly out here - to formations, to meals, to drill areas, through training courses. But this one tops 'em all. Look over there."

He pointed to a long triple line of helmeted basics clad in fatigues. They were running in place, gripping rifles chest high.

On signal from an upperclass leader, the first three men darted forward. They dove into a 20-yard sand pit, began to wriggle forward on their bellies under barbed wire.

"Those guys are classmates in H Squadron - we're the Hellfighters! - starting their 400-yard stroll through the bayonet assault course," said Cripe.

-under barbed wire entanglements, over piled log barriers.

-through corrugated drainage pipes, staggered steps through rows or rubber tires and up an inclined ramp to leap into a sand trap, every man timed on a stop watch!

- past targets with spring-swung arms that can knock you flat.

Bomb Burst & Red Smoke

Through it all come the calls of comrades yelling encouragement, the bank of simulated bomb bursts and red smoke from signal flares drifting across the barricades.

One of Cripe's classmates, Carl Ringleburg, crossed the finish line amid great shouts from teammates who had already run the course.

Ringleburg, of Michigan, is a June graduate of Grand Haven High School where he was on the football and swimming teams. He, too, entered the Academy with the Class of 1978 on July 1.

"Hey, Carl," said Cripe, "they announced your assault course time at 4 minutes 14 seconds. Great!"

"Yeah," panted Ringleburg, "but how did that scrawny little guy right behind me do it four seconds faster?"

The three basic trainees laughed.

They were learning pride, camaraderie.

They possessed a degree of self-confidence never felt before. Their arduous physical conditioning had replaced flabby tissue with hard muscles and strong sinews. The realization was coming slowly to each man that he had untapped reservoirs of physical endurance.

A few minutes later H Squadron, one of 10 160-man squadrons organized for basic cadet training, was assembled in a large circle in an open clearing.

Pugil Stick Combat

There they were introduced to the gentle art of pugil stick combat.

A pugil stick is a rifle-length wooden cudgel capped on both ends with styrofoam padding. Clad in protective helmets and heavy leather gloves, the basic cadets are paired by height and weight.

They joust each other with great enthusiasm under the watchful eye of upperclass referees while their peers cheer and yell encouragement.

This is their introduction to basic combat techniques.

When the dust of battle settled and the pugil stick champion of Hellfighter squadron was determined that morning, the referee raised the arm of Ringleburg.

The "meanest cadet of the Valley!"

Todd Cripe grabbed Ringleburg's hand and offered congratulations. Others crowded around, patted his back, called greetings.

They were learning teamwork, cooperation, esprit de corps.

Suddenly the forest glade rang with a shout from 160 throats.

"'78's great!"

Off To Fine Start

The Class of 1978 was off to a fine start at the Air Force Academy.

At the Acceptance Parade in mid-August, they new class was admitted as members of the 4,000-plus Cadet Wing.

In June 1978, these "doolies" of today will graduate with bachelor of science degrees and commissions as second lieutenants in the U.S. Air Force. They are just starting four years of professional military training, academics and physical education which will motivate them toward careers as leaders in the U.S. Air Force.

1974 Homecoming

A special welcome goes out to all the Air Force Academy graduates who are here this afternoon to celebrate Homecoming.

Another welcome also goes to our visitors from the U.S. Naval Academy, who are here for Game One of the annual interservice battle for possession of the Commander in Chief's Trophy.

To review briefly, the Commander in Chief's Trophy is now in its third year of existence and goes to the service academy with the best won-lost record in interservice competition that season.

Navy won possession of the trophy last season with a 2-0 record, defeating Air Force, 42-6 and Army, 51-0. Air Force wound up with a 1-1 mark while Army was 0-2. Army won possession in 1972.

Both Air Force and Navy enter this afternoon's game with losing streaks but that will not dampen the enthusiasm that will be displayed on the playing field.

The Falcons are 1-4 for the season but have lost those four games by a total of only 16 points. In addition, all four losses were decided in the final five minutes of each contest.

Although Navy has a three-game losing streak and a 2-3 overall mark, the Midshipmen hold a two-game winning streak over the Falcons with the series currently tied at three games apiece.

The history of the series has been as follows:

- 1960 Navy won 35-3 at Baltimore
- 1966 Air Force won 15-7 at Falcon Stadium
- 1968 Air Force won 26-20 at Chicago
- 1970 Air Force won 26-3 at Washington, D.C.
- 1972 Navy won 21-17 at Falcon Stadium
- 1973 Navy won 42-6 at Annapolis

Thus the series has been played at five different sites although there have been only six games. However, future games will probably be played at the home field of each of the schools.

Linebacker Dave Lawson continues to kick the long field goals. Against Colorado, Dave set a school record with a 60-yarder, equal to the second longest ever kicked in major college football history. Last Saturday against Tulane, he had a 56-yarder, the third longest in school history, and quite extraordinary considering the sloppy and wet conditions that existed that day.

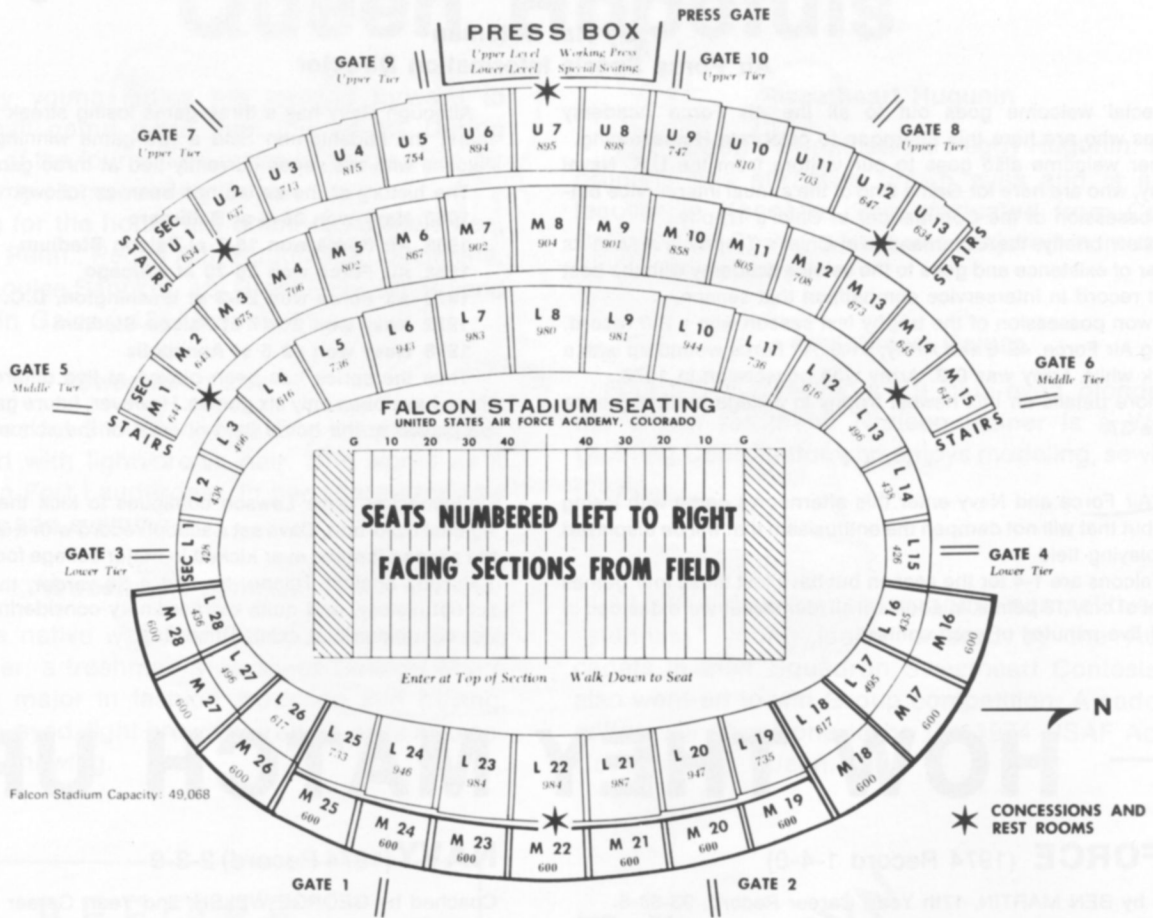

Stadium Information

LOST AND FOUND

If you have lost or found an article before or during a game at Falcon Stadium check with the concession stand nearest your seat. If you find or have lost an article after the game check with the main concession stand under the press box on the west side of the stadium.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report immediately to the head usher in your seating area. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. These rooms are located in the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their seat section, row and seat number with the command post, which is located in the west side of the stadium in the press box. Their office number is 472-4538. A call number will then be used. **No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.**

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. (The stadium is approximately six miles from the South Gate entrance and about four miles from the North Gate entrance to the Academy.) There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, plus a rail siding located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

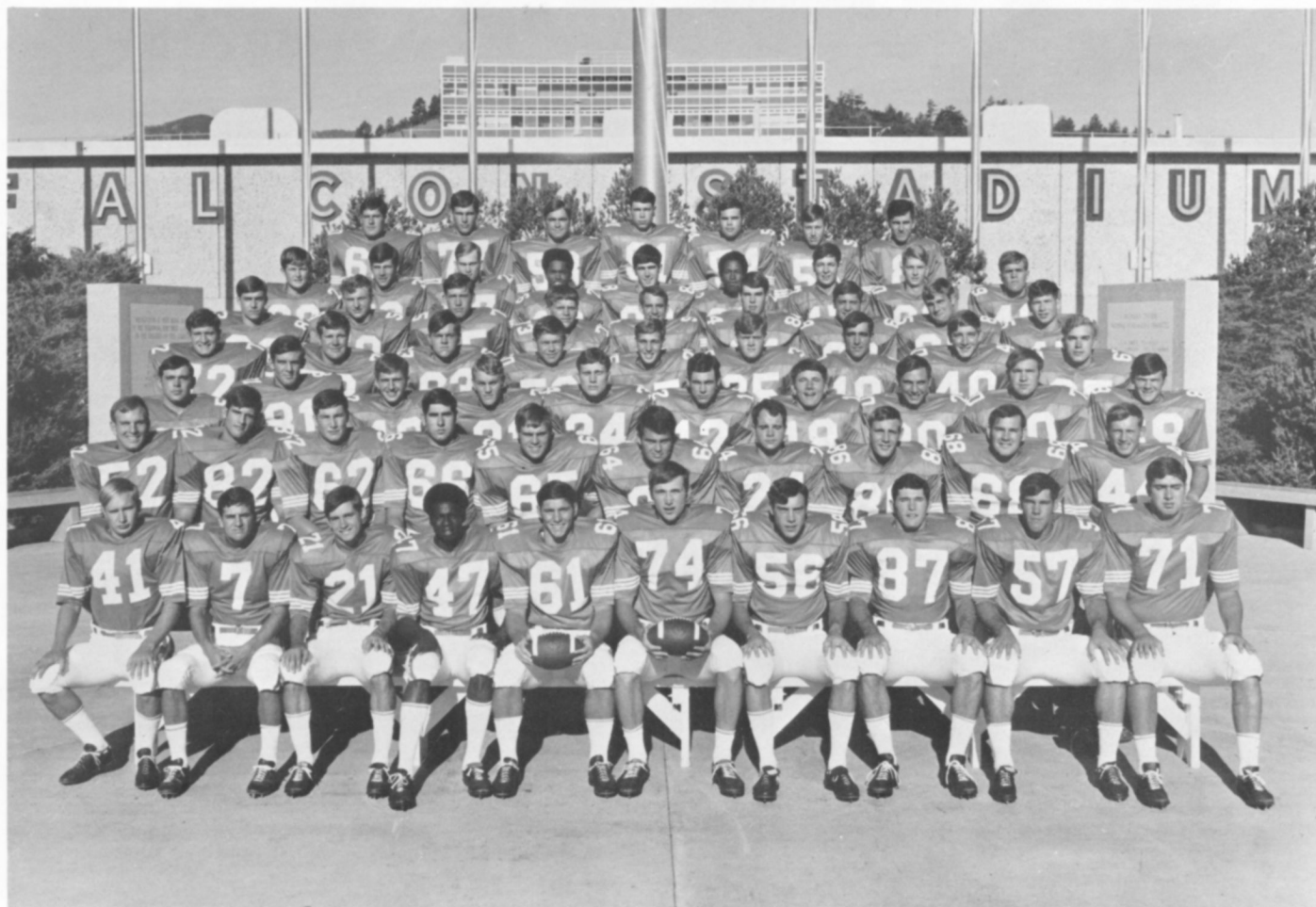

U. S. Naval Academy

The U.S. Naval Academy began 129 years ago under the strong influence of George Bancroft, Secretary of the Navy in 1845, and the growing importance of the steam engine for naval power. In 1845 Commander Franklin Buchanan, who was later to command the Confederate Navy at Mobile Bay, was named the first superintendent, 50 midshipmen were selected, seven professors were recruited and the new Naval School on the Severn quietly got underway.

The Naval School was formally designated the United States Naval Academy in 1851. Also in this year a four-year course of study replaced the first curriculum that had called for one year of study, three years of sea and a final year at Annapolis. At-sea training with the fleet during the summers replaced the years previously spent at sea.

The Civil War interrupted life at the Academy. Midshipmen were moved from Annapolis to an estate in Newport, R.I. and plebes were housed on the Frigate Constitution anchored in Newport harbor. Meanwhile the buildings at Annapolis were used to treat the wounded from the battlefields of Virginia.

It was perhaps after the Civil War that the Naval Academy began steering a course that has made it the top professional naval school on earth today. In 1865, under the leadership of Admiral David Dixon Porter, the curriculum was updated, young officers were brought in as instructors, the grounds were cleaned up, new buildings went up and for the first time social and athletic diversions became an important part of life at Annapolis.

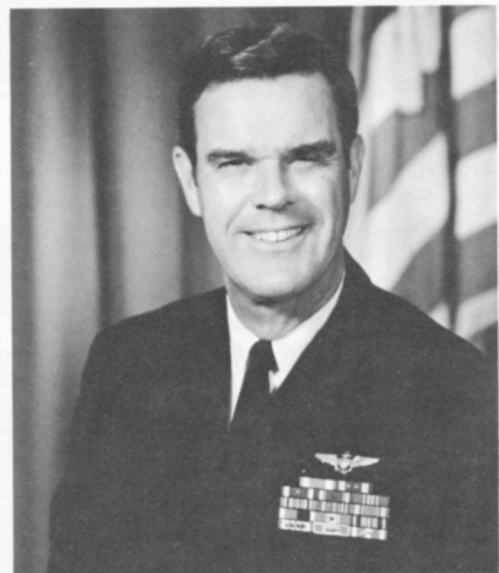
News events that have become traditions were logged in at the Naval Academy in the years after the Civil War and just before and after the turn of the century. June Week was introduced under Porter, Navy met Army in 1890 to win the first game of the annual football classic, and "Anchors Aweigh" was sung for the first time in 1906. It was immediately adopted as the Navy fight song.

Hard-Running Back

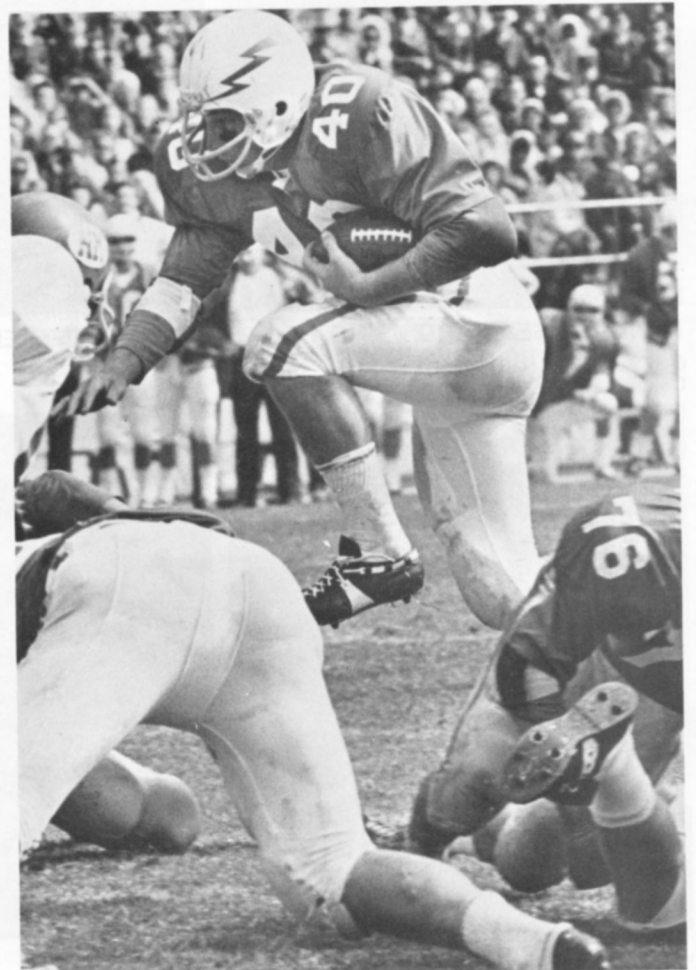

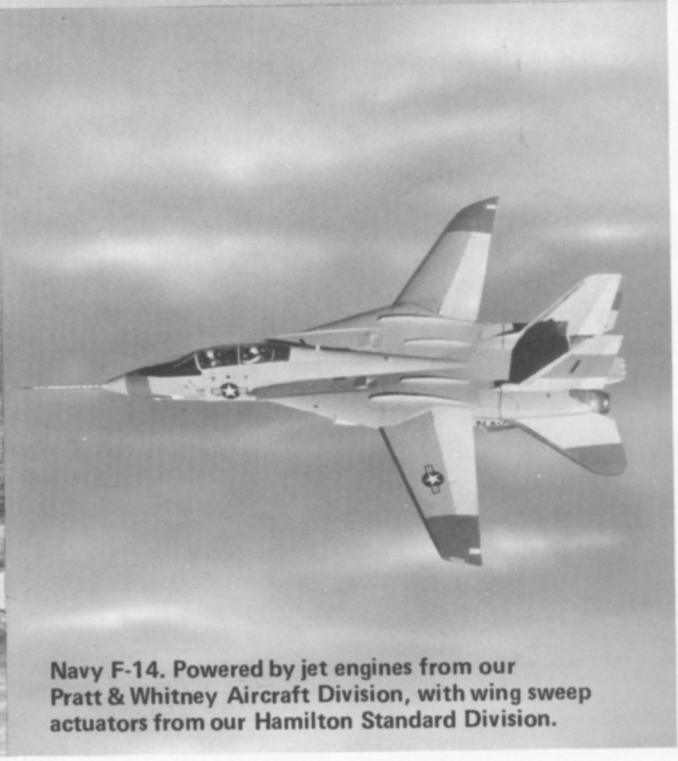

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COMMANDER IN CHIEF'S TROPHY

An exciting new element has been added to the annual interservice football rivalry. A rotating trophy, sponsored by the alumni associations of three service academies (Air Force, Navy and Army) will be presented each year to the academy with the best win-loss record in the interservice competition.

The large gleaming trophy is called the Commander in Chief's Trophy, named in honor of the President as the Commander in Chief of the U. S. Armed Forces. The first presentation took place at Annapolis during the Superintendent's Conference in 1972. West Point, by virtue of its victories over both Navy and the Air Force in 1972, kept the trophy for one season. In 1973, it was Navy that claimed the three-sided trophy for wins over Air Force and Army.

The idea for the establishment of an interservice football trophy originated with the late General George B. Simler, Commander of the Air Training Command. Viewing the 1972 football season as an appropriate time to consider the

creation of a trophy since the campaign marked the first year of the round robin competition between the service academies, General Simler proposed the idea to the USAFA Association of Graduates in early 1972. The Association in turn proposed the project to the alumni associations of West Point and Annapolis as suitable for joint sponsorship by the three organizations. Following formal adoption of the project, designs for the trophy were sought from trophy manufacturers.

The present Commander in Chief Trophy is three-sided, stands two-and-one half feet tall and weighs approximately 170 pounds. The trophy is engraved with the seal of each Academy and displays a sculptured model of the mascot of each school (a mule for Army, a goat for Navy, and a falcon for Air Force). The year in which the trophy is won is engraved on a plate on the appropriate Academy side of the trophy. In the event there is no clear winner in a particular year, the trophy will remain with the winner of the previous year's competition.

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

Academy Swimming Coach In Pleasant Rut

Lieutenant Colonel Paul F. Arata is in a rut.

It's a nice rut, however, because it's a winning one.

For starters, the Air Force Academy head swimming coach has 114 wins in nine seasons as either a head or junior varsity swim coach.

The native of Lancaster, Pa., however, can recall earlier days in the sport when he began to develop that winning feeling.

One of his first ventures came at age six competing in Y.M.C.A. meets. The setting for a meet then was quite unlike the modern surroundings at the Academy.

"I can recall weekend 'Y' meets where there were no marked swimming lanes," Colonel Arata said, "and also outdoor meets where the boundaries were marked off by wooden bulkheads with nothing but a strand of bare lightbulbs to light the race."

Even back then, though, the idea of winning was common. Through age 20 he had captured nine state (Pennsylvania) Y.M.C.A. championships in the individual medley (IM) and freestyle events and also was a national title holder in the 1,500-meter freestyle competition.

Swimming Gems

With these swimming gems in the bag, he enrolled at North Carolina State University where he was a finalist in 12 national championship events. For this work as a Wolfpack swimmer, Colonel Arata earned two All-America honors in the butterfly events.

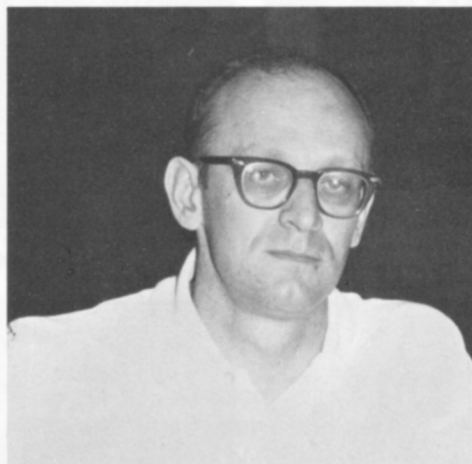
His winning tradition continued after graduation as a coach of the NC State frosh team which under his guidance posted a perfect (7-0) record his first season.

Colonel Arata was first assigned to the Academy in 1963 and worked with intramural teams. His first coaching job here came in 1965 as junior varsity coach. His JV teams compiled an outstanding 28-1 mark. In just seven seasons as the head swimming mentor, his Falcon swimmers have totaled 86 wins and only 9 losses. Four of his varsity teams have had undefeated seasons, including the last two. His teams also have a current win streak of 22 straight dual meets and have an amazing 50-straight home meet streak going back to his first season as head coach in 1967, when a strong University of Denver team nipped the Falcons by two points. (Air Force swims against Denver this season in the Falcon pool on Jan. 27.)

Has this consistency been all psychological as some believe the sport of swimming is?

Colonel Arata chuckled and said, "Well, we have a sign in our pool at the Academy which says, 'No Air', and that might help."

This sign refers to the high altitude at the Academy.

He added, what success he has had at the Academy has come from these traits used by the Academy swimmers.

Competition On Team Great

"The competition is so great on the team, and with their personal pride, if a swimmer lets up or relaxes for a week, somebody is going to take his place," he explained. "Anyone who makes the varsity team, and then gets sent back to the junior varsity team really puts out in his next performance to make it back to the number one squad."

One important factor mentioned by Arata was shaving down, "which means shaving off all arm, chest and leg hair before competing."

"We do it here to win," he said, "and most teams do it once or twice during the season was a psychological edge because hair attracts small particles of oxygen which can slow you down."

Sport Of Inches

Colonel Arata pointed out that swimming is truly a sport of inches.

"Swimming has to be right up there at the top," he said, "Today there is a very small fraction of time between the number one swimmer in a race and the number eight man. For that matter," he continued, "in this country there really isn't that great a difference in the performance of someone like Mark Spitz and say the 25th best swimmer in the nation. Sometimes in a meet you might win by 60 points, but what happens if your swimmers come in first by only the distance of a finger in the races? Does that mean you are really 60 points better than an opponent?"

In all, the tradition of winning should be continuing for Colonel Arata in the near future.

Former Academy Hockey Coach To Join List Of Hockey's Elite

Ice Hockey has been a major part of former Air Force Academy head coach Vic Heyliger's life for close to 40 years. That service will be rewarded Oct. 26 in Eleveth, Minn., at the second annual enshrinement activities of the United States Hockey Hall of Fame.

Heyliger, who guided teams to 369 wins in a coaching career of 33 years, and who coached the Falcon ice hockey squad for seven seasons, will join eight other professional and collegiate ice hockey standouts being honored at the ceremonies.

Besides coaching, Heyliger played professional hockey for three seasons with the Chicago Black Hawks.

His 369 wins rank him third among all collegiate coaches in the nation going into the 1974-75 season, and he had a winning percentage of .675 before retiring last year.

National Recognition

The native of Concord, Mass., coached for four seasons at the University of Illinois but it was at the University of Michigan where he gained national recognition. While there for 13 seasons, his teams captured seven national championships - more than any other team in the history of collegiate hockey.

Heyliger also helped start the N.C.A.A. ice hockey program in 1948, and in 1950 was instrumental in organizing the Western Hockey Tournament held at the Boradmoor World Arena in 1962. In that same year he was named coach of the West German National Team. He also coached the 1962 United States National team that played in the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia.

Also to be inducted into the Hall are former pro players Bill Moe (New York Rangers), Cliff "Fido" Purpur (Chicago Black Hawks, and Detroit Red Wings), and former Chicago Black Hawk players Virgil Johnson and Ves DesJardins.

College Hockey Standouts

From the college ranks, as players, are Ray Chaisson (Boston College) and Doug Everett (Dartmouth), while John "Snooks" Kelley (Boston College) joins Heyliger as new inductees. Kelley through the 1973-74 season, was the wingest coach in collegiate ice hockey history with a record of 501-391-15. Heyliger's record totaled to 369-167-20.

Rounding out the 1974 selectees is Bill Chadwick, of the National Hockey League, who was selected as a referee.

The day's activities will also include a banquet and a college hockey game between the University of Minnesota, the defending N.C.A.A. champion, and the University of Minnesota - Duluth.

Enshrines Trophy

Each of the new enshrinees will be honored with a "pylon" on the main floor of the Hall. The "pylon" contains his biography and photograph on a sloped pedestal from which a piece of plexiglass extends on which is imprinted the member's name. The other principal display complex is found on the second floor where there are areas devoted to hockey as played at the high school/private school, college, amateur, international, and professional levels. There is also an area dealing with the origins of the game and a miscellaneous information gallery on various facets of hockey: coaches, media, and other aspects of the game.

The United States Hockey Hall of Fame is located on Highway 53, 60 miles north of Duluth and is open 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. Sundays during the summer. Winter hours are Monday through Saturday 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Noon - 5 p.m. Sundays.

Football, Jabara Award, Reunion Highlight Weekend Of Activity

Many Air Force Academy alumni are attending today's seventh annual Homecoming game with Navy. The weekend is packed with activities for the graduates and their ladies highlighted by the Tenth Reunion for the Class of 1964.

This morning, graduates participated in a Memorial Ceremony with the Cadet Wing to honor graduates killed during the past year. The ceremony was followed by a coffee and discussion panel made up of six graduates currently stationed at the Academy. Over 400 graduates and wives attended the discussion panel which centered around current policies and trends at the Academy.

Banquet Planned Tonight

Tonight, alumni and their ladies will attend a banquet at which the Seventh annual Jabara Award for Airmanship will be presented. The award, named in memory of Colonel James Jabara, America's first jet ace, is presented to an Academy graduate who distinguishes himself in the field of airmanship. Previous winners of this prestigious award have been Major Donald D. Stevens, '60; Major Terry R. Jorris, '61; Lieutenant Karl W. Richter, '64; Captain Wayne A. Warner, '63; Captain Neil B. Crist, '66; Major Steve Ritchie, '64, and Captain Dale Stovall, '67.

The 1974 Jabara Award will be presented tonight posthumously to Major Robert A. Lodge, '64. Major Lodge distinguished himself between Jan. 1, 1972 and May 10, 1972 as one of the foremost experts on air to air combat tactics in Southeast Asia.

Three MIG Kills

He shot down three North Vietnamese MIG aircraft and supervised the training of the aircrews of the 432nd Tactical Reconnaissance Wing, Udorn Royal Thai Air Base, Thailand, which led to the destruction of many other enemy aircraft. Following completion of his second voluntary tour of combat duty in Southeast Asia, Major Lodge elected to extend his tour six additional months to see through to completion a highly effective air defense system he had originated.

With the resumption of the air bombardment of North Vietnam in April 1972, the Udorn based wing was given the primary responsibility of air superiority, largely because of Major Lodge's contributions and leadership in aerial tactics. His fellow airmen considered him to be the most knowledgeable combat flight leader in fighter operations. Rather than accept the risk of divulging extremely valuable information to the enemy, Major Lodge willingly gave his life for his country on May 10, 1972 in aerial combat over Hanoi, North Vietnam.

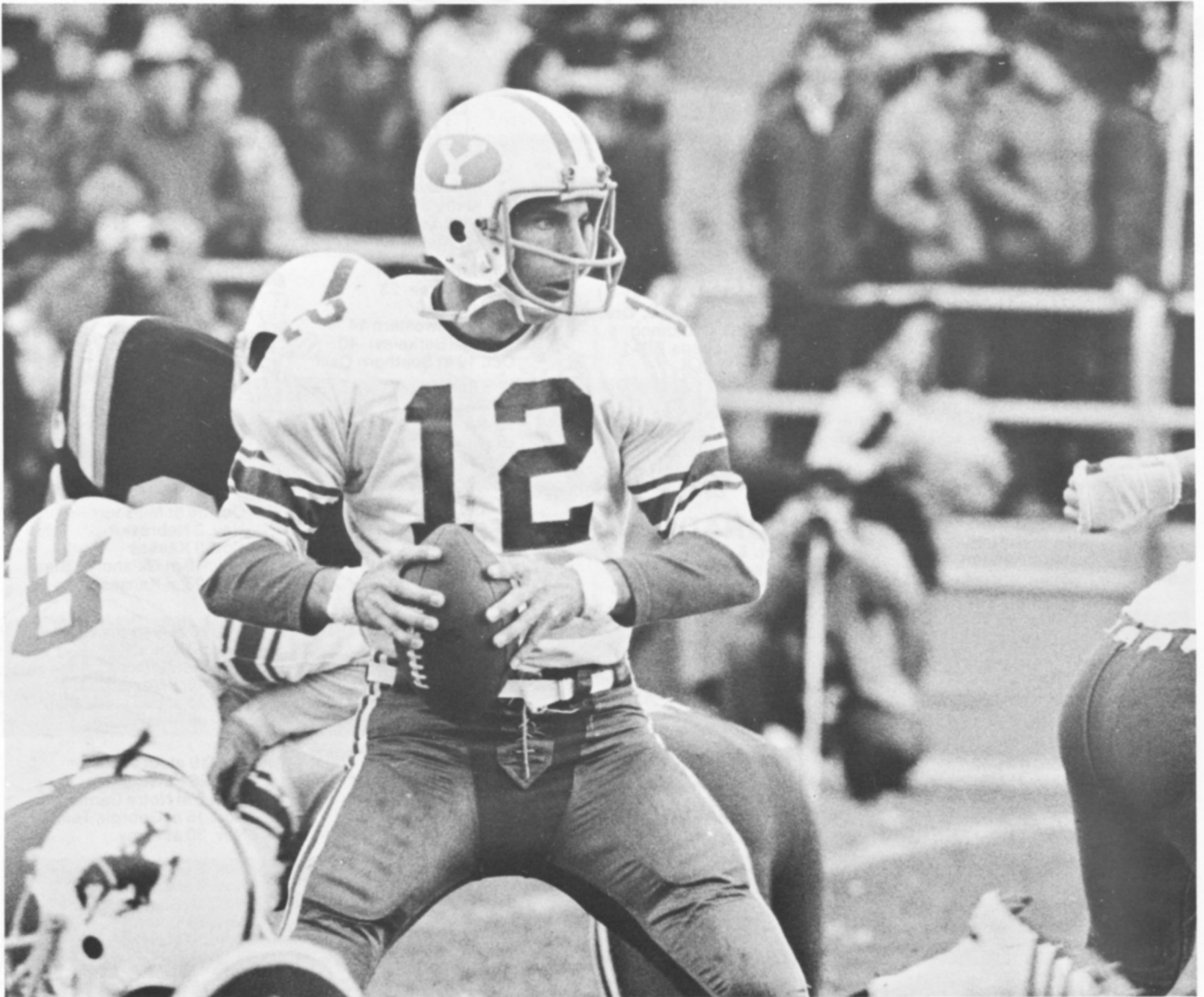

Senior Gary Sheide, from Concord, Calif., has risen from obscurity to a national ranking in a short amount of time. Gary suffered an injury before the 1973 season began, then started to come back strong. The 6-2, 195-pound senior threw only two passes in Brigham Young's first two 1973 starts, but one of those was a 68-yard bomb for a touchdown. Following this he passed for 439 yards against Iowa State, but his best game last

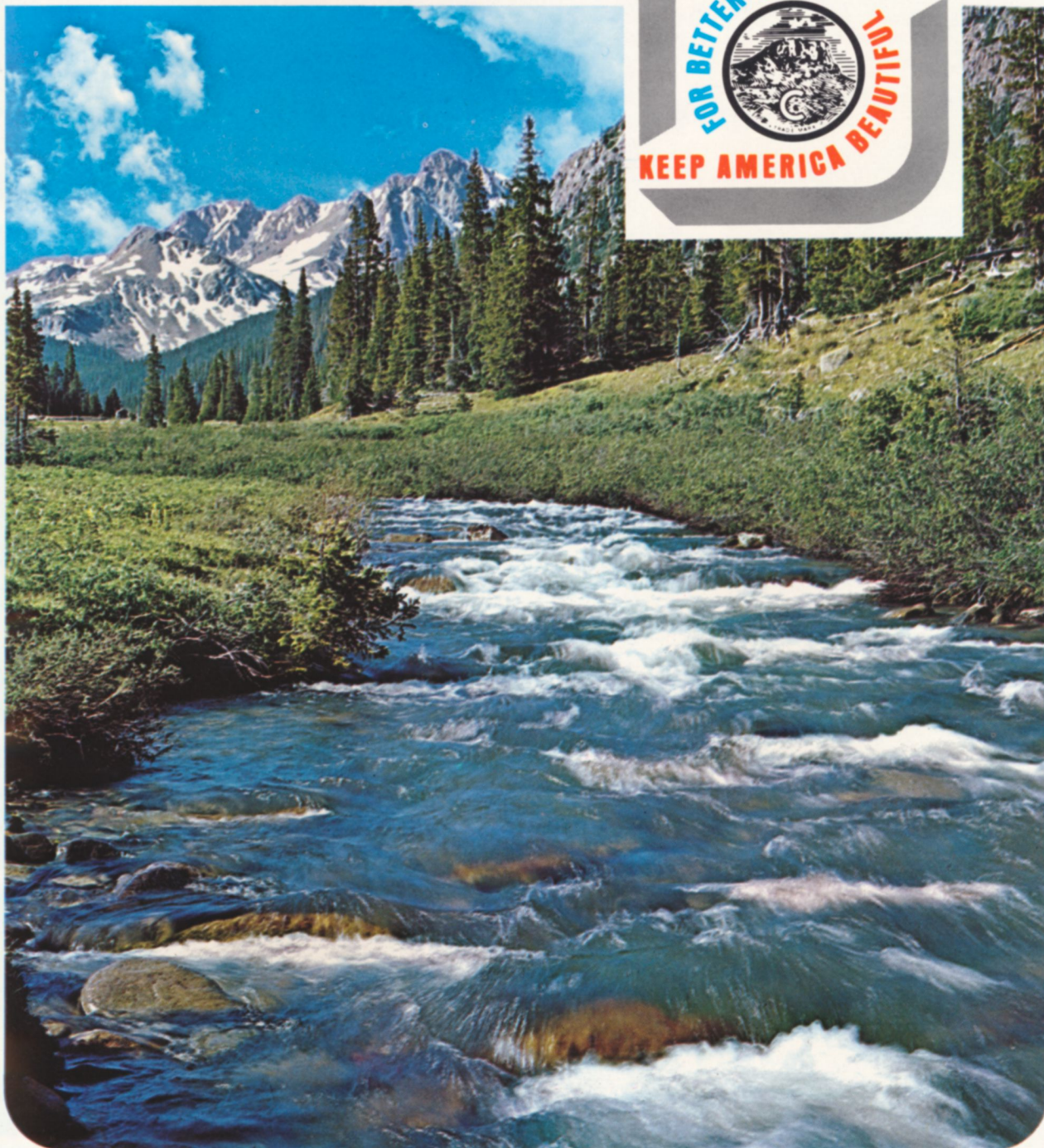
year was against New Mexico, in which he passed for six touchdowns and 408 yards. He finished the season as the number two passer in the nation (17.7 completions) and was third in the U. S. in total offense (234.3 yards per game). Judged as having the finest passing arm in Brigham Young's school history, Gary also attended Diablo Valley Junior College and Antioch High School in California before coming to BYU.
