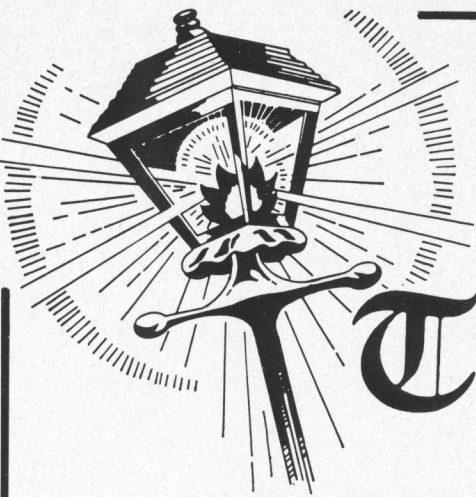


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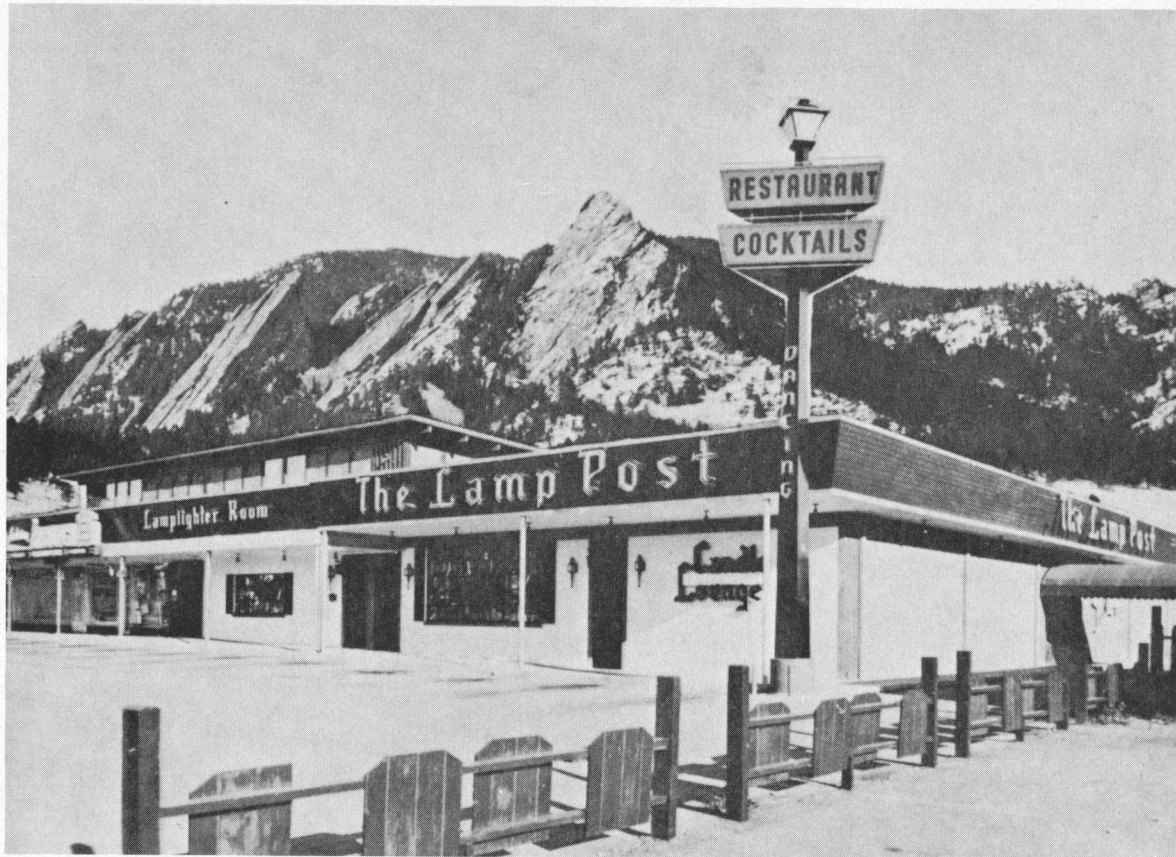

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BUFF ZUMBACH LIKES HITTING

When the ballots for All-Big 8 Conference honors are being pondered, the name of Colorado's offensive tackle Jake Zumbach is one that will come to mind quickly . . . not because it starts with a "Z," but because he's one heck of a football player.

The 6-3, 240-pound junior out of Binghamton, New York, by way of Nassau (N.Y.) JC has had all his best moments against the biggies on the rugged CU schedule. He's had grades against LSU (93%), Nebraska (86%), Oklahoma (87%) and Ohio State (84%) to back that up.

The big blond's aggressive in-fighting and "will-breaker" blocks downfield have helped super-soph tailback Charlie Davis well on his way to that 1,000-yard season, plus some vicious knockdowns on Cliff Branch punt returns that have sent would-be tacklers flying head over heels.

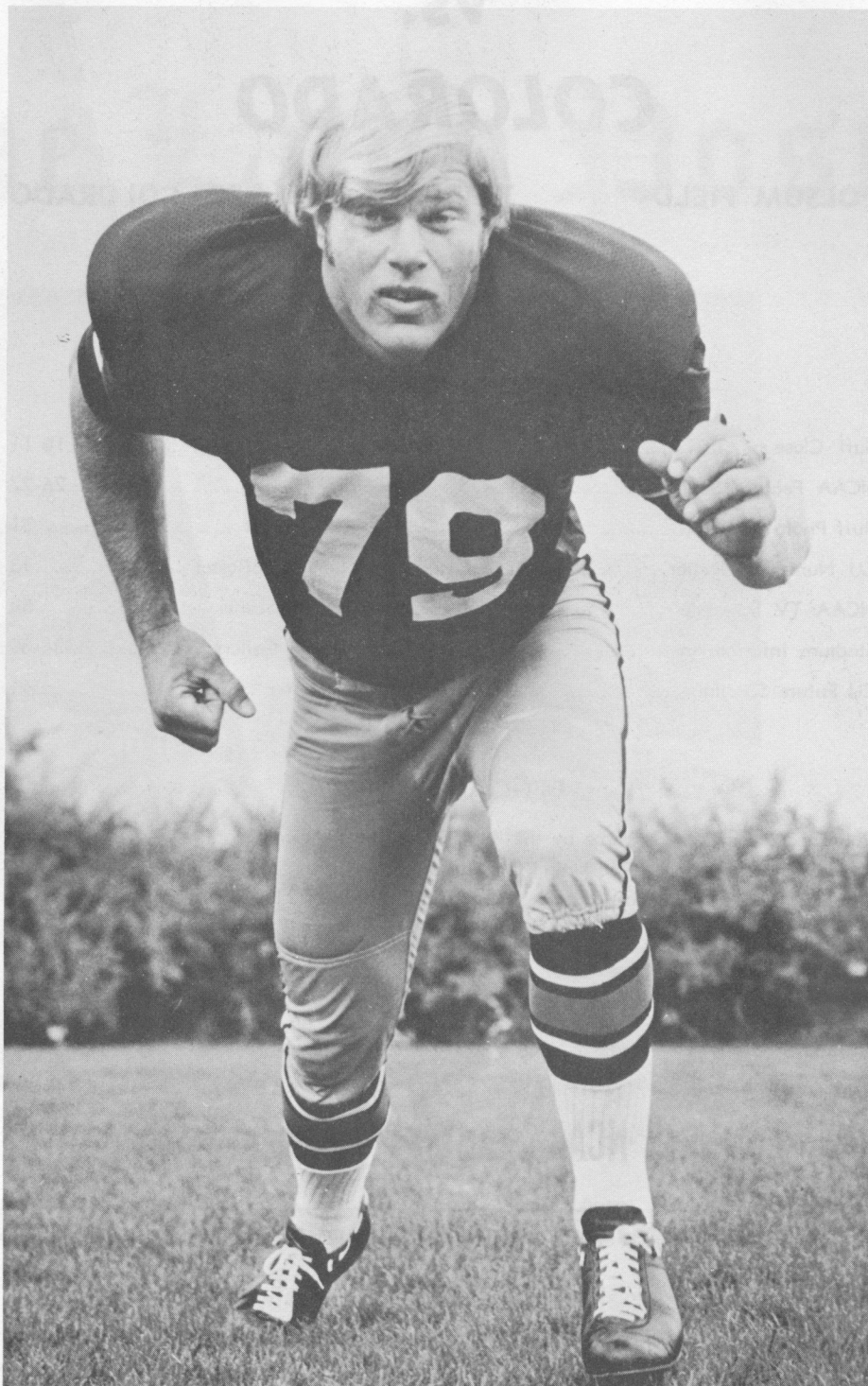
"He's one of the best offensive line prospects we have had," says line coach Augie Tammariello of his blue-chipper. "He's aggressive, a solid hitter, and he wants to knock people down, and then get up and do it again. I think he's the best in the league this year."

Zumbach (say it Zum-back) chose CU over a host of biggies like USC, Penn State, Stanford and others after a great two-year career at Nassau that saw him make the NJCAA All-American team twice and lead his team into the Silver Bowl at Hutchinson, Kansas, in 1969, and to the El Toro Bowl at Yuma, Arizona, last year. It was in these two Junior College post-season games that he attracted a lot of attention and where CU's assistant coach Rick Duval began to recruit him.

"I really liked Colorado because of the big-time schedule it plays," says the New Yorker who prepped at Binghamton North. "It makes me feel like we are playing the best. I was skeptical about the Big Eight being the best at first, but not now. I think it is far and away the best."

Zumbach wasn't that big a deal out of high school despite drawing interest from Eastern colleges and some ACC schools. But he wanted to play in the West and so he enrolled at Nassau in hopes of getting seasoning and development to attract bigger schools and it worked.

Playing tackle this year has been a Jekyll and Hyde proposition for Zumbach and his mates. The yards came easy in the first part of the year with the triple option, but when CU opponents started jamming up the option pitch, the yards had to be blasted out inside, and that's what Zumbach likes.



"I guess it's getting tougher each week, but we're getting better at it," he says. "When you have blocking backs like Tarver and Matthews, who are also great runners, you can really make some holes."

Zumbach specializes in getting up after one block and getting downfield to get another lick in. He's so good at it, in fact,

that he's often the big block on long runs at the start and finish for CU's swift backs and receivers.

He's a long way from Home in New York, but Jake Zumbach has quickly established himself a warm feeling in the hearts of CU followers with his rugged play this year.

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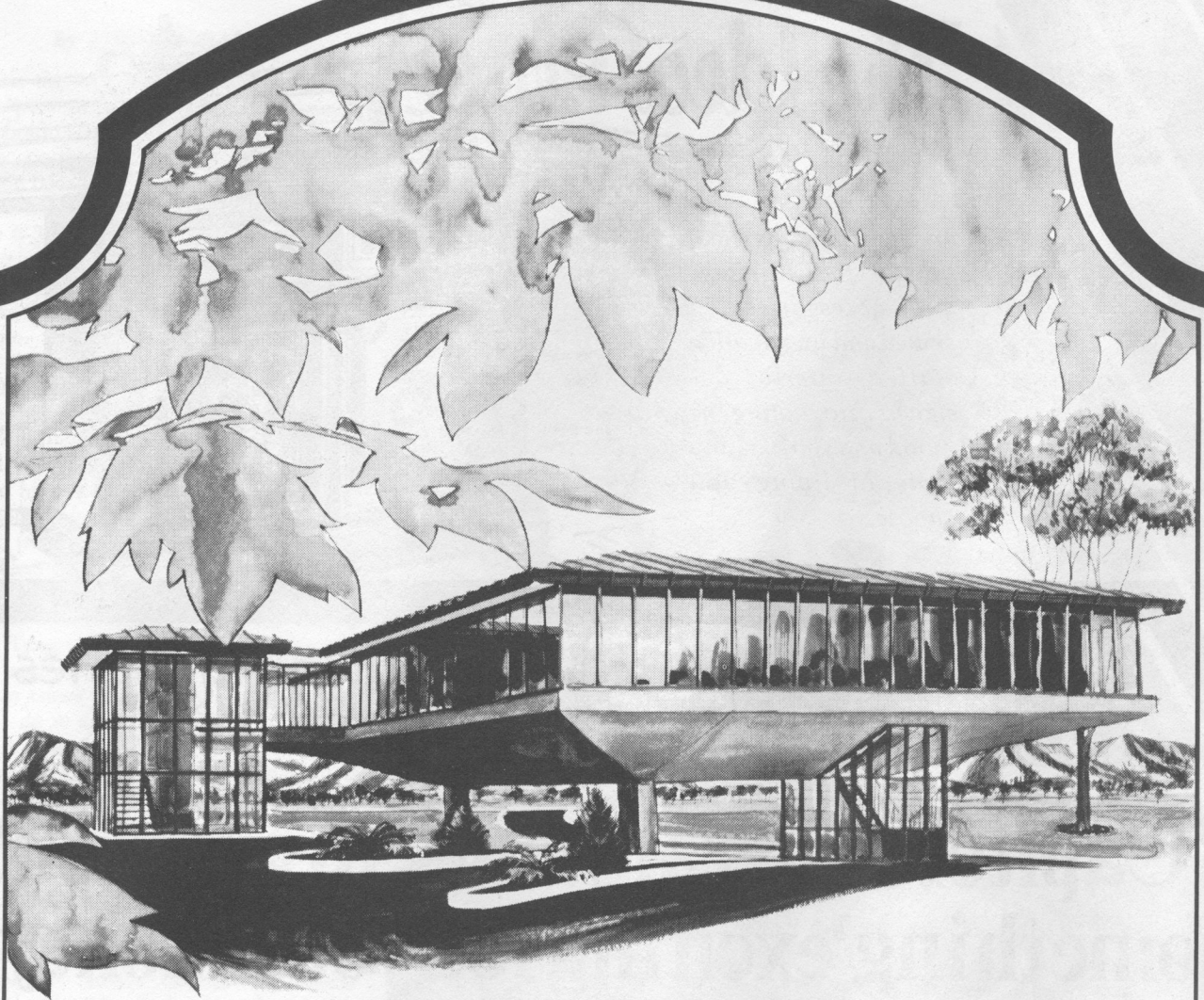
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FANS RALLY TO BLIND CAGER'S AID

Anyone who mistakenly thinks a college athlete is quickly forgotten and neglected when his usefulness is exhausted should hear about James Speed.

Jim came to the University of Iowa in September, 1970, as a highly-publicized junior college basketball star. He had been named to the all-California JC team the two previous seasons at Imperial Valley, averaging 23 points and 20 rebounds a game.

Iowa Coach Dick Schultz planned to have the 6-7, 210-pound native of Shreveport, La., take up some of the slack after losing five players from the top six who swept the Hawkeyes to a 14-0 Big Ten record the previous year.

Less than six weeks after basketball practice began in October, James Speed lay permanently blinded in a hospital room. He had been afflicted with a terribly damaging combination of meningitis and sinusitis.

It was, of course, far worse for Jim's personal life than it was for Iowa's basketball team. He seemed destined for two seasons of stardom at Iowa, then he was counting on a pro career to provide the financial means of pulling him and his family out of an impoverished situation back home in Shreveport.

Sight Gone

With his sight gone and his world tumbling about his head, Jim found Iowans quickly loosen their purse strings the minute their heart strings are touched.

Basketball fans who had never seen this young man play—had never seen him at all—began mailing in checks for the James Speed fund. It mushroomed as organizations all over the state staged benefits in his behalf.

By May 1, 1971, the fund had grown to \$14,300. When the news spread, money also was received from people back home in Shreveport, and from those around El Centro, Calif., who had watched him play JC ball.

Although his illness had no connection with athletics, the University of Iowa picked up the tab for Jim's medical bills. The state of Iowa gave him a free training course at its school for the blind in Des Moines.

When he finished there, he planned to return to the University to finish his education. Iowa promised him his scholarship—room, board, books and tuition—would be continued whenever he chose to use it.

If a man had to have such terrible misfortune, at least he could be thankful he had a coach with as much feeling and thoughtfulness as Schultz. The Schultz family had Jim's mother stay at their home for two months during Jim's illness. They gave him gifts, went to see him, drove him everywhere, catered to his every need.

Round-the-Clock Shifts

Jim's teammates didn't neglect him either. His roommate was Ken Grabinski, junior forward from Clear Lake, Iowa. Ken and the other Hawkeye players arranged around-the-clock shifts to sit with Jim during his feverish illness so he couldn't accidentally harm himself in the hospital.

"It's still amazing how this could happen to Jim," said Schultz. "Iowa City is practically one big medical complex. Yet this illness struck him so swiftly that his sight was gone before doctors could battle it."

Speed complained of a heavy cold the week prior to Thanksgiving. He didn't think it was important to tell the team physician that he had a history of sinus problems, probably because he hadn't been bothered during the two school years he spent at Imperial Valley in the California desert.

An unfortunate coincidence occurred. Last November 27, Jim told his coach, "My teeth are killing me." So Schultz directed him to the university dental clinic, where he had two carious molars removed.

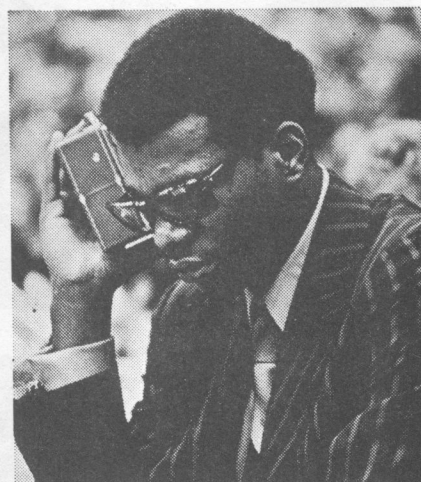
Jim was back watching his teammates practice later in the afternoon. But a few hours later he developed a headache. After a nearly sleepless night, he returned to the dental clinic and received a mild medication for pain. The teeth sockets were healing normally.

That was Saturday, November 28. Next day Schultz went to Chicago for a Big Ten basketball meeting and wasn't able to fly home until Monday. He called to Iowa City Sunday night, however, and learned Speed had phoned Mrs. Schultz to say he could not go to classes Monday because the headaches were worse.

When Schultz got back to Iowa City Monday, he decided to see if the headaches were caused by something more serious than tooth extraction. Dr. W. D. Paul, team physician, immediately sent Jim to the student infirmary.

"Unreal Timetable"

"The timetable of this thing is un-

real," Schultz said. "Jim had only a half-degree of temperature when we checked him into the hospital that afternoon. Yet between midnight and 4:30 the next morning it had leaped to 104."

Experts in ophthalmology and neurology were summoned. They discovered from a spinal tap he had meningitis. But the real culprit was a severe swelling of the ethmoid sinus cavities. His eyes were swelled shut, cutting off the blood supply to the optic nerve.

Not only did this quickly destroy his eyesight, but his very life was endangered because of pressure on the brain. An emergency operation probably saved him from suffering brain damage.

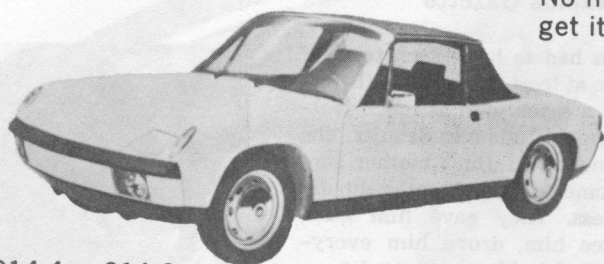
"Once this infection was solidly under way," said Dr. Maurice Van Allen, professor of neurology who headed the team of physicians, "I am of the opinion nothing could have been done to save his sight. The pulling of his teeth had nothing to do with it. This merely was a red herring that delayed finding out what the real problem was."

It must always be a world of darkness for James Speed. If the damage had been to the cornea at the front of the eyeball, there would be the possibility of transplant. But the retinas at the back of his eyeballs were so badly scarred he will never have any useful vision.

Jim isn't alone in his darkness. Big-hearted Iowans and others—sight unseen—have forked over \$14,300 to help this unfortunate young man find a pathway to guide him in the years to come.

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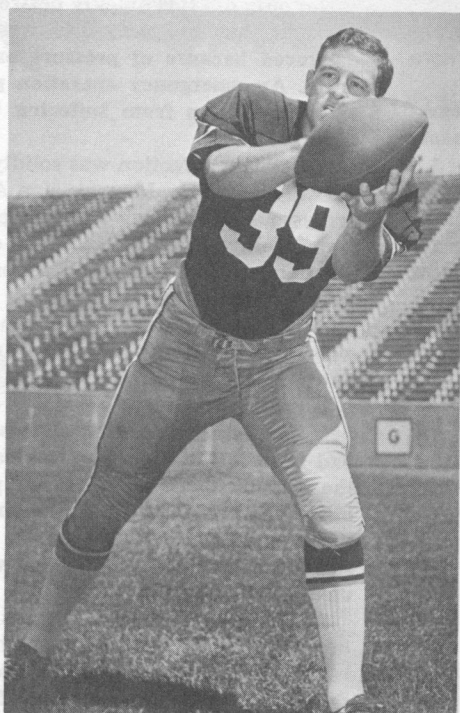
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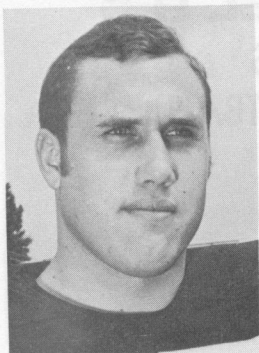
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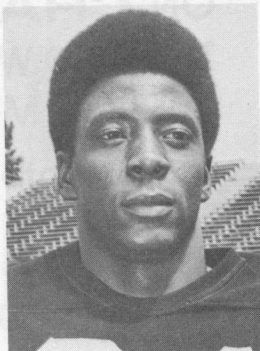
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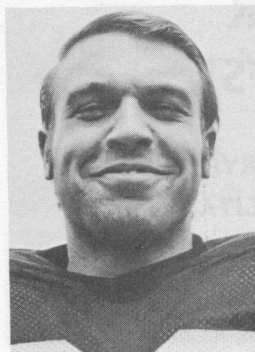
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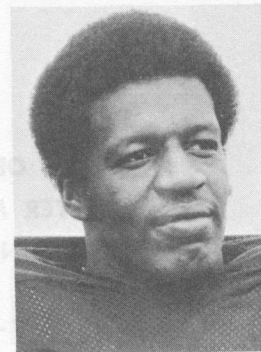
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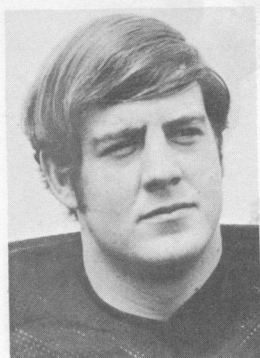
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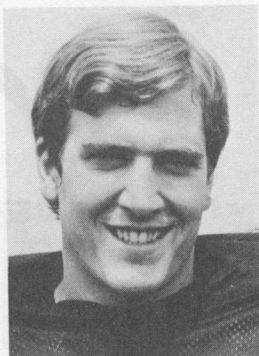
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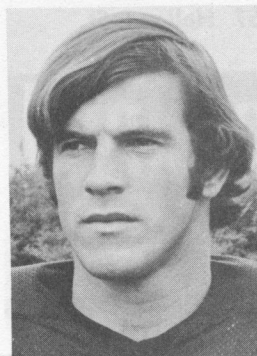
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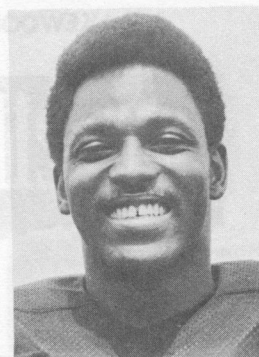
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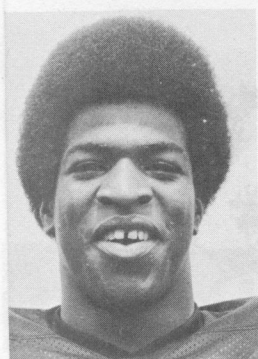
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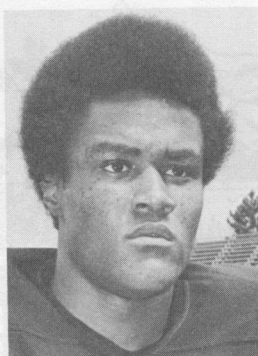
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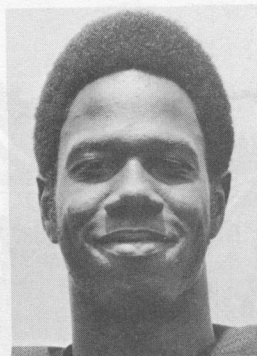
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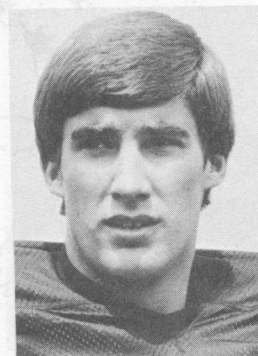
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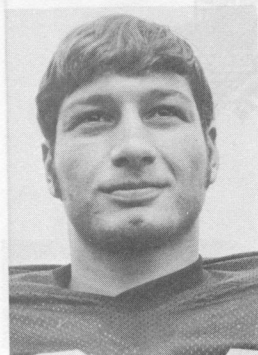
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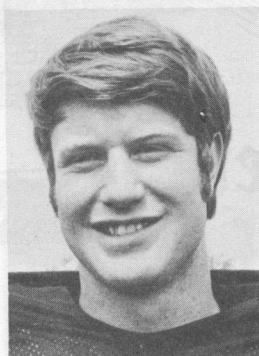
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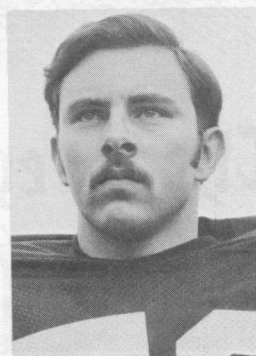
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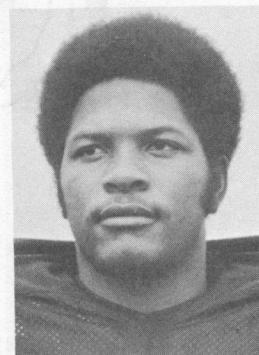
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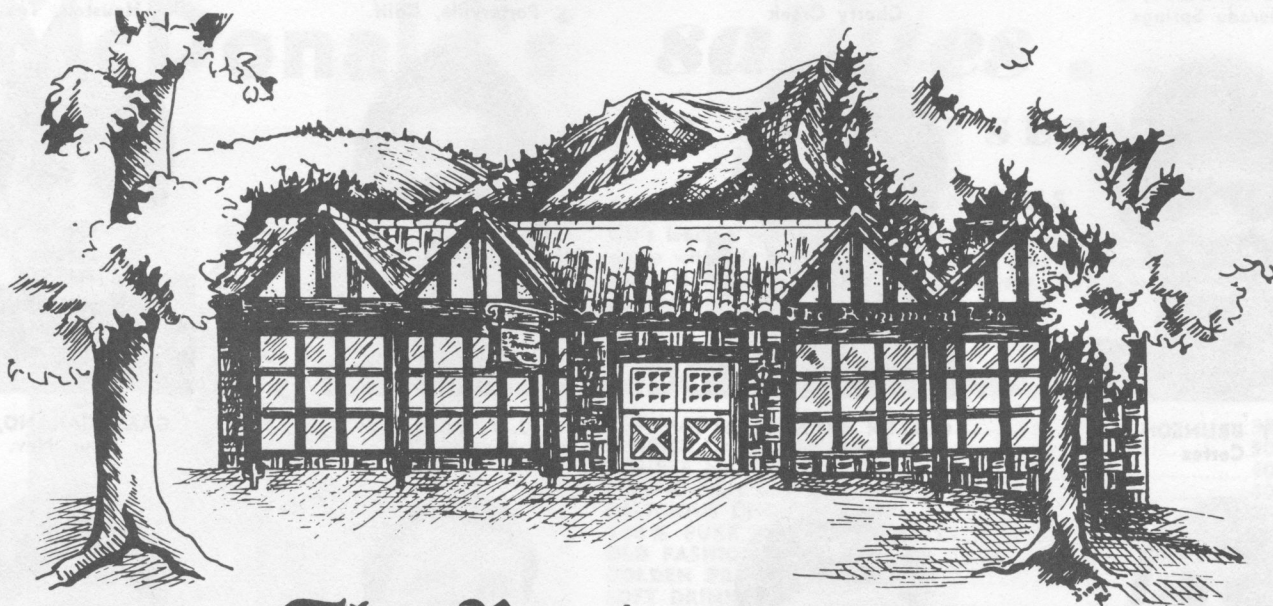
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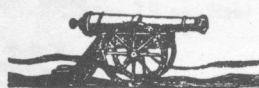
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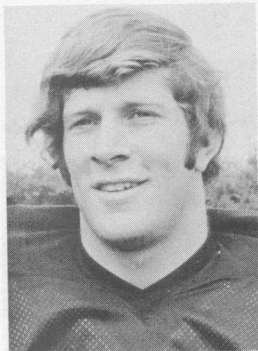
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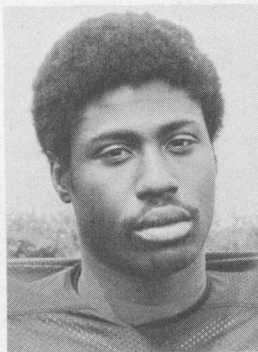
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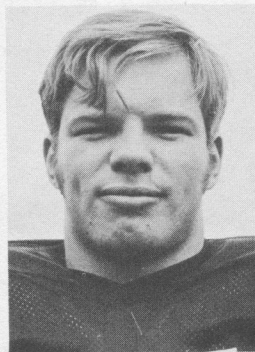
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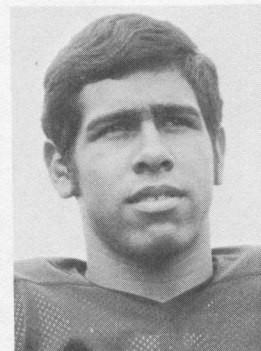
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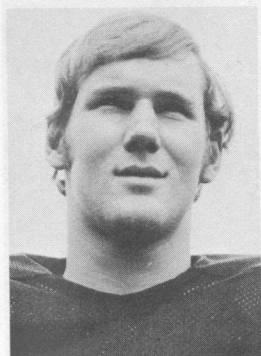
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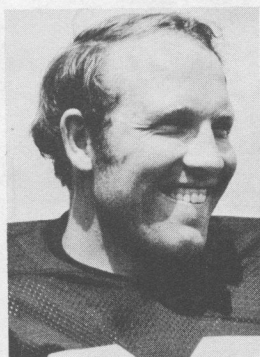
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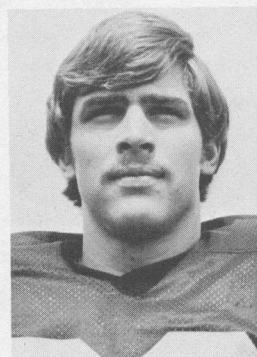
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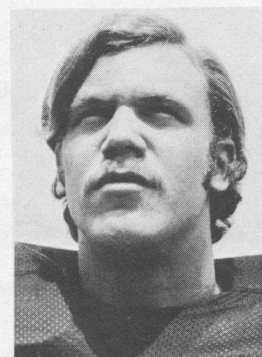
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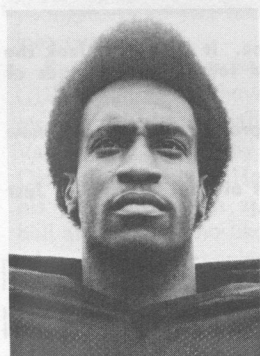
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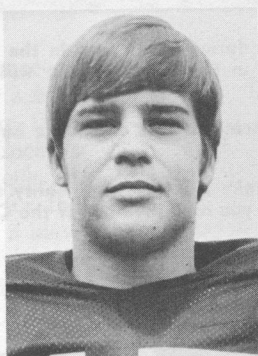
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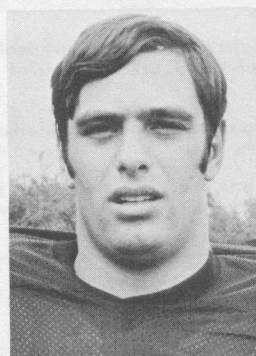
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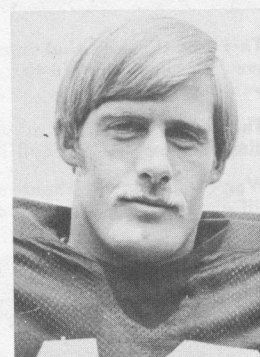
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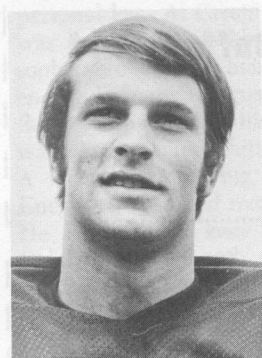
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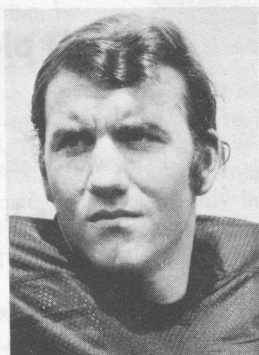
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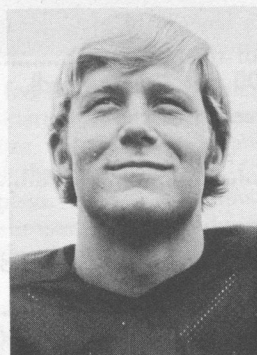
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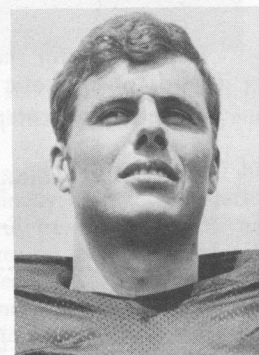
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ROOKIE CIUFO EARNS SPOTLIGHT

Significant segments of the Colorado defense in recent seasons have been, in addition to the bristling movements to the ball, shaved heads, splendid spirit and slogging, swatting Italian Satllions.

Like the original namesake, Rich Variano, the formidable fireplug. And Dave Capra, the silent disposal who ground up every foe and piece of food he ever laid his hands on. And Carl Taibi, the languid latin of the current crew.

Now comes the fourth in the line—sophomore linebacker Len Ciufu, who stepped into a starting job Saturday and performed with Garibaldi-like gusto. So good, in fact, that a good portion of CU's injury-caused problems disappeared quickly in the 40-6 rout of Oklahoma State. LE J. B. Dean missed defensive action because of bruised shoulder. RE John Stavely played only briefly in the early minutes then rested a sore knee the rest of the game. Ciufu moved in for Randy Geist who moved over to Dean's terminal post.

It all worked out well and Ciufu, in particular, sparkled as he made three unassisted tackles, got in on six others, batted down one pass and intercepted another and returned it 10 yards to the OSU six early in teh game. Not a bad log for a youngster who has had to battle his way into contention.

But not a surprising performance to CU's coaches who have developed a solid respect for the swarthy sophomore from Van Nuys, Calif. by way of Encino's Crespi high school. He has good tools for his job—tough with a good nose for the ball and a guy who likes to deliver a blow when he makes contact. Not any great speed or size (6-0, 205 and a 4.8 forty.) but Ciufu (pronounce it "shoe-foe") is smart and agile—important qualities for a line-backer.

Like Geist, the man he replaced Saturday, Ciufu has some quarterback in his personal log. At Crespi high in Encino, he was a QB as a freshman and part of his sophomore year. Then he went to tight end and, finally, to guard on offense. But defense was always his first love and he was always a hard-hitting lineback there. A knee injury during his junior year at Encino necessitated removal of a cartilage. He bruised the knee rather severely at Oklahoma last month and is just now returning to full speed.

Len, naturally, is happy at getting a starting role. It's tough to be a spot player, he explains. Before Saturday, he was the number three backer and spelled both Geist and the other regular Billie Drake.



"You get a much better feel for the game when you're in from the start," says Len. "Going in as a pinch-hitter is tough because you really don't get that feel when you're only in for a few plays."

One of Ciufu's biggest boosters is CU's linebacker coach, Steve Sidwell, himself an All-Big 8 backer for the Buffaloes a few years back.

"Len is the kind of player you like to coach," says Sidwell. "He's tough. Likes to hit people. And he has learned to explode into a runner with great force. He's

smart, too. In fact, he's very much like Geist—a very bright, coachable young man."

Ciufu has a solid future ahead of him now that he's finally cracked the starting barrier. Len will have some countrymen to help him carry on the Italian defensive tradition next year, too. Coming up from the frosh are linebackers Dennis Cimmino and Danny Patrone and halfback Sandy Dorando. So spaghetti and meatballs will continue to be an important part of Colorado's defensive menu.

Lost and found articles—persons finding lost articles should turn them in to the attendant at the press box gate at the entrance to the east bal-

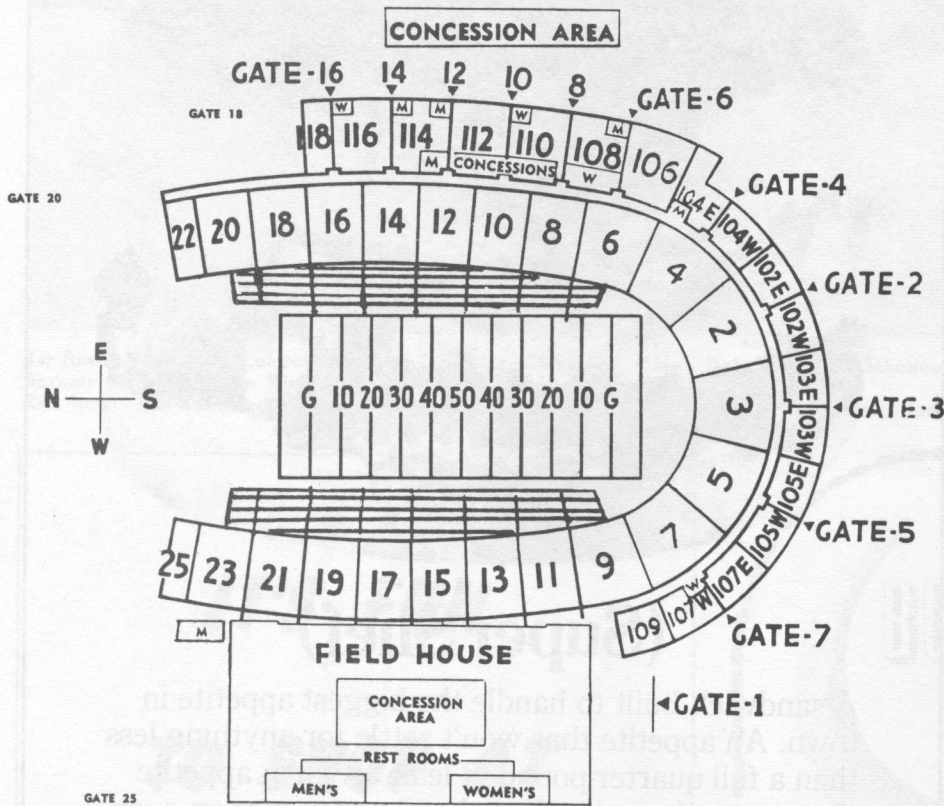

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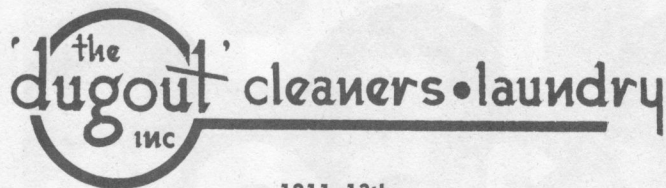
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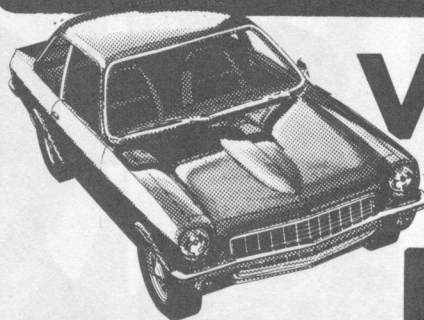


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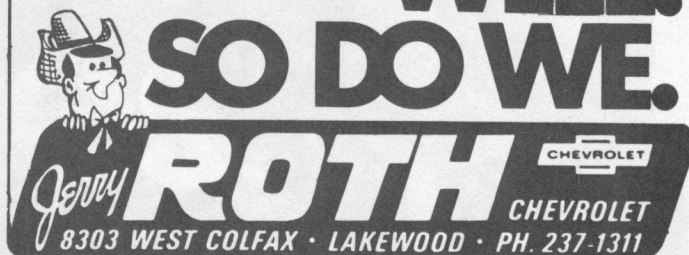
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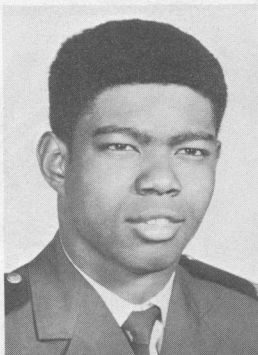
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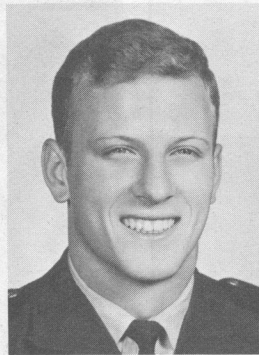
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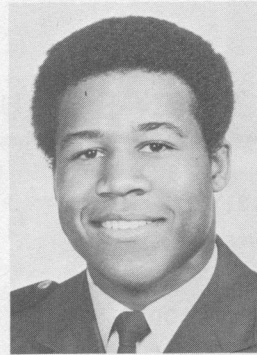
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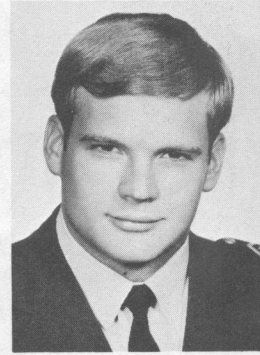
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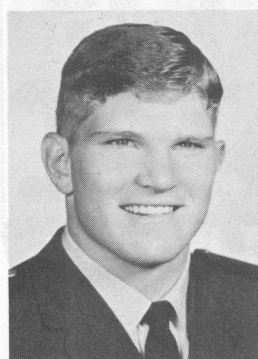
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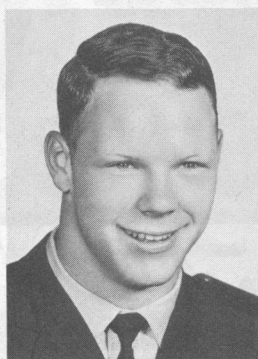
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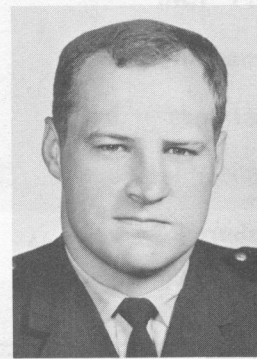
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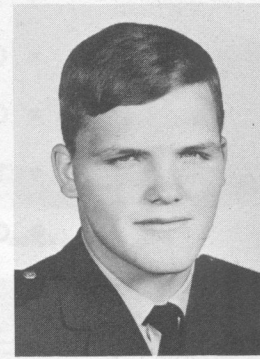
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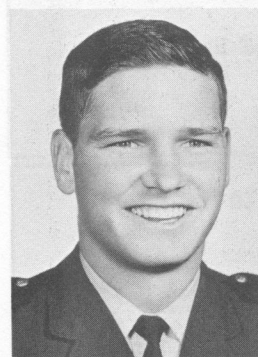
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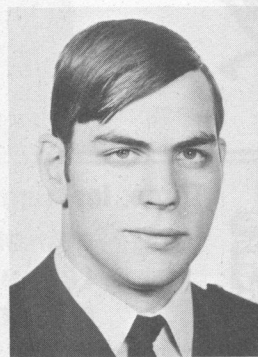
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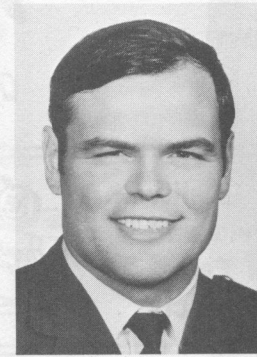
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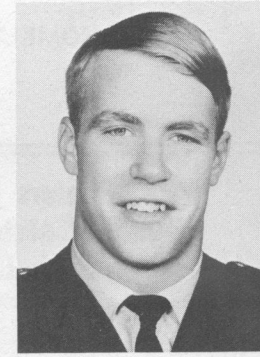
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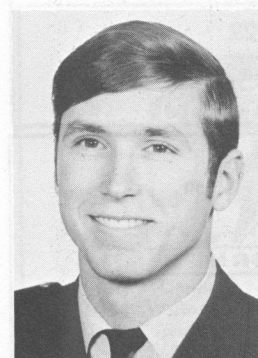
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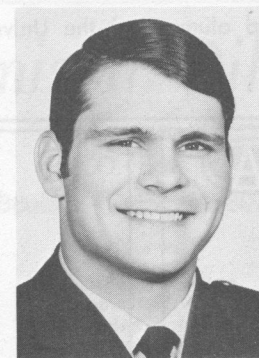
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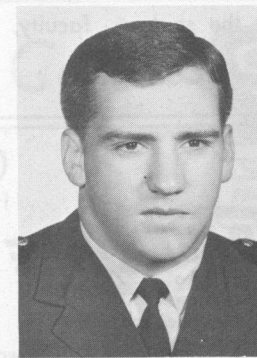
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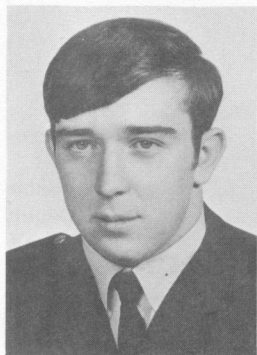
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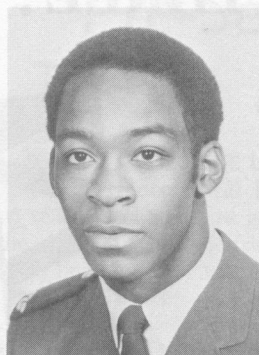
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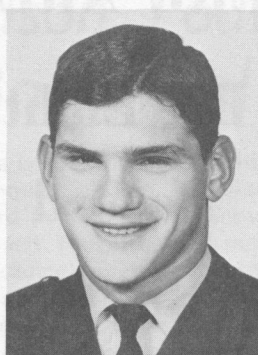
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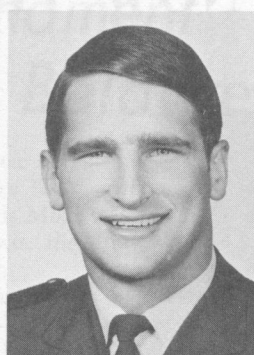
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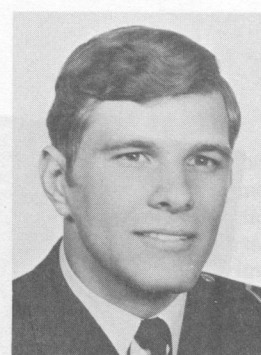
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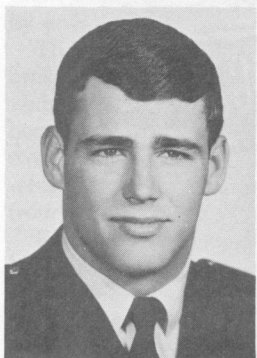
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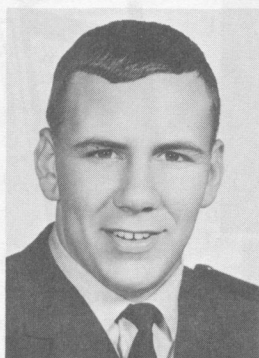
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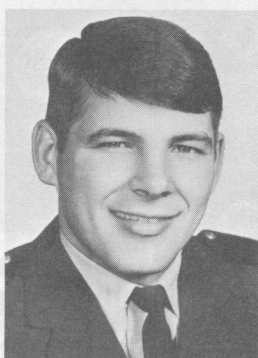
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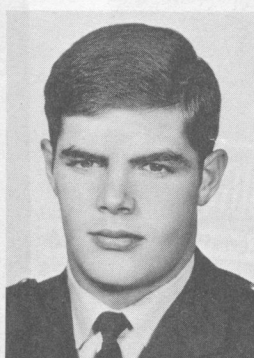
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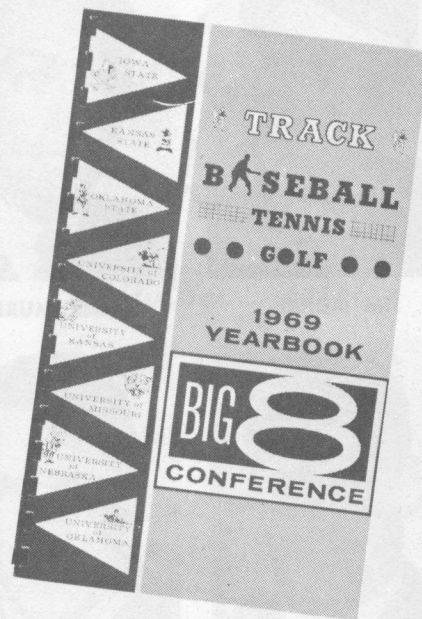
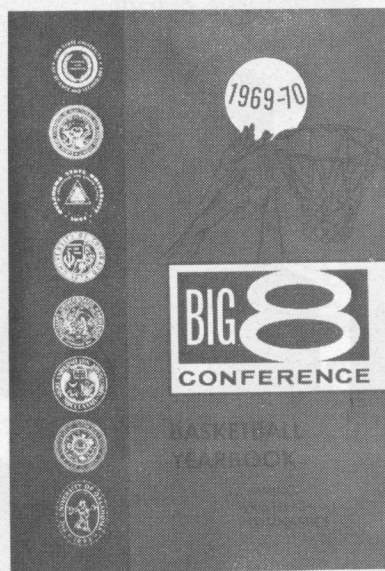
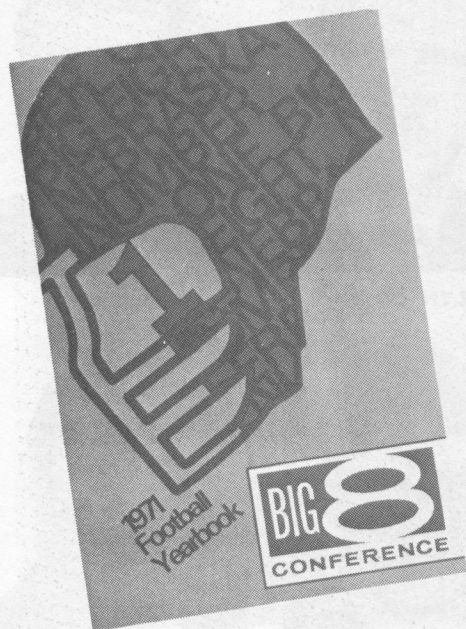
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Pre-Season Tournament To Set Basketball Balance

Regardless of what the final basketball standings in the Big Eight Conference might have reflected last season when Kansas swept through the league, the NCAA regionals, and into the final round of four, there was a great deal of balance throughout.

Kansas, plainly and simply, won the close ones down the stretch—the last four Conference wins for the Jayhawks were by one, two, two, and five points.

That balance of last year which never broke over the surface will be far more visible this season. Two reasons are Oklahoma and Missouri. They were Kansas' two top challengers a year ago and both return four starters and flock of dandies from good freshman teams.

Fourth-place Nebraska has three regulars back, while Kansas State, with two outstanding players from its championship team of two seasons ago numbered among the four returning starters, is almost a certainty to rebound from only its second losing season in 25 campaigns.

Even co-seventh-place finishers Oklahoma State and Iowa State—and particularly the Cyclones—look much improved. The Cowboys return three regulars, while Iowa State has a new coach (the quite successful Maury John), a new enthusiasm, and a number of new faces.

Colorado, like Kansas, did lose three regulars. Colorado's loss includes the Big Eight's all-time leading scorer in Cliff Meely. Kansas is without its entire back line.

Yet, Colorado's Sox Walseth seems to relish this sort of a situation, which is a parallel to three years ago when he guided the Buffs to the title. Kansas' Ted Owens maintains an optimistic air.

First real display of the basketball balance will come, as it has for the past 25 years, with the annual Big Eight Pre-Season Basketball Tournament, December 27-30 in Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium.

Opening tournament play this year will be Oklahoma State and Colorado. The Cowboys, according to Coach Sam Aubrey,

will be a better shooting club this year and will be quicker. The three starters back are guard Jerry Clack, and forwards Mike Jeffries and Tony Kraus. Kraus was the team's leading scorer last campaign.

Colorado has eight returnees from last year, including Jim Creighton, a 6-7 slick-moving centre who has played two seasons in Meely's shadow. Back, too, are Steve Aaker, peppery Bobby Hofman, Marc Teets, and Larry McCoy.

The nightcap on the 27th will have Missouri against Nebraska. Missouri bows into tournament play with four returning starters, including John Brown, Bob Allen, Greg Flaker, and Mike Griffin. Both Brown and Allen averaged in double figures and Brown gained extra experience as a member of an Olympic development team this summer. Part-time starter Bill Foster also returns to Norm Stewart's fold.

Chuck Jura (6-10), Al Nissen, and Mike Peterson (6-8) are all Big Eight tested seniors for Coach Joe Cipriano at Nebraska, where replacements have to be found for the top scorer and rebounder. Also around are Tony Riehl and Tom Gregory, who saw plenty of relief duty last year.

Tipping off first on the 28th will be defending champion Kansas against revamped Iowa State. The Jayhawks of Ted Owens can point to Bud Stallworth, a two-year regular, and Aubrey Nash as returning starters. Bob Kivisto was last year's sixth man and Randy Canfield (6-9) came back strong from illness. This nucleus lets Owens go into the season with an air of optimism, despite the loss of the top three rebounders and two of the team's best scorers.

Though four starters do return at Iowa State, it is almost a certainty that this year's Cyclones will take on a new look. First, there will be the Maury John version of the fast break and the harrassing "belly-button" defense. Three transfers, including a seven-footer (Tom O'Connor), join veterans led by Gene Mack, who ranks as the highest-scoring guard in Iowa State history.

Closing out first-round action could be

one of the great tests in tournament history when Kansas State challenges Oklahoma. Basketball tradition at Kansas State dictates optimism and six who have started at one time or another do return, including Steve Mitchell (6-10), Ernie Kusnyer, David Hall, Jack Thomas, Lindburgh White, and Bob Zender. Mitchell topped the team in scoring last year, while Hall was the rebounding leader.

There is no doubt that John MacLeod has turned around Sooner basketball fortunes, leading the Oklahomans to the NIT the last two years. He has four starters on hand, including Bobby Jack, the team's top scorer, and Scott Martin, already recognized as one of the all-time leading Big Eight guards. John Yule and Andrew Pettes round out the starting corps returning.

And, as in the past, a full slate of 10 games to be televised over a Big Eight network of stations will allow Big Eight fans to become even more closely associated with the anticipated tight race.

This year the series will open with Colorado at Nebraska on January 15 and close on March 11 with Oklahoma at Missouri.

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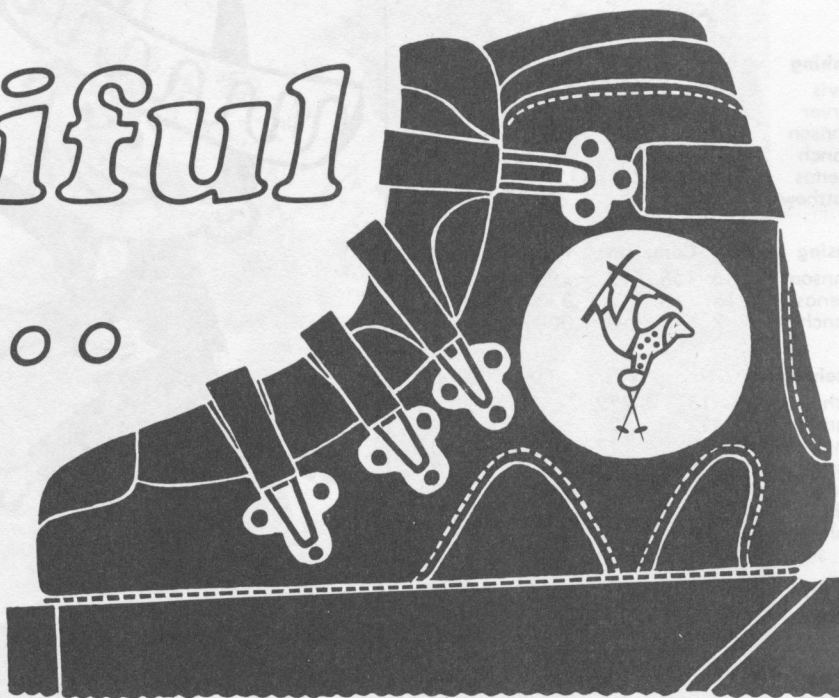
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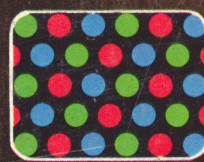
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
