



EX-FALCON GRIDDER BECOMES

Captain Richard S. Ritchie, a 1964 graduate of the United States Air Force Academy and two-year football letterman, became the first of two Air Force aces of the war in Southeast Asia on the 28th of August of this year. Captain Chuck DeBellevue became the first Air Force navigator ace less than two weeks later on the 10th of September. Within two weeks the Air Force had two aces in Vietnam. Captain Ritchie also became the first U.S. crewman to destroy five MIG-21 aircraft in Southeast Asia.

According to Captain Ritchie his record-breaking feat

followed a spectacular air to air engagement as he and his then backseater Captain DeBellevue were flying some 30 miles west of Hanoi. When Captain Ritchie received information on enemy aircraft threatening an F-4 strike force, they moved into the area.

According to the reports, Captain DeBellevue picked up the enemy aircraft on radar and the Americans made a turn to meet them straight on. Captain Ritchie released two missiles at the enemy jets as they were positioned some 4,000 feet above his Phantom, and he climbed up to get at them. The communist jets turned off and avoided the

missiles by making a right hand turn. As they did Captain Ritchie let go with two more air to air units.

Ritchie said "the MIG was pretty far away and it took awhile for the missiles to catch up. The MIG went into a light overcast and as he zoomed out, one of the missiles went by him. Apparently the enemy pilot saw the missile on his left side and immediately broke off to the right and that's when the last missile caught him."

Captain Ritchie was flying his 338th combat mission when he knocked off his fifth MIG.

"It was a tremendous effort by the entire flight and I couldn't go up there as a single ship and have any success in downing MIGs. It's a team effort . . . Chuck (Captain DeBellevue) and I and our wingmen working as a team. And the ground crews. There is no way we could have done it without them."

Captain Ritchie also pointed out that the plane he was flying at the time of the engagement with the MIG was the same aircraft that was used in four previous MIG downings and Captain Ritchie was flying the Phantom when he got his first MIG.

Captain Ritchie had been assigned as an F-4 pilot with the 555th Tactical Fighter Squadron of the 432nd Tactical Reconnaissance Wing since January 20th, 1972. He is no longer on combat flying status in Southeast Asia.

While at the Air Force Academy, from which he received a bachelor of science degree, Captain Ritchie lettered two years in football, participated for one year in track and also participated one year on the golf team. He was a two-year starter as a defensive back and played on the Falcons' 1963 Gator Bowl team.

The 30-year-old flyer from Reidsville, N.C., began pilot training in August of 1964 at Laredo AFB, Tex. Upon receiving his wings, Captain Ritchie obtained combat crew training at Eglin AFB and Homestead AFB, Fla.

In 1968, Captain Ritchie served as an F-4 pilot at Danang Air Base, in the Republic of Vietnam. After that he returned to the United States where he was a fighter weapons instructor at Nellis AFB, Nev.

Returning to his second tour of Southeast Asia, Captain Ritchie was assigned to the 432nd TRW, against flying F-4s. During the tour he also served as a wing weapons officer.

Captain Ritchie was credited with shooting down his first MIG on the 10th of May, 1972. On the 31st of May, he painted the insignia of another on his plane. Again in July, on the 8th, Captain Ritchie was twice more the victor. Thirty-six days later, on the 28th of August, Captain Ritchie got number five and became the Air Force's first ace since the Korean War.

He was presented the Air Force's second highest award, the Air Force Cross, at Tan Son Nhut AB, Republic of Vietnam, Sept. 9, by Gen. John W. Vogt, Seventh Air Force commander.

The fighter ace was also awarded the Silver Star with three Oak Leaf Clusters (equivalent to 4 Silver Stars) and the Distinguished Flying Cross, second through ninth OLCs.

Like Captain Ritchie, 27-year-old Captain DeBellevue

is assigned to the 432nd TRW in Southeast Asia and on the 10th of September of this year became the first Air Force navigator ace getting two enemy MIG 19s.

Captain DeBellevue was weapons systems operator for Captain John M. Madden, Jr., aircraft commander, when they caught up with the MIG-19s.

The victories were the fifth and sixth for Captain DeBellevue. According to pilot Madden and DeBellevue they were lying cover for F-4 strike missions when they were alerted to MIGs heading their way after threatening a U.S. strike force about 50 miles away.

Captain Madden said after "we knew the enemy jets would be returning to land and we just sat back and waited for them.

"Chuck picked them up on our radar and we started moving in. We got a visual on one of the MIGs about five miles out on his final, he already had dropped his gear and flaps. I fired two missiles but both zipped past the enemy. We moved in on the side-rear position and slipped up next to him no more than 500 feet away.

"He got a look at us, snatched up the flaps and hit the afterburner, thrusting out."

Captain Madden and Captain DeBellevue then slipped into position for another shot at the MIG.

At that point Captain Madden maneuvered his F-4 from the area, as he did so two MIG-19s closed in for the attack. Captain Madden and DeBellevue broke down hard into the pair. As they started around into Madden and Captain Bryan Tibbett, piloting another F-4, Madden and DeBellevue fired off two missiles at the trailing MIG. Turning and cutting off the enemy jet they fired another air to air which slammed into the tail assembly of the MIG sending it from the sky.

Upon his return to base Captain DeBellevue said his newly acquired status as an ace is the high point of his career. "There is no other job in which you have to put

out so much. It's a frustrating job but when you get the MIG all the effort is well worth it."

Captain DeBellevue joined up with Captain Madden when Captain Ritchie, his former aircraft commander, was taken off combat flying duty.

The sixth kill, revealed Sept. 19, was listed as a probable on Sept. 9, but was not reported until an Air Force review board decided that Captain DeBellevue should be given credit for the kill.

The sixth MIG the captain is credited with destroying was actually the first one he and his aircraft commander, Capt. Madden, attacked Sept. 9. He first acquired the flight of MIGs on his radar.

Later verification, including testimony by other pilots, substantiated the destruction of the first MIG.

DeBellevue assisted Ritchie in four MIG downings — May 10, two on July 8th and one on the 28th of August.

Captain DeBellevue was flying his 195th combat mission when he scored his fifth and sixth victories.

In addition to his other kudos, Captain Ritchie received this message from Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird: "My warmest congratulations are extended to you as the first U.S. Air Force 'ace' of the Vietnam conflict. You have earned a special salute. The leadership and professionalism you have displayed in the downing of five MIG-21s is a credit to the Air Force and the entire Department of Defense. Your achievement and dedication are a source of pride shared by all men and women in uniform."

A bit of football history will be made at Falcon Stadium this afternoon when Air Force and Navy clash for the fifth time.

Today's game will mark the start of the "roundrobin" among the three major service academies. The three academies have met on an intermittent basis in the past but starting this fall they will meet each other every year, a series of games that should be keen rivalries.

This will be only the second time Navy has ever played at Falcon Stadium, losing to the Falcons 15-7 in their first appearance here during the 1966 season.

That 1966 game was the start of the Falcons' threegame winning streak in the series. Navy won the initial game, 35-3, in Baltimore in 1960 but Air Force got revenge in 1966. Then came two more Falcon victories, 26-20, in Chicago, in 1968 and 26-3 in Washington, D.C., in 1970.

As you can see most of the games have been close and another tough contest can be expected out on the field today.

Today's game will be significant for three Air Force coaches, since they are Navy graduates.

Head coach Ben Martin graduated from the Naval Academy with the class of 1946 and served as Brigade Commander while there. An outstanding athlete in both

football and track as a Middie, Martin also served as an assistant football coach there from 1947 until 1955.

Nick Liontas, the Falcons' receivers coach, graduated from Navy in 1952 but entered the Air Force after graduation.

Hank Egan, Air Force's head basketball coach, also is a Navy graduate in the class of 1960, starring in basketball.

Although today's football game maybe the first visit to the Air Force Academy in six years by the Middies it will not be the first athletic meeting of the school year between the two service academies.

The two soccer teams met last Saturday with the Falcons scoring a 3-0 victory in a game at the Air Force Academy. Navy will also journey to Colorado in basketball, playing at the Cadet Field House on Jan. 13.

Defense was the key to the Falcons' 13-9 victory over Boston College last Saturday and a number of Air Force players had outstanding days.


Senior linebacker Terry Theken had 15 tackles, including 10 unassisted, while senior middle guard Mark Prill and junior cornerback Dennis Collins each had 12. Adding 11 apiece were senior defensive tackle George Machovina and senior cornerback Jerry Olin. Checking in with 10 apiece were junior linebacker Jim Morris and junior rover Steve Heil, who also recovered a fumble to raise his season total in that category to five, tying a school record.

6-2, 193-pound junior quarterback from Florissant, Mo.

On Sept. 25, 1971, Rich Haynie became a starting quarter-back, throwing a touchdown pass to Greg Smith as time was running out to beat Wyoming, 23-19. He's started every game since.

Passing for more yards than any sophomore in Falcon history, Rich has continued that pace into the 1972 season. Through five games he has thrown at least one touchdown pass a game, 10 total, and has yet to be intercepted.

In the spring, Rich keeps in shape as the top pitcher on the baseball team. Named team captain for the 1973 season, he won nine of the Falcon's 16 games last year and saved another.

Carries a B average in a civil engineering major.











The third-leading rusher on the team with 224 yards, he also averages 5.6 yards a carry. Has scored five touchdowns this year, second in the team to Carlson. Has a 3.37 grade average in a history major.

UNITED STATES NAVAL ACADEMY

If George Bancroft, Secretary of the Navy in 1845, were to walk around the United States Naval Academy today, he would be amazed at what he had started 127 years ago.

Where 60 young men had crowded into the rooms of some old barracks of 10-acre Fort Severn in 1845 to open the new Naval School, more than 4000 midshipmen now walk the 300 acres that are the Naval Academy. A brick bakehouse converted to midshipmen quarters in 1846 has long since been replaced many times over by Bancroft Hall, the massive dormitory that houses the entire midshipman Brigade.

Modern classrooms and the latest technological equipment demand the most from today's midshipmen and, where midshipmen once set to sea in ships under sail, nine graduates of the Naval Academy have been among the astronauts who set their course in space in the 1960's.

The U.S. Naval Academy, today one of America's most prestigious academic institutions, began 127 years ago under the strong influence of Secretary Bancroft and the surging importance of the steam engine for naval power. In 1845 Commander Franklin Buchanan, who was later to command the Confederate Navy at Mobile Bay, was named the first superintendent, 50 midshipmen were selected, seven professors were recruited and the new Naval School on the Severn quietly got under way.

In 1851 the Naval School was formally designated the United States Naval Academy. Also in 1851 a four-year course of study replaced the first curriculum that had called for one year of study, three years at sea and a final year at Annapolis. At-sea training with the fleet during the summers replaced the years previously spent at sea.

The Civil War interrupted life at the Academy. Midshipmen were moved from Annapolis to an estate in Newport, Rhode Island, and plebes were housed on the old frigate Constitution anchored in Newport harbor. Meanwhile the buildings at Annapolis were used to treat the wounded from the battlefields of Virginia.

It was perhaps after the Civil War that the Naval Academy began steering a course that has made it the greatest naval school on earth today. In 1865, under the leadership of Admiral David Dixon Porter, the curriculum was updated, young officers were brought in as instructors, the grounds were cleaned up, new buildings went up and for the first time social and athletic diversions became an important part of life at Annapolis.

New events that have become traditions were logged in at the Naval Academy in prosperous years after the Civil War and the early 20th century. June Week was introduced under Porter, Navy met Army in 1890 to win the first game of the annual football classic, and "Anchors Aweigh" was sung for the first time in 1906. It was immediately adopted as the Navy fight song.

Today these traditions and many others remain at the Naval Academy. White-capped midshipmen in dress blue and brass buttons still march in June Week parades. New plebes still come through the Academy gates in June and don't leave the yard again until September. Laryngitis is still common after the Army-Navy games and drum rolls still thunder through Bancroft Hall during meal formations.

But today at the Naval Academy there is an excitement of change in the continuing traditions. New buildings — modern, yet in harmony with the strong buildings from the past — are going up at the Naval Academy. Michelson and Chauvenet Halls, the recently completed science and math buildings, are just the first in the new construction project at the Naval Academy. A new library is now under construction, and an engineering complex and auditorium are in the planning.

Perhaps even more important at Annapolis are the broad changes in the academic and professional areas. New emphasis on broadening academic opportunities and more intense officer training have come about in the past few years.

The old core curriculum has been dropped, giving each midshipman an opportunity to

choose one of 26 majors that range from aerospace engineering to literature to oceanography. Where only ten years ago all midshipmen took the same 40 courses, today's midshipman now has more than 580 courses, including several black studies courses and language and computer science courses, at his fingertips.

A concurrent strengthening of professional programs is giving midshipmen one of the most balanced educations available today. In addition to studying naval subjects like navigation and seamanship during the academic year, midshipmen spend their summer months training at sea as their predecessors did in 1850.

But today's sophomore (third class) and senior (first class) midshipmen travel to places like New Zealand; Sydney, Australia; Copenhagen, Denmark; and Portsmouth, England on ships specially designated for midshipman cruises. Second class midshipmen, meanwhile, divide their time between flight training at Pensacola, Florida; amphibious school at Little Creek, Virginia; Marine Corps indoctrination at Quantico, Virginia and seamanship training aboard submarines in New London, Connecticut, and aboard Yard Patrol Craft in Annapolis.

The result of the new look and feel at Annapolis? Grades and interest are up, academic dropouts are down significantly. There is a real excitement about summer cruises to foreign ports, and more young men were nominated for entry to the Naval Academy this year than ever before in its history.





LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 48,628 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.
