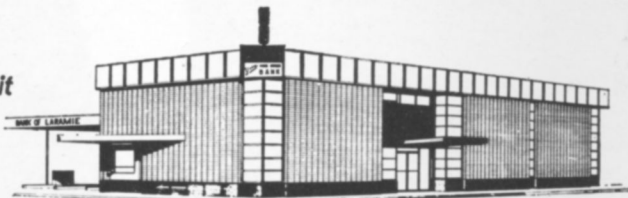

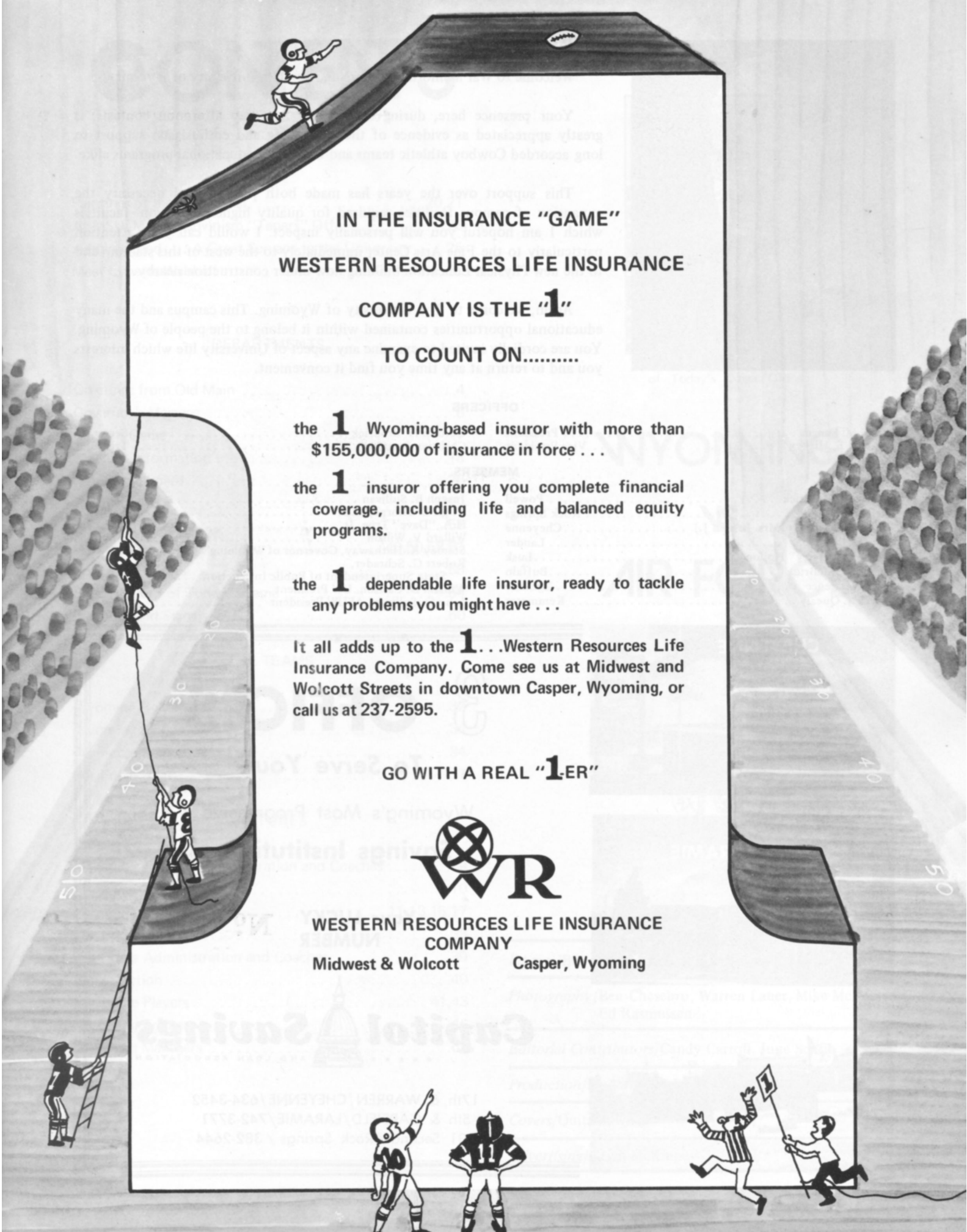

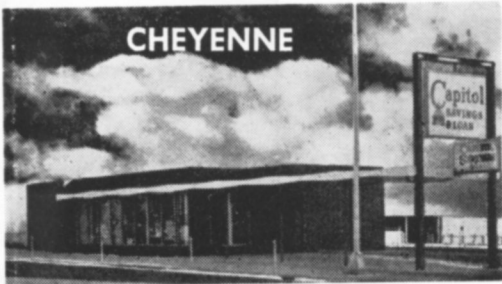

Once again it is my pleasure to welcome and to extend greetings to the students, alumni, and friends of the University of Wyoming at the opening of the Cowboy football season.

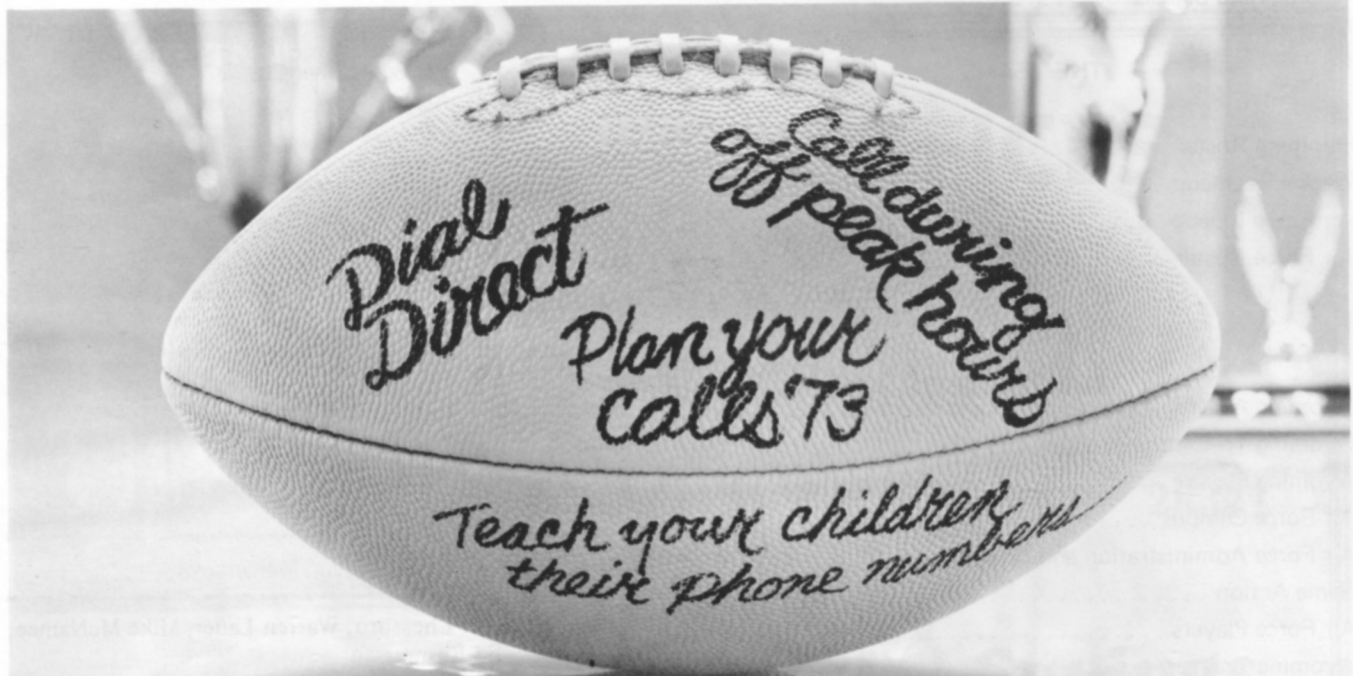

TODAY'S

GAME

Everyone, it seems, is on a nostalgia kick.

So why not the Cowboys?

Nostalgia means "homesickness," or so it says in our dictionary, but we prefer to define it as a remembrance of the good old days. In this case the good old days were when Wyoming last defeated the Air Force.

That was 1969 before the Falcons started on a three-game winning streak over the Cowboys.

Here's how Pete Fetsco, then of the **Laramie Daily Boomerang**, began his story of that game:

"A magnificent Wyoming defensive line showed the Air Force how to put the 'wild' in wild blue yonder Saturday as it paved the way for an exciting 27-25 Cowboy win in Falcon Stadium.

"The dispositions of nearly 4,000 cadets turned as blue as their uniforms as Larry Nels, Tony McGee and other Cowboy stalwarts constantly threw their tricky quarterback, Gary Baxter, for sizeable losses.

"In a game which saw the Cowboys fight back from a 12-point deficit, it was entirely fitting that the last Air Force threat was stymied by the strong Wyoming defensive wall.

"Taking the cue from the defense, the Wyoming offense jelled nicely in the second half under the guidance of sophomore quarterback Gary Fox, who proved himself a master of the option, using runners Frosty Franklin and Tony Gibson with devastating effect both through and around the Air Force Wall."

Fox, the sharpshooter from Billings, Mont., was the man of the hour in the second half of that contest. He came off the bench in the second half to start an assault on the Wyoming passing records as he completed 10 of 11 passes (still a Poke single game record) for 68 yards and what proved to be the winning touchdown.

A nostalgic memory (if that's not too redundant).

Since then it's been all Air Force as the Falcons have won in 1970 (41-17), 1971 (23-19) and 1972, the last time the teams have played (45-14). They now lead the series 7-5 with two ties.

This fall the Cadets got off to a flying start with a 37-0 win over Idaho, but then faltered in the 95-degree heat at Oregon for a 27-23 loss.

The Cowboys, meanwhile, slipped in the opener against Utah State, 17-7, but then found themselves despite a 34-7 loss at Texas. The Pokes cranked up a potent offense directed by freshman quarterback Rick Costello, who hopes to start a nostalgia kick of his own today against Air Force.

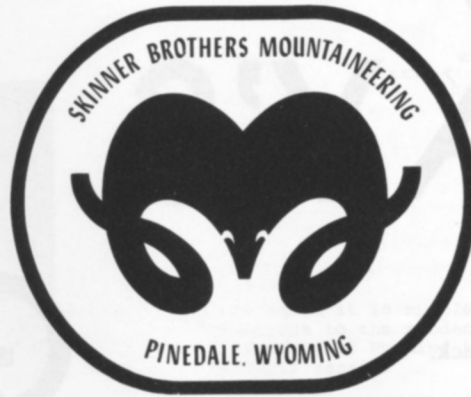

WYOMING MEMORIAL STADIUM INFORMATION

PUBLIC TELEPHONES: Public telephones are located under the East and West Grandstands near the center of the stands, on the concourse level of the upper deck near the center of the stands and in Memorial Fieldhouse at each of the four corners of the building on the first floor.

"WILL CALL" TICKET BOOTH: If for any reason known to the Ticket Manager you have tickets to pick up prior to game time and cannot do so before 9:30 a.m. on the day of the game at the Athletic Ticket Office, your tickets may be obtained at the "Will Call" booth any time after 9:30 a.m. on game day. The "Will Call" booth is located at the Southwest corner of the fieldhouse and is plainly marked.

FIRST AID ROOM: An attendant is on duty during games in Room 16 located under the West stands between sections C and D.

LOST AND FOUND: All found articles should be turned in to the pressbox doorman. Lost articles may be claimed at the Athletic Ticket Office, Room 215, Memorial Fieldhouse. Telephone 766-2345.



EMERGENCY CALLS: Individuals attending games at Wyoming Memorial Stadium should record their Section, Row, and Seat number of tickets at home or in their office. The public address system will not be used for calling spectators from the stands. In case of emergency, telephone the Press Box, 766-2222. Individuals will not, however, be paged over the loud speaking system.

REST ROOMS: Rest room facilities are located immediately under the stadium in both the East and West Grandstands either to the right or left as you leave your portal and on the concourse level of the upper deck under sections EE, CC and GG. Additional facilities are located in the North and South lobbies of Memorial Fieldhouse.

Paintings of the Early West

ALFRED JACOB MILLER'S "Scalp-lock", the most recent acquisition, was purchased through Warner's efforts and patrons of the Western History Research Center.



Three original oil paintings of the early west, by Alfred Jacob Miller, have been placed on permanent display in the Western History Research Center in Coe Library, thanks to the efforts of Robert Warner, UW journalism professor.

Miller, an early western artist, was the first to illustrate the West during the exciting years of the mountain fur trade; a period which ended about 1840. He is best known for his paintings of the Rocky Mountain West which he made from his trail sketches of 1837 while he was an artist on the expedition of Sir William Drummond Stewart of Scotland, a British nobleman.

Warner began research on the artist and his search turned up 13 Miller paintings of Fort Laramie, six of which had never been published and were unknown to collectors of Western Americana.

An important result of Warner's research was the gift of two Miller paintings to the University by the Everett D. Graff family of Winnetka, Ill. They are, "Hunting Elk" and "War Ground, Beating A Retreat."

"Hunting Elk" portrays Indians hunting elk along the upper waters of the North Platte River, according to the Miller notes. The painting is signed by Miller and dated 1865, the same year in which he sold it for a mere \$75. Miller wrote of the elk, "When Buffalo are scarce, these are a desirable acquisition to the prairie larder, more from their weight than excellence as food. The meat is inferior to either buffalo, Bear Mountain sheep or deer. The Indians manufacture a beautiful buckskin from their hides."

In his own valuable notes, copies of which are now at the University, Miller described "War Ground, Beating A Retreat" as depicting mounted Sioux warriors escaping from the arrows of an enraged band of Blackfeet who felt the Sioux were invading their territory. The sketch from which the painting was made was drawn by Miller during the expedition which accompanied a fur company caravan bound for the rendezvous of trappers and Indians on the Green River in western Wyoming.

Miller originally sketched both scenes in 1837 on the Stewart expedition. Later he made the studio oils from these field sketches.

The most recent Miller acquisition is "The Scalp-Lock," an 18 by 24 inch oil, probably painted in the mid 1860's when Miller was working from his original sketches in Baltimore.

Warner said that this scene of the Indian and his horse with a fresh scalp-lock was probably originally sketched in the central Rockies about 1837, in what is now Wyoming.

In the field notes to go with the sketches, Miller wrote of "The Scalp-Lock", "In this sketch, an Indian has secured the scalp-lock of his enemy and is making good his escape,—for this honor awaits him in his camp and it often presents a strong claim for the post of a chief or brave . . . To a people who delight in war, and who are instructed from youth in its principles, and practice, it is almost useless to preach the blessing of peace."

Miller was born in 1810 and died in 1874. He studied in Paris and Rome and had a reputation as a competent artist before being engaged by Stewart in 1937 for the six-month expedition. During the trek into the Rockies, Miller made more than 200 sketches. After completing his assignment for Stewart, Miller returned to his home in Baltimore and became a successful portrait painter, although he continued to turn out western works such as the three in Coe Library.

Warner is known as a leading expert on Miller and his work, and during the coming year will go to Britain to lecture on the artist's work. He feels that one of Miller's great virtues as a documentary painter is that in the finished oils he "adhered closely to the original sketches." This attribute can be seen when one compares the finished painting with the published trail sketch in pencil and watercolor.

Miller's paintings may be seen in the Western History Research Center in Coe Library, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., excluding the noon hour.

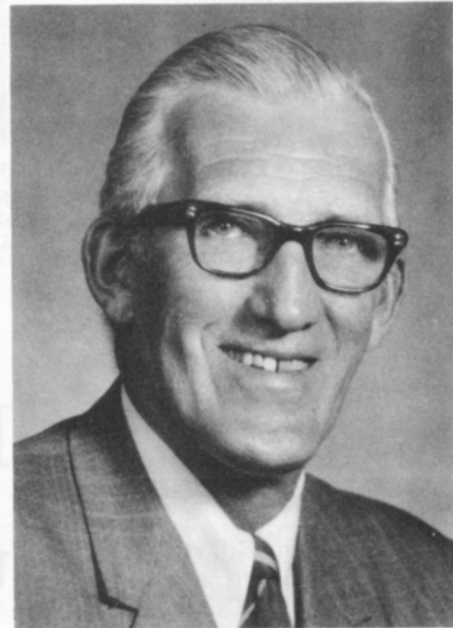

At MSU, Male Chauvinism "Tapers" Off

There were a few anxious moments in the Michigan State football training room during early drills last fall.

As Spartan gridders meandered in to get ankles taped and sore muscles rubbed, they were stopped in their tracks by an unusual sight.

Busy wrapping ankles and scurrying around was a girl—right there in the heretofore sacred domain of the male athlete.

"What's a girl doing here?" many blurted out.

None of this bothered Sue Schneider. She kept on taping without looking up.

"The guys were pretty hesitant at first. So was I, to tell you the truth, but soon they became accustomed to seeing me around," said the 23-year-old blonde from Traverse City, Mich.

Sue Schneider is another prodigy of Women's Lib. She's the first female trainer in the United States for a men's football team. She does everything her male counterparts do for the players, from taping to treating injuries to general "housework" around the training room.

"It is a great experience for me because I come in contact with all

types of injuries," Miss Schneider said. "I was kind of leery about the whole thing at first, but head trainer Clint Thompson pushed me through the door and that was that."

Sign of the Times

Signs were placed around the locker room to remind the MSU gridders about being decent before entering the training room, but occasionally they forgot.

"It embarrassed them a lot more than it did me," Sue said, matter-of-factly.

Miss Schneider, who traveled with Michigan State to three games as well as working all the home grid contests, is a graduate assistant and is mainly responsible for tending to the women athletes in their budding program at MSU.

While attending Central Michigan University, Sue took a class for athletic trainers, enjoyed it immensely and became a student trainer, working with male and female athletes alike.

Closed Door Policy

Her entrance into the training room at CMU was not without its

problems, as the only door to the facility opened right into the locker room and showers.

"I'd have to wait for five minutes until the shower was cleared and everyone was dressed or hiding before I could come in," she said, her blue eyes twinkling. "They finally put up a big curtain so I could walk right in."

Working with the Michigan State Football team hasn't been nearly the hassle for Sue as has been the volumes of publicity she's received. "It was kind of fun at first, a small town girl getting interviewed," Sue said. "But, then it got to be kind of boring with the same old prying questions.

"I figured it was a way of promoting women's athletics and female trainers so I always tried to be as accommodating as possible."

Sue must get her master's degree to become a certified trainer, and then she hopes to become a head trainer of a women's program.

"It's an interesting career and it can only get better with the emergence of women's athletics," she said.

Admiral Land...

A Great Servant to the University

The person responsible for the athletic awards to be given next week at the Homecoming Game is the late Admiral Emory Scott Land, who graduated from the University in 1898 and served his Alma Mater in more ways than athletic awards.

His other major benefit to the University was the gift of \$50,000 worth of Dow Chemical stock in 1958 to endow the aeronautical section of the west wing of the engineering building. An oil portrait of him was unveiled when the wing was dedicated and now hangs in the building.

Admiral Land received the first Distinguished Alumni Award from the University in 1953, the same year he made the presentation of his first athletic award. Paul Carlin received the award from Admiral Land that year.

After graduating from the University in 1898 he went with Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders to the Spanish-American war and began a colorful career spanning nearly three-quarters of a century.

When that war was over he attended the Naval Academy in Annapolis and was graduated from there with honor in 1902. Although small in stature, Land played football both for UW and the Academy. His most noted athletic achievement at the Academy came at the traditional Army-Navy game of 1900. Right Halfback Land blocked a punt, caught the ball himself, and ran for a touchdown to give Navy an 11 to 7 victory in the closing minutes of the game. He won the academy sword for outstanding athletic achievement and graduated sixth in his class.

During World War I he served in the Navy's construction and repair department and became the Navy's first authority on German U-boats. He subsequently served

a term with the Bureau of Aeronautics where he learned to pilot his own plane and a four-year stint as aide to U.S. Fleet Commander, W.V. Pratt, before he was appointed head of the Navy's construction program.

It was as head of the Maritime Commission during World War II where he made his greatest contribution to his country. As war threatened in 1938 and the demand for shipping rose, Land won a reputation for slashing through red tape. At one point he began awarding construction contracts without funds on hand. Once when this practice was questioned he told his questioner, with a chuckle, "See you in jail."

He did not go to jail, but he did build ships that became the life blood of the United States during the war. Over all, he supervised the construction of more than 50 million deadweight tons of shipping and brought the United States from fourth to second in the world in number of trade ships—in just three years.

Both Presidents Roosevelt and Truman credited him with building the "bridge" of ships which allowed the United States and its allies to

get men and supplies to the war theaters.

In 1946 he resigned as head of the Maritime Commission because, he said, he was "war weary." He became president of the Air Transport Association of America, where he served for eight years, and at the time of his death in 1971 was a consultant to General Dynamics corporation.

When he died at the age of 92, he was buried in Arlington Cemetery with full military honors.

He visited the campus several times in his later years and represented the University at a formal function near his home in Washington, D.C., less than a year before his death.

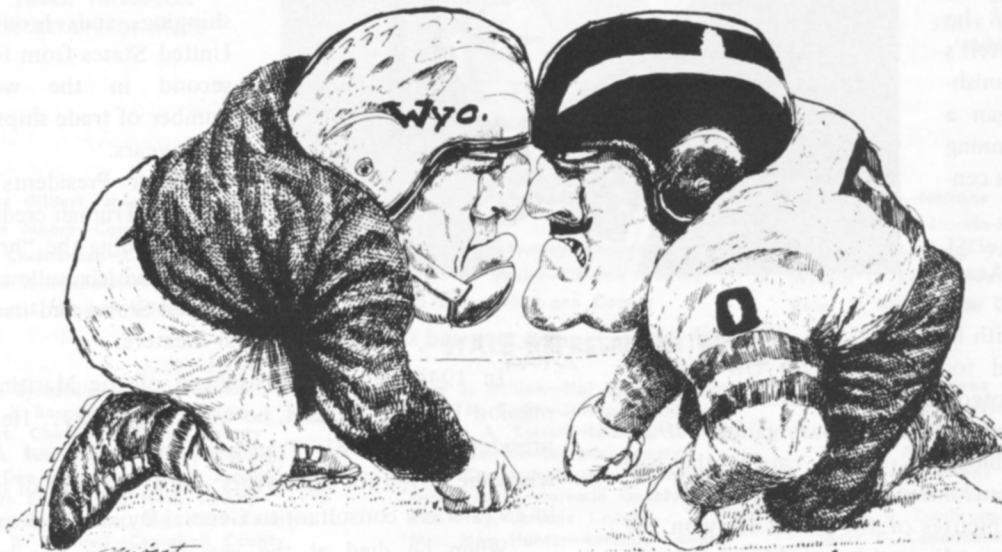
