

'One Burger, Hold the Fries . . .

Nostalgia.

That longing to again possess or be a part of what once was.

It's with us everywhere today.

Even in an obscure half-century-old bend in the tracks someone named Beaumont, Kansas.

The lone monument to what four decades past was a bustling, dusty rail stop which sent 5,000 head of cattle a day on their way to the east is a two-story, tree-shrouded hotel/restaurant quaintly dubbed the Beaumont Hotel.

Perhaps it is an early 1900 ex-boom town atmosphere that still lures people to this forgotten burg — not to mention the "really good food" — or perhaps, for flying buffs at least, it is more that you can fly to Beaumont, land in a cow pasture, taxi down a country road, cross a main street and park right in front of the hotel!

Two Academy second classmen, Jim Fiorenzi and Rick Pilling shared this unique experience last June with two Forbes AFB, Kan. Aero Club members, Cap-

tains Mike Grenard and Matt Bradley (Academy '69 grads).

The cadets had just completed the final phase of their summer Third Lieutenant training and the foursome, flying the club's Cessna 172, set out one weekend for the prairie oasis.

"We had read about the place in an article on the Aero Club bulletin board," Pilling explained, "and since none of the club members had been able to find the place we decided to try."

Captain Bradley relayed some of the instructions he had received on how to find Beaumont: "On the southeast side of the triangular pasture which you drew on the east side of town and south of the highway lies a railroad which runs northeast to southwest — got that?!" Bradley had filed a flight plan but the airman at the dispatch desk greeted it with mocking skepticism, "Wish you luck. I went over there a couple of weeks ago and never could find the place."

They would not be frustrated, however. And besides, lunch was at stake!

"It was a little tricky and we almost made a wrong turn." Pilling said, "but we finally spotted the place where the tracks crossed the road and then saw the water tower."

Bradley thought to himself as he taxied the craft. "I can't believe we're doing this," the tall weeds and brush growing beside the road sliding past the wing tips. "I instinctively looked behind us expecting to see

flashing red lights of the local sheriff who would undoubtedly order, 'Git that plane off the road, boy, you're in a heap o' trouble.'"

"We only taxied about 100 yards before coming to the parking area," Fiorenzi explained, "when we got there there were a couple of planes already parked and another came while we were eating."

There are no souvenir shops selling "We Ate In

Beaumont, Kan." bumper stickers. Just a hotel registry which the guest may sign.

As for the food — both cadets attest to its "really good" quality. Some executive types flew in just for the hotel's coffee — apparently enough of an attraction to warrant the austere airport facilities.

After lunch the group toured Beaumont and discovered that the whole town aside from the hotel was a tiny post office and an aging bank building.

"At three in the afternoon," Pilling said, "the whole place seemed asleep."

If fads and technology (progress) have their way however, Beaumont could undergo a shocking renaissance. Even a conservative futurist conjures block upon neon-lit block of fly-ins circa the franchise chains of convenience drive-ins, featuring of course Beaumont Burgers served by flocks of cute flightsuit-clad planehops. All this to cater to the expanding hordes of flyers looking for a truly different weekend junket. Beaumont could, with proper city management and good PR, become a bustling boom town.

But then it would not be what it is now. A quaint elusive quiet part of the past which offers to the few who seek it out a heaping serving of nostalgia.



Today's Game | AIR FORCE vs. DAVIDSON

There will be several firsts made at Falcon Stadium this afternoon.

To start off, this will be the first time Air Force has ever played Davidson in football.

This will also be the first time the Falcons have ever played a football team from the Southern Conference.

Lastly, this will be the first time Davidson has ever played a football game in the state of Colorado.

The Wildcats from Davidson, N.C., also have another unique distinction. With 1,050 students, they are the smallest college in enrollment playing major college football this season.

During the past several seasons, Davidson has ranked among the top passing teams in the nation, averaging 216 yards per game in aerials the last five seasons.

Their statistics so far this season also are pass oriented. The Wildcats are averaging 312 yards per game offensively, 193 of that passing.

Davidson also had a recent bowl appearance, bowing to Toledo in the 1969 Tangerine Bowl in Florida enroute to a 7-4 season.

It's easy to appreciate offense in a football game but how many people really look that closely at the defense?

Last week the Falcons came up with their second

straight high-scoring effort by beating Pittsburgh, 41-13, but a great deal of credit in that victory would have to go to the defense, one of the question marks entering this fall.

Falcon defenders turned over the ball seven times to the offense last Saturday, recovering five fumbles

and intercepting two passes.

Two weeks ago against Wyoming, junior linebacker Jim Morris was outstanding and he had another good game against Pitt. However, the tip of the hat this week would have to go to junior rover Steve Heil of Gering, Neb., who turned in one of the finest defensive performances in Falcon football history.

Heil, who is still a growing lad at 6-4 and 205 pounds, set a school record by recovering three fumbles and returned an intercepted pass 15 yards. He also had nine tackles, including seven of the unassisted variety.

A reserve last season, Heil showed excellent promise and insured the victory over Tulsa with a 37-yard interception return for a touchdown.

Offensively, a tip of the hat goes to senior tailback Joel Carlson of Coloma, Mich., who came up with his second straight 100-yard plus day rushing. Carlson, who was shifted from quarterback to tailback in the spring, gained 134 yards on 30 carries against Pitt, scoring a touchdown. He also caught two passes for 23 yards and returned the second-half opening kickoff 47 yards. It was a busy day for Joe, who ranks as one of the best open field runners in Falcon football history.

Many of you will remember the school record 88-

yard run he had last season to beat Army.

Location: Approximately 10 miles north of Colorado Springs, Colorado, at the base of the Rampart Range of the Rocky Mountains. The Academy site covers 18,000 acres.

Enrollment: 4,200 (approximate). Public Law 88-276 was signed by the President on 3 March 1964 authorizing an increase in strength of the Cadet Wing from 2,529 to 4,417.



JOEL CARLSON


6-0, 187-pound senior tailback from Coloma, Mich.

Has moved into the starter's position at tailback after two years as a quarterback. Opened the 1972, season with a 109-yard performance against Wyoming, including two touchdowns.


Broke open the Army game last year with an 88-yard TD run, a school record. Leading returning rusher from last year averaging 5.5 yards a carry with three touchdowns.

His younger brother, Dana, is a sophomore flanker on the Falcon team. Compiled a 3.08 grade average last semester in a life science major.



DAVIDSON COLLEGE

After being virtually an all-male college since its beginnings in 1837, Davidson College has become coeducational.

"We felt the time had come to open our first-rate liberal arts program to women," said Director of Admissions H. Edmunds White. "The move to coeducation was favored by a large majority of our students, faculty, staff, alumni and trustees. If all goes well, Davidson could add 500 women to its present 1,000 men by 1981."

In 1972-73 about 50 women students will be on the Davidson campus, including upperclass transfer students and one-year exchange students. The exchange students are juniors, primarily from Queens College in Charlotte and Hollins, Sweet Briar, Randolph Macon, and Mary Baldwin in Virginia.

High school seniors who are interested in becoming Davidson freshmen in the fall of 1973 may apply to the college this fall and winter. More upperclass transfer students will also be accepted.

Another new development on the campus is the construction of the college's new \$4.2 million E. H. Little Library. It will have a capacity for 500,000 volumes and more than 1,000 periodicals and will be equipped to serve a coeducational student body of about 1,500. Davidson hopes to raise the remaining \$1.2 million for the structure by June 1973.

Funds for the library, for other physical needs of the campus, and for increased endowment will be sought in 1972-73 on behalf of Davidson and of Queens College in Charlotte by the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina. The Queens-Davidson Fund conducted by the synod has set a goal of \$6 million.

Davidson is also seeking in 1972-73 to maintain and enhance its national reputation for producing fellowship winners. The latest graduating class included a Rhodes Scholar, a Marshall Scholar, four Watson




Fellows, four Rockefeller Fellows, and an NCAA Scholar, plus recipients of numerous graduate awards from universities around the country.

Usually about 70 per cent of each Davidson class later attends graduate school. The institution ranks in the top three per cent of all independent American colleges in the percentage of graduates listed in "Who's Who in America." It also ranks first in the South and fourth in the nation in the percentage of graduates attending medical school. Among its 11,000 living alumni are more than 1,300 practicing physicians and dentists, many of whom are leading specialists. A large percentage of the ministers of the Presbyterian Church, U. S., and many in other denominations, are also Davidson graduates.

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 48,628 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.
