



TODAY'S GAME

FLYING FALCONS INV





Army quarterback Kingsley Fink fires pass against Penn State. Fink has teamed up with senior halfbacks Bob Hines and Bruce Simpson to give Army one of its most potent offensive attacks of late. Against Rutgers two weeks ago the three combined for more than 390 yards in total offense. Hines and Simpson both went over the 100-yard mark in rushing, the first time two Army backs have done that since 1965.

High flying Air Force, sporting a 6-1 record, invades Michie Stadium this afternoon with one of the most explosive offensive attacks in the nation.

Behind the four touchdown passing effort of junior quarterback Rich Haynie, coach Ben Martin's Falcons stunned 16th ranked Arizona State last Saturday, 39-31, for their sixth victory in seven games. The only loss Air Force has suffered was a 21-17 upset at the hands of Navy two weeks ago.

While Air Force is flying high, coach Tom Cahill's Army football team once again will try to pick up the pieces. The Cadets committed three critical mistakes last Saturday which directly led to three Miami touchdowns in a 28-7 defeat. The loss lowered Army's season record to 3-3.

The Cadets won the battle of statistics against the Hurricanes, but lost the war. Quarterback Kingsley Fink completed 17 of 39 pass attempts for 258 yards, including

a 50-yard touchdown strike to split end Barry Armstrong. But it was far from enough to overcome the costly mistakes.

Army and Air Force are meeting for the seventh time this afternoon with the Falcons holding a slim one game lead in the series. Air Force has won three games, including a 20-7 victory last year, while the Cadets have won two games. One game, the very first in 1959, ended in a tie.


In last year's meeting the Falcons came from behind after Army led at one time 7-3. An 88-yard touchdown run by quarterback Joel Carlson turned the game around for the Falcons. Carlson is back again this year, but he has been moved to halfback. He currently leads Air Force in rushing.

Haynie appears to have matured a great deal with one year of varsity experience. Against Arizona State the junior quarterback fired scoring strikes of 28, 61, 64 and 26 yards. Three of the TD strikes went to flanker Frank Murphy.

Haynie, Carlson and Murphy are the three players Army must stop on offense, as it appears that footballs will fill the air.

Army will counter with a more balanced attack. Half-backs Bruce Simpson and Bob Hines will carry much of

Army linebacker Dave Molten (65) is about to stop John Cappelletti of Penn State for short gain.


the load on the ground. Simpson gained 86 yards against Miami, and for the season he ranks second with 305 yards. Hines has gained 341 yards in six games.


The passing attack will be in the hands of Fink. He has passed for 734 yards including five touchdowns. His favorite receiver has been flanker Jim Ward. Ward has 18 receptions for 218 yards and three touchdowns.

Army's defense, which turned in a fine effort in stopping Miami's fine running back Chuck Foreman, now must contain Haynie, Carlson and company. It will be a challenging assignment.

Big plays have played a major role in determining the winner in an Army-Air Force football game. In 1969, Air Force flanker Ernie Jennings, top, right (22), an all-America, raced 96-yards with a kickoff return to defeat Army 13-6. A year ago, Joel Carlson of Air Force (11, middle), who will be at halfback this afternoon, raced 88-yards for a touchdown on a quarterback keeper to provide the Falcons what proved to be the winning points after Army led 7-3. Air Force won the game 20-7. And Army's fine halfback Lynn Moore (44, right), picks up good yardage in 1969 game. Moore kept underdog Cadets in the game with his running.










■ The Army-Air Force football rivalry is relatively new when compared to the tradition and history of the Army-Navy series. However, this new rivalry is blossoming, particularly since the Cadets and Falcons will meet every year.

"The Army-Air Force series has not reached the same status as the Army-Navy rivalry because it hasn't been contested long enough," says Army coach Tom Cahill. "But any time two service academies meet in any sport there is a certain amount of pride at stake, and thus a little more than just a win or a loss.

"One never forgets a victory or a defeat against Navy, and I believe we will begin to feel the same way about Air Force," says coach Cahill.

Six games have been played between Army and Air Force with the Falcons gaining a slight edge with three victories. The Cadets have won two games while one game, the very first encounter, ended in a tie.

A brief account of the first six games follows along with a pictorial review of this colorful series.

1959—Yankee Stadium, New York City, October 31

Halfback Mike Quinlan ran 11 yards in the fourth quarter and George Pupich booted the extra point as Air Force rallied to tie the Army in the first game ever between the two military academies. Monte Moorberg scored the game's first touchdown in the opening quarter as the Falcons drew first blood. The try for the extra point was blocked by Army. Bob Anderson tallied twice for Army during the second quarter on runs of one and six yards.

1963—Soldier's Field, Chicago, November 2

Ken Waldrop scored both Army touchdowns as the Cadets scored the first victory for either team in the series. After Air Force had taken a 3-0 lead at halftime on a 36-yard field goal by Bart Holaday, Waldrop plunged one yard for the go-ahead touchdown in the third stanza. Waldrop himself set up the score with a 78-yard punt return to the Air Force two yard line. The Falcons regained the lead in the final period as quarterback Terry Isaacson went the final yard on a fourth and goal situation. But Army came right back and Waldrop culminated the drive with a 17-yard scamper to paydirt.


1965—Soldier's Field,

Chicago, November 6

Air Force quarterback Paul Stein passed for one touchdown and ran for another as the Falcons posted victory number one in the series, 14-3. A tough Air Force defense limited the Cadets to just a fourth quarter field goal by Andy Dull. Stein scrambled for a fiveyard touchdown run on a fourth down situation in the second quarter. That was the only scoring until Dull's 36yard field goal in the first minute of the final stanza. Air Force then came right back following the ensuing kickoff to put the game on ice when Stein connected with Carl Jansen on a 27-yard touchdown pass.

Army's balanced attack, spearheaded by the running of Charlie Jarvis and the passing of Steve Lindell, rolled up 357 yards in total offense as the Cadets won the fourth game of the series 10-7. Nick Kurilko, Army's placekicker, accounted for all the points in the opening half when he booted a 45-yard field goal late in the first quarter. Jarvis made it 10-0 when he scored from eight yards out in the third quarter. The Air Force got on the scoreboard early in the fourth quarter on a two-yard plunge by Dave Mumme. However, the Falcons never threatened after that.

1969—Michie Stadium, West Point, N.Y., November 1

All-America halfback Ernie Jennings raced 96 yards with a kickoff return with less than seven minutes to play to give highly favored Air Force a 13-6 victory over Army at Michie Stadium. Jennings' clutch kickoff return snapped a 6-6 tie. Arden Jensen, Army's record setting kicking specialist, knotted the score with a 27-yard field goal after an apparent Army touchdown was called back because of holding. Jensen did all the scoring for the Cadets, putting Army in front in the first period with a 25-yard field goal. Air Force retaliated on the accurate toe of Dennis Leuthauser. Leuthauser booted two field goals late in the second quarter, both 42 yards in length, to provide the Falcons a slim 6-3 lead at intermission.

1971—Falcon Stadium, Colorado Springs, October 16

Air Force rallied for 17 points in the second half to erase a 7-3 Army halftime lead and post a 20-7 victory over the Cadets. An 88-yard run by backup quarterback Joel Carlson turned the game right around. Trailing 7-3, Air Force found itself backed up to its own 12. On a quarterback option, Carlson kept the ball instead of pitching out, cut sharply to his left and rambled for the go-ahead score. Early in the fourth period the Falcons put the game out of reach when defensive end Gene Ogilvie blocked an Army punt, and defensive tackle John Griffith picked up the loose ball and ran it back four yards for a touchdown to make it 17-7 Army's only touchdown came midway through the second quarter when halfback Bob Portante bulled his way over from the one. Portante's touchdown climaxed a 13-play, 62-yard drive. The victory was the first for Air Force at home in this series.







Captain of the Cadets

Steve Bogosian

■ Army's defensive unit appears to be a breeding place for football captains. For the sixth time in the last seven seasons, a member of the Cadets' respected defensive unit has worn the captain's title. He is Steve Bogosian, a two-year letterman from Massena, N.Y., who as a defensive end is rated a solid chance of becoming Army's first all-America since linebacker Ken Johnson was so honored in 1968.

The 21-year-old senior has made his presence felt since his first varsity campaign in 1970. Bogosian broke into Army's starting lineup midway through that year's schedule, and until two weeks ago had not missed a single game. A shoulder injury prevented him from seeing any duty in the Penn State fray on October 14.

Army coach Tom Cahill has witnessed Steve's progress at West Point from the very beginning, and is quick to rate his defensive end an excellent all-America prospect.

"He's one of the finest football players I have ever had the privilege of coaching," says Cahill. "Steve has good size, strength and excellent football sense. I feel he could play for any team in the country."


Bogosian enjoyed one of his best games in the Army uniform earlier this fall when the Cadets rallied to defeat Texas A&M, 24-14, at College Station. During a big second half, one in which Army held the Aggies scoreless, Bogosian twice dropped the quarterback in key situations and caused a fumble, resulting in a total of 25 yards in losses.

1971 was a banner year for Steve Bogosian. It was a year that Army, as a team, rebounded to enter a 6-4 record into the Academy annals. And it was a year that Bogosian, as an individual, was to earn the respect of many. He was a unanimous choice

for the all-New York State squad, and a first-team member of the all-East team as selected by United Press International.

Bogosian ranked fourth among Cadet tacklers last fall, finishing with a total of 92 — 66 of them unassisted. That was tops among all defensive linemen. In addition, he caused five fumbles, recovered four others and personally disrupted an opponent's passing attack seven times with an aggressive pass rush.



AIR FORCE

■ The mission of the U.S. Air Force Academy is to educate and train career officers for the U.S. Air Force. The curriculum of instruction is designed specifically for this purpose. The Federal Government pays the expenses of each cadet through four years to obtain a nucleus of Air Force officers who will provide leadership for this branch of military service.

The Air Force Academy accomplishes its mission through a four year program of academic studies, leadership and military training, physical education and athletics. Completion of the

curriculum entitles the cadet to graduate with a Regular Air Force commission and a Bachelor of Science degree.

Inherent in the mission are the following broad objectives: to provide each cadet with the academic knowledge essential to his career as an Air Force officer; to provide each cadet with a broad military education as a foundation for his progressive development as a professional Air Force officer; to provide the necessary leadership training opportunities for the cadet to develop his capabilities and skills as a leader; to develop in each cadet the ideals of duty, honor, and service to his country; to develop in each cadet the physical attributes and skills necessary to meet the requirements of cadet and commissioned officer life.

Achievement of these objectives is the responsibility of the Academy Superintendent and his staff. The Superintendent is directly responsible to the Chief of Staff, United States Air Force, for the operation of the Academy.

The mission of the Air Force Academy makes the school different from a civitian college or university. Cadets must maintain a regular daily schedule, conform to strict discipline, live by an honor code, and develop qualities of leadership and dedication to service in the Air Force. Since cadets are preparing for careers of service to their country, the Academy must exercise discipline and control to insure that they evolve into enlightened officers with strong moral character, physical fitness, and leadership ability, and professional skills.


