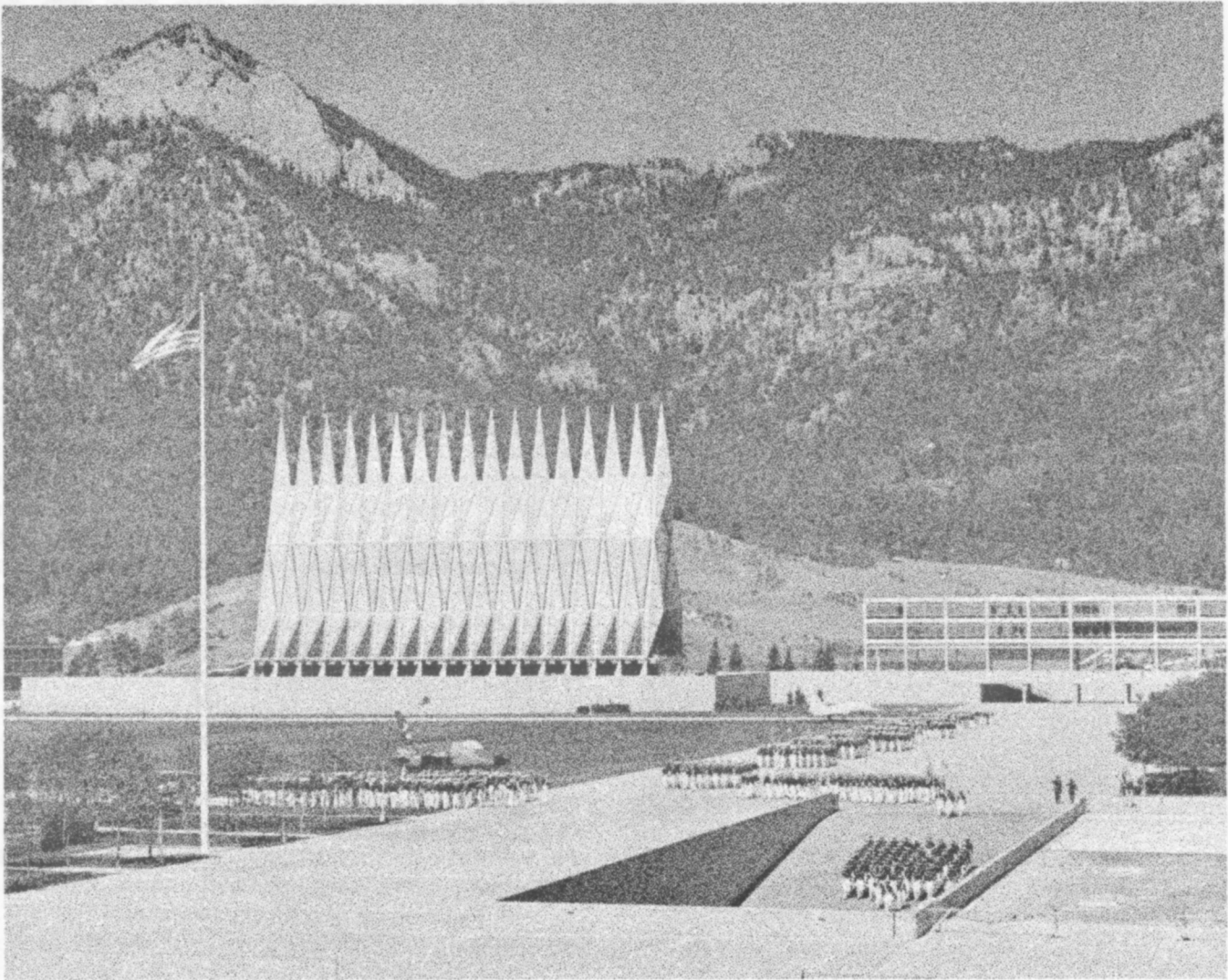

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TERM PAPERS SCIENCE

Term papers have been eliminated in an Air Force Academy history class, but senior cadets find they are doing more academic investigation and enjoying it more.

The course is history of science and technology, and it is the only such class taught at a service academy. Under the tutelage of Major Paul Clark, the originator and former instructor of the class, the elective course has become popular among cadets, attracting students who major in humanities and general studies as well as in technical fields.

Rather than prepare a term paper for the end of the course, cadets are given the opportunities to duplicate successful scientific experiments and technological feats done in the past. The work ranges from constructing early navigation methods, the first technical weapons to the harnessing of electrical power.

Clark was the instructor until last May since the course was made part of the Academy's history department's offerings five years ago. A holder of a Ph.D. in history of science and technology from Case Western Reserve University, Clark had the idea of allowing cadets to substitute case work for written term papers.

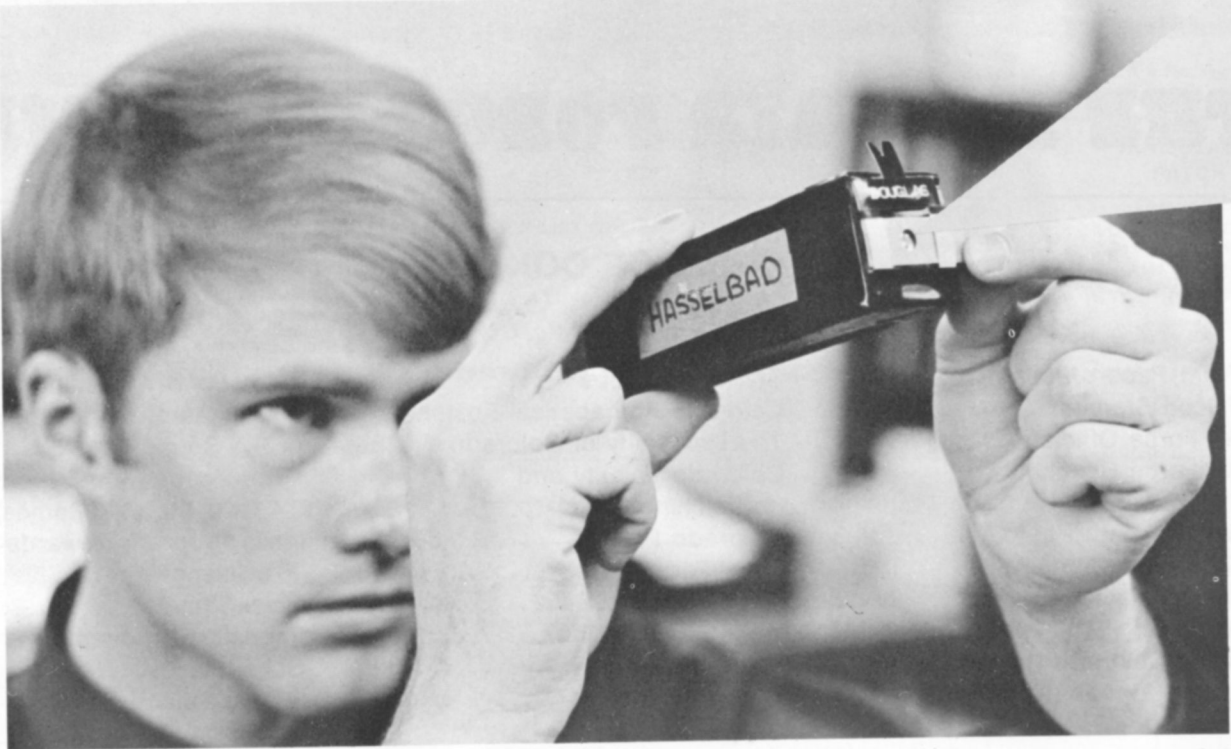
"Cadets have told me that they put in more time trying to recreate models and experiments than they do on term papers," said Clark, who was selected for air attache duty in London last summer.

"One cadet built a model of the Wright brothers' aircraft, Kitty Hawk. He spent over 100 hours in research just to insure that the scale model of the plane was technically correct," he said.

"One purpose of the class is that western civilization is based on science and technology. If science has an impact on society, then the converse is true. Society determines what kinds of science will be done, what kinds will be supported.

"Students in humanities study civilizations. This is one of the courses to help them understand the drive of those civilizations. It helps people to understand why science in China and America differs and why science is not always transferable from one country to another," Clark said.

Cadets are given a list of projects from which they can choose a subject to recreate. The list covers a wide variety of subjects from measuring the circumference of the earth to building a working model of a Gatling gun.

PASSE IN HISTORY CLASS

Take for example the undertaking of Cadet First Class Rick Douglas of the 34th Squadron. Douglas, from Salt Lake City, Utah, selected as his project, the history of photography and elected to build two cameras based on the principle of the pin hole shoe box camera. Douglas' project, however, was a little more involved since he not only had to make the camera but produce the pictures as well. Additionally he had to research the art of photography and try to find out where it all began.

Douglas developed two scale models; one he calls the "Hasselbad 170mm" lens camera and the other the "Tycon-F." One of the cameras allowed him to take black and white photos, the other color shots.

He stated the project appeared rather simple until he got into it. A lot of math had to be employed in order to obtain the right focal length of the lens.

The total investment for Douglas, in addition to his time, was about two dollars.

The materials used include four pieces of cardboard cut to the proper focal length, several strips of black electrical tape, a small piece of aluminium foil, a pin and a well know camera film cartridge.

The four pieces of cardboard were assembled to form an oblong box. One open end of the box was covered with the foil and taped into position. Another strip of cardboard, to be used as the shutter, was wider but somewhat shorter than the rectangular box and was placed across the foil.

On the other end of the box, the film cartridge was taped into position. A pin hole was pricked in the foil at the front of the lens and the camera was ready for use.

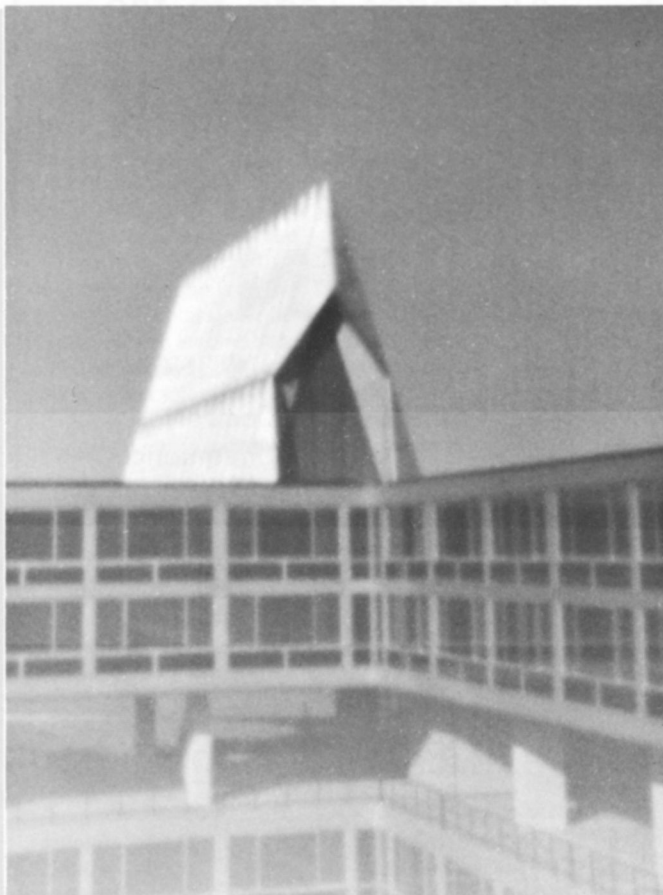
As each picture is exposed the small strip of cardboard on the front of the lens is slid to one side in order to prevent light from entering the lens and striking the film as the next picture frame is moved into position.

As the film is advanced, the cardboard strip shutter is returned to its normal center position and the film is exposed for the necessary amount of time.

Rick figures he will get the best pictures if he uses a tripod to stabilize his cameras.

The cadet also pointed out that the project did not end with the building of the cameras. He had to provide information on his research and make a presentation of some vital facts to his classmates.

Rick Douglas is a history major. He carries about 22 semester hours at the Academy. He also finds time to serve as chief photographer for cadet publications and

he carries a 3.30 grade point average (4.0 = A) in his senior class.

The cadets do have advantages, naturally, in that they have available to them modern tools to build parts for working models. But some experiments have to be done without benefit of current technology. One cadet who elected to reproduce ancient Egyptian drugs grew mold for the drugs on pieces of bread kept in his dormitory locker. He succeeded in growing the bacteria to make serums.

"Occasionally a cadet will elect to do a term paper," Clark said, "but this class is one of the few opportunities they have to use their hands in learning. It gives them an appreciation of what the ancients went through."

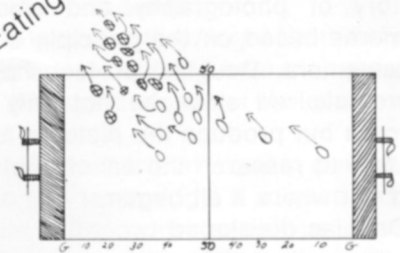
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Today's Game | AIR FORCE VS COLORADO

Air Force and Colorado renew their football rivalry for the 16th time this afternoon and if past games are any indication it should be a high-scoring affair. Not since 1966 have less than 30 points been scored in an Air Force-Colorado game and both teams enter today's contest with good offensive attacks.

The series has been one of the most rugged in the Rocky Mountain area with the Buffaloes holding an 11-4-0 advantage, including four straight victories. The last Air Force victory was 58-35 in Boulder in 1968 but since then Colorado has dominated, including a 38-17 victory at Boulder last season. The last time C.U. played at Falcon Stadium they came away with a 38-7 victory in 1972.

There have been some wild and woolly moments in the series and there shouldn't be any exception to that trend this afternoon.

When his varsity football playing days are over, Dave Lawson of Shawnee-Mission, Kan., will rank as one of the most versatile players to ever wear the Blue and White of Air Force.

Although the season is only three games old, Lawson has already demonstrated a versatility that will be hard to surpass. On defense, he has already started this season at both middle guard and linebacker, moving into the latter position against Wyoming last Saturday after starting at middle guard all last season.

However, Lawson is an excellent placekicker and does all the kicking off, extra points and field goals. In fact, he could become the Falcons' all-time leading scorer without ever scoring a touchdown. So far, he has a total of 129 points via his foot with a season and a half of football action left. Ernie Jennings holds the school scoring record with 198 points set during the 1968, 1969 and 1970 seasons.

But placekicking isn't the only thing Lawson can do. Last Saturday at Laramie, the 6-1, 219-pounder was pressed into service as a punter when regular punter Tom Lange failed to recover sufficiently from an injury against Oregon. Lawson punted four times for a commendable 42.5-yards per kick average and all of his kicks were 40 yards or longer.

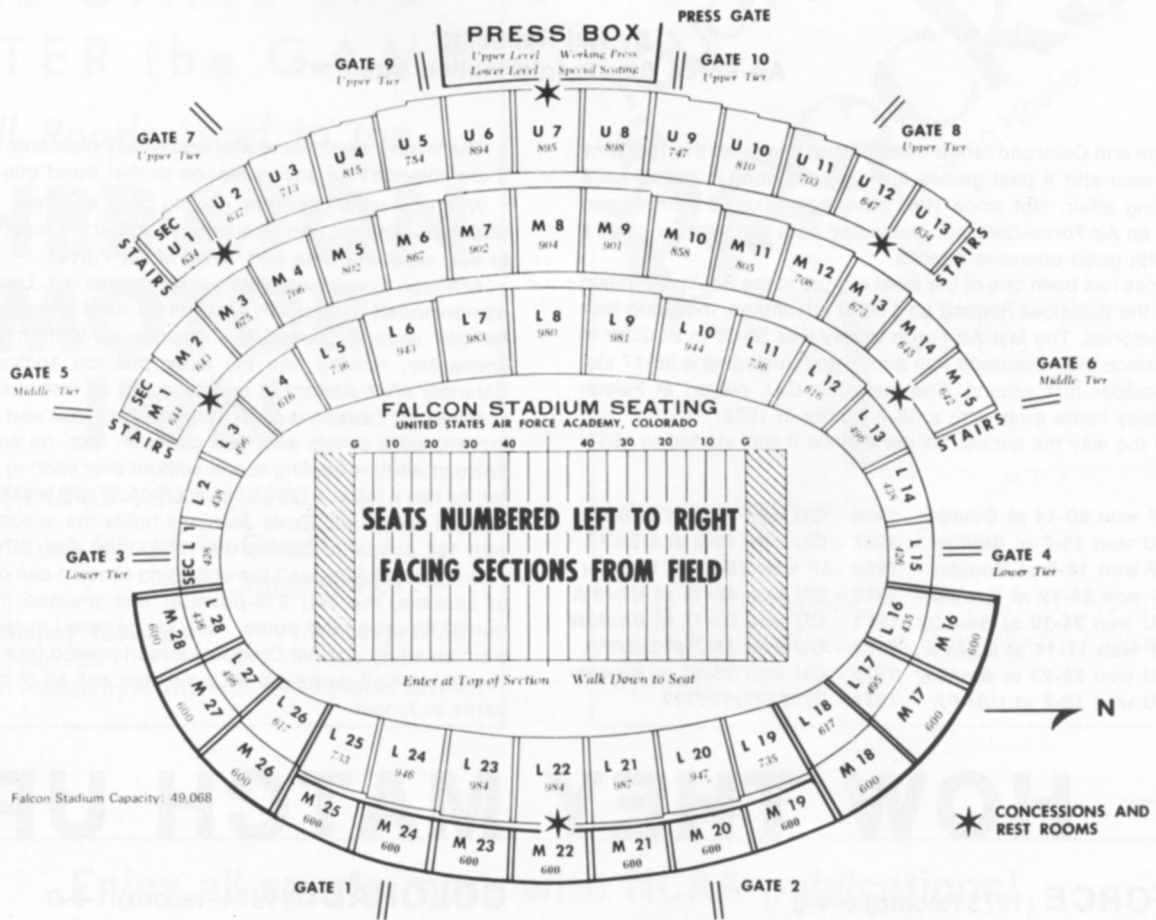

Stadium Information

LOST AND FOUND

If you have lost or found an article before or during a game at Falcon Stadium check with the concession stand nearest your seat. If you find or have lost an article after the game check with the main concession stand under the press box on the west side of the stadium.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report immediately to the head usher in your seating area. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. These rooms are located in the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their seat section, row and seat number with the command post, which is located in the west side of the stadium in the press box. Their office number is 472-4538. A call number will then be used. **No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.**

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. (The stadium is approximately six miles from the South Gate entrance and about four miles from the North Gate entrance to the Academy.) There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, plus a rail siding located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

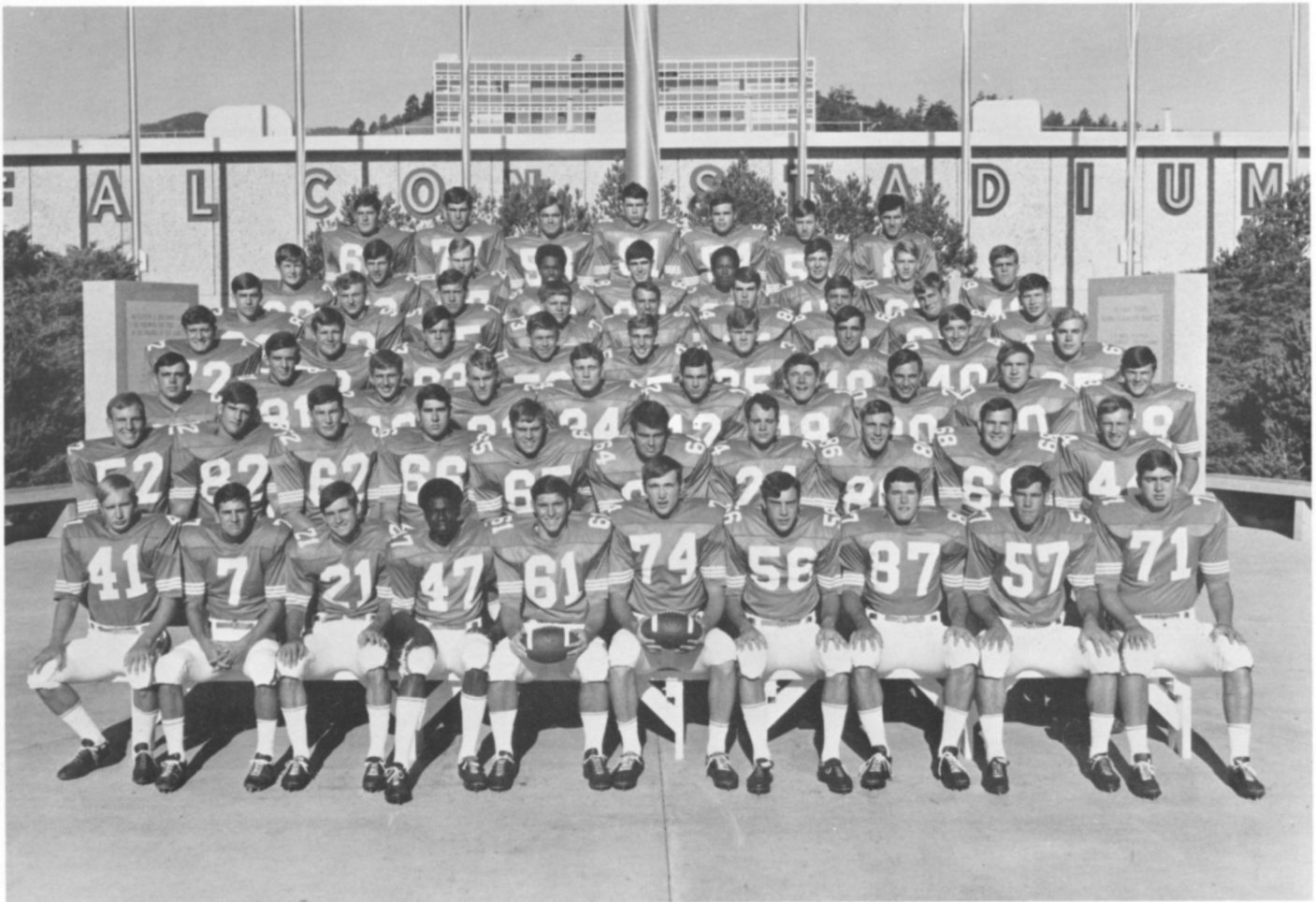

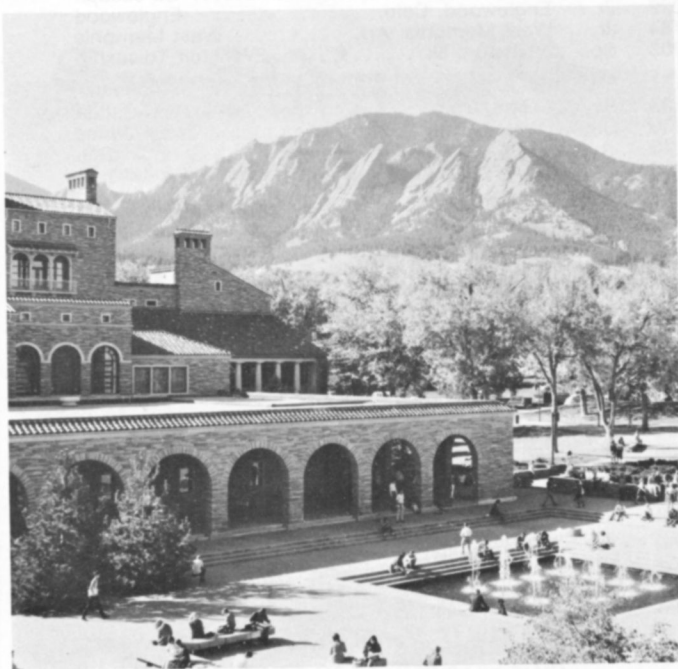
THE UNIVERSITY of COLORADO



MACKY AUDITORIUM

Authorized by an act of the first territorial legislation in 1861 and opened on Sept. 5, 1877, the University of Colorado is located at Boulder, 27 miles northwest of Denver via a four-lane turnpike.

The enrollment on the Boulder campus has grown from an original 44 in 1877 to an expected 20,000 in 1974 with an additional 13,000 students studying at the Medical Center (Denver campus) and at the Denver, Colorado Springs, and Grand Junction centers.



UNIVERSITY MEMORIAL CENTER

Although the main campus in Boulder is located far inland, at the foot of the rugged Rocky Mountains, its students come from all over the world. Every state in the Union is represented in the student body, along with 38 foreign countries and all U.S. possessions.

The campus setting and its beautiful architecture are major attractions, but the main attraction for students is the academic atmosphere. In Boulder, the west blends with the east and the whole world. Like the other big universities in the Rocky Mountain area, the University of Colorado affords a refreshingly, lively academic approach to courses and research.

The University of Colorado is composed of 16 schools and colleges, and a student can major in any one of 120 fields. The schools and colleges are Arts and Sciences, Business, Dentistry, Education, Engineering and Applied Science, Environmental Design, Graduate, Journalism, Law, Nursing, Medicine, Music, Pharmacy, and Public Affairs.

The University is governed by an independent board of six elected Regents, the President, and the Faculty Senate.

In keeping with its cosmopolitan atmosphere and its sense of responsibility to the community, the university provides facilities and sponsorship for a broad range of student activities. In addition, the student governing body, Associated Students of the University of Colorado, is extremely active and influential. The students also publish their own yearbook and daily newspapers.

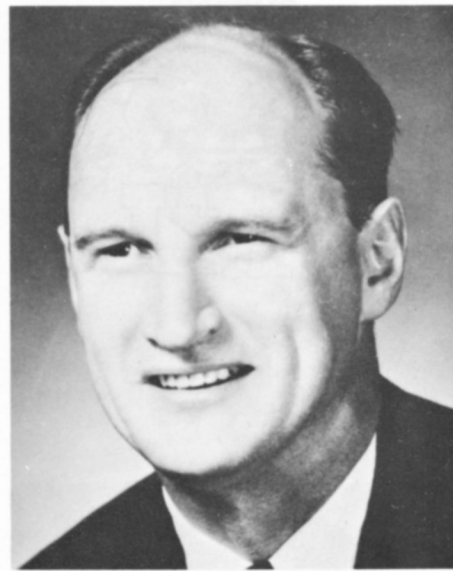

1974 Offensive Captain**

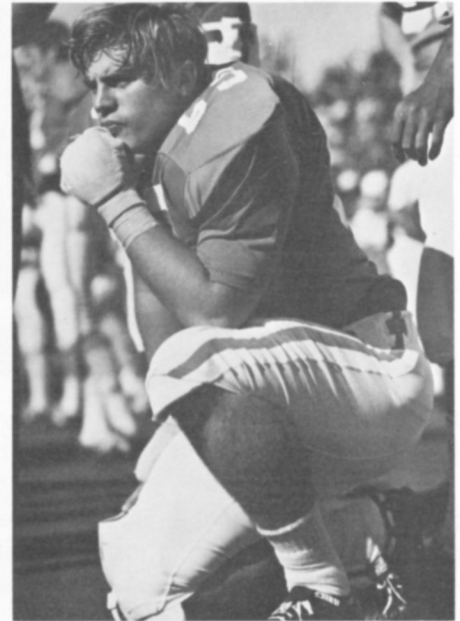

JOHN COVINGTON, 6-6, 221-pound junior from Fullerton, Calif. One of the tallest Falcon players, John was a surprise during the 1973 season, taking over a starting tight end post midway through the season and winding up as the third leading pass receiver with 15 catches for 196 yards. He will continue in the role of starting tight end and should be a good target again because of his size and sure hands, John also competed as a shot-putter on the Falcon varsity indoor and outdoor track teams.

Varsity ice hockey players at the Air Force Academy began pre-season practice last week in the Cadet Field House and will be out to improve upon a 12-15 record when the season opens in November.

The improvements should come from a squad which suffered no defensive losses due to graduation, and has returning lettermen. This assistance should greatly enhance the chances of first year coach John Matchefts who served for three seasons as an assistant coach under the retired Vic Heyliger.

The team's strength should depend a great deal on developing scoring help for last year's scoring leader, Chuck Delich, from Eveleth, Minn., who scored 43 goals although only a freshman. Chuck also led the team in total points with 67.

Missing from the offensive attack will be Dave Bunker and Jim Skalko who respectively totaled 18 and 10 goals apiece.

Besides Delich, others returning to the offense include Marlo Mellum, Kevin Pederson, Fred Whittican, John Koelling, Tom Uren and Phil Gronseth. Tops among this crew in scoring was Mellum, a senior from International Falls, Minn., with 15 goals and eight assists for 23 points.

Heading the defensive corps is team captain Gerry Micheletti, a senior from Hibbing, Minn., who has totaled 16 goals and 48 assists in two previous campaigns as a defender.



The Falcons appear set at goal with senior Al Morrison, from White Bear Lake, Minn., and sophomore Dave Spannbauer, from St. Paul, Minn.

Coach Matchefts expects some 13 prospects to tryout this season. Among the most promising prospects are Gary Batinich, from Eveleth, Minn.; Gordon Curphy, a three-year letterman and team captain from Two Harbors, Minn.; Frank Senta, a three-year letterman and team captain from Kennedy High School in Babbitt, Minn.; and Gordon Strong, a letterman and team captain from Haslett, Mich.

A glance at the schedule could give the Falcons some concern. They will face such tough competition as Ohio State, Royal Military of Canada, Augsburg, Gustavus Adolphus, Denver, Colorado College and Bowling Green. New on the Air Force schedule will be a meeting with Alaska.

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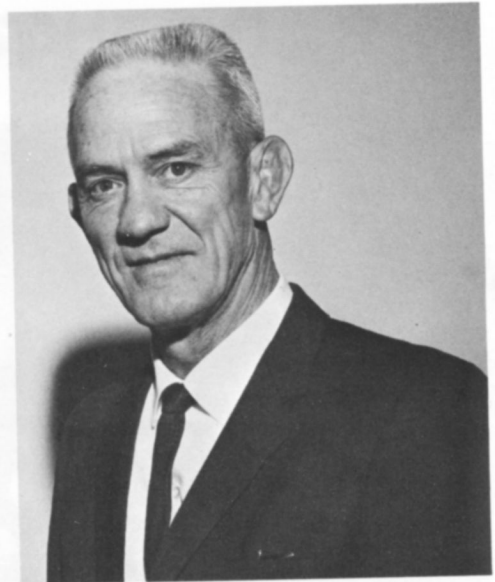


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KARL KITT

Head Wrestling Coach

(Karl Kitt is one of the veteran coaches at the Air Force Academy. He will be entering his 18th season as the Falcons' head wrestling coach and is regarded as one of the top wrestling authorities in the nation. This is the first in a series of articles on Air Force coaches.)

Wrestling is as old as little boys and mud puddles, and maybe older. At least to Karl Kitt's way of thinking the sport of wrestling is probably man's second oldest athletic form.

Kitt, head wrestling coach at the U. S. Air Force Academy, thinks that the first sport was probably running.

"That probably started when somebody got chased by a bear," he begins with a low Oklahoma twang in his voice, "and then when he got tired and turned to face the bear the second sport of wrestling began."

The Oklahoma native became interested in the sport while still in grammar school in Tulsa. He later became an All-America in the 145-pound weight class at Southwestern State College and has coached the Falcon wrestling team for 18 years.

What he doesn't know about the sport can be found in scores of paperback wrestling books crammed into two small file drawers in his office. Some of the books, which date back to 1927, describe the collegiate and international scene of grappling.

Ask him if he thinks the sport of wrestling is popular and he turns to last year's National Collegiate wrestling finals in Ames, Iowa, for conclusive evidence. Almost 42,000 fans watched a total of 498 bouts in six sessions. This type of fan support does not stop at the championship level. In one match last season at the Air Force Academy against Wyoming, an estimated crowd of 1200 saw the Falcon team come from a 21-0 deficit after four weight classes to win 27-21.

His coaching experience also reaches back to 11 former national champions who collectively have won 16 national mat titles and five who have competed in Olympic competition.

Puffing slowly on a small pipe, Kitt recalls his first

venture with the sport in the eighth grade when he stepped on the scales, found he weighed 89 pounds, and along with another classmate, began competing and coaching in a nine-team Tulsa city league.

"I won eight matches that season," he remembers, "but lost in the city championships." The following year he improved, going undefeated in regular seasons matches and then capturing the city title in the 90-pound class.

A winner of more than 100 matches since becoming coach at the Air Force Academy in 1958, Kitt said wrestling today has more than 50 different styles, but basically there are only three major types. One is Greco Roman in which the performers use only their upper torso in performing. Free style is second in which the legs can be used only sparingly. Finally the type most colleges use is called Catch as Catch Can in which the whole body of the wrestler can be used to administer a hold as long as it is not declared illegal.

"Oh there is one other popular type," he says with a smile, "and that's pro wrestling which means whoever can act the best comes out on top."

There used to be only eight weight classes in the sport, but now that has been expanded to 10 ranging from 112 pounds to heavyweight. There is approximately eight or 10 pounds difference between each of the weight classes.

"Wrestling has to be one of the most demanding and grueling of sports," he said. "Probably worse than football because in football a lineman puts out for about 12 seconds and then rests for 30 to 40 seconds, but in wrestling a performer is either trying to get away or keep his opponent from getting away for eight minutes."

He added the sport also penalizes a performer for stalling.

"In any other sport," he said, "stalling is considered an intricate part of the strategy, but in wrestling if a performer backs off for a second to think out a strategy, he is first warned and then loses a point or points for repeated offenses."

ACADEMY COACH REVEALS ‘BEAR FACTS’ OF WRESTLING

What is the most important thing to look for in wrestling?

"It's not really the pin as some think, but a combination of three elements," answered Kitt. "First taking the man down, then breaking him down or gaining control and finally the pin which is called by some wrestlers 'Shooting him.' You have to have all the elements though or else the others won't happen."

Perhaps the most misunderstood aspect of the sport is the point system. For example, two points are awarded for gaining control of an opponent. One point is awarded the down man if he is able to escape from the man on top. Two points are also awarded the down man if he can reverse his position and gain control of his opponent. Three points are scored for what is called a predicament. A predicament is when one wrestler has his opponent in such a position, or hold, that a pin is possible, but not quite accomplished.

Kitt said points are also added or subtracted for administering legal and illegal holds, unsportsmanlike conduct and riding time. The last term is the amount of seconds one wrestler stays in control (on top) of his opponent. Also, a performer can pile up a commanding point lead, but this lead can be wasted if he is pinned. In scoring for a match the team receives three points if its wrestler wins a decision on points; and five points if its wrestler records a pin. A pin occurs when an opponent's shoulders are held on the mat for one second.

Kitt, who competed in the 1936 Olympic Trials at the 145 pound class, held one record for a short time.

"That was for the fastest pin ever recorded in Olympic Trial competition," he said. The pin was recorded in 12 seconds when the meet was held at Washington and Lee University in Virginia.

"There were so many bouts that mine against Oklahoma University's Joe Kalpin (a former Big 8 Conference champion) came at three o'clock in the morning," he said. "To wake up I had to go outside and rub myself with the snow."

Coach Kitt recalls that his opponent rushed across the mat at him. "I took him down with a leg trip and pinned him in 12 seconds. The coaches hadn't even gotten back to their benches yet before it was all over."

The Falcon wrestling coach is rich in lore about his sport but he is also known for his other service academy achievements. Before coming to Air Force, he was assigned to the Naval Academy in 1942, serving as assistant wrestling coach and physical education instructor. After the war, in 1946, Kitt returned to the Naval Academy and coached two national championship teams in 1948 and 1952.

He has also served two terms as a member of the U. S. Olympic Wrestling Committee and was instrumental in establishing the All-America awards in wrestling. Other achievements include being installed in the U. S. Savings-Helms Wrestling Hall of Fame and in the Southwestern State College Hall of Fame for his outstanding contributions to the sport of wrestling.

One thing's for sure, he certainly knows more than just the "bear facts" of wrestling.

FALCONAIRES

While visitors stroll around around the many exhibits contained in the Air Force Academy's Arnold Hall, below in the recesses of the building there is another kind of motion.

That motion is the beautiful sounds made by Air Force musicians practicing to present their special kind of music. That style of music is as mixed and varied as the number of musicians at the Academy.

There are four basic groups. Perhaps the most famous being the 18-piece stage band known as the Falconaires. This group, led by pianist Senior Master Sergeant Charles V. Gardner, has appeared on nationwide television and has recorded several long playing records. The most recent being "cut" in Los Angeles. A previous album, recorded in Las Vegas, has an excerpt from conductor-composer Henry Mancini who comments: "The Falconaires are a unique ensemble by any standard. To be contemporary and maintain such high professionalism is rare. I salute you."

This salute also must be extended to the three other units of the Academy band. The big sound of the Academy comes from the Symphonic Band which performs musical programs in the spacious 3,000-seat

Cadet Theatre in Arnold Hall. In charge of the youngest, but still high quality, service band is Lieutenant Colonel Richard E. Thurston. This group will also perform several special programs in Arnold Hall throughout the year.

Probably the most visible of the Academy bands is the 96-piece marching band that performs at Falcon home games. The group, was organized in 1955 at Lowry AFB, Colo., and has performed at Air Force football games throughout the country, several Presidential inaugurations, state fairs and other major civic events. This group also will perform at Expo '74 in Spokane, Washington. Drum major for the group is Senior Master Sergeant William A. Stokes.

Formed only last spring, the newest group at the Academy, is the musical rock-style group called the Firebirds. The seven-piece group performs for cadet social functions, recruiting and public relations events throughout the country.

With this type of musical arrangements, one can readily see Air Force Academy music is much more than the "blues."

Fitness Program Rewards Persistence

If you're one of those athletes who never earned your letter in school, college or club sports (or even if you did), the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports is offering you a second chance to become a "star."

Men and women aged 18 years and up can win the Presidential Sports Award simply by participating regularly in their sports. Upon completion of the award requirements and payment of a \$3 fee, participants will receive an enameled pin, and embroidered emblem and a certificate bearing the Presidential seal.

The object of the program is to get more adults to enjoy regular participation in active sports. The Council believes that the physical and mental benefits resulting from vigorous exercise contribute significantly to personal health, appearance and performance.

"Sticktoitiveness"

You don't have to be good to win a Presidential Sports Award—just persistent. The standards have been set to require approximately 50 hours of participation, spread over at least 50 sessions, within a period of four months. This figures out to roughly three sessions per week. Hopefully, by the time you've earned your award, the sports activity will have become a regular part of your routine and a habit you'll keep.

For example, the standards for jogging require the participant to jog a minimum of 125 miles, with no more than 2½ miles in any one day credited to the total. For the tennis award, the participant is required to play tennis a minimum of 50 hours, with no more than 1½ hours in any one day credited to the total. The total must include at least 25 sets of singles and/or doubles and tie-break rules may apply.

Requirements have been modified in some sports where seasons are short or access to facilities is diffi-

cult (skiing, mountain climbing, etc.).

The program operates on the honor system. Applicants keep their own records and sign their own applications.

Standards for the Presidential Sports Award program were developed by the Council in cooperation with the major sports governing bodies and coaches' associations for each sport. The award presently is offered in these 38 sports: archery, back packing, badminton, basketball, biathlon.

Bicycling, bowling, canoe-kayak, climbing, equestrian, fencing, figure skating, golf, handball, ice skating, jogging, judo, karate, orienteering, pentathlon.

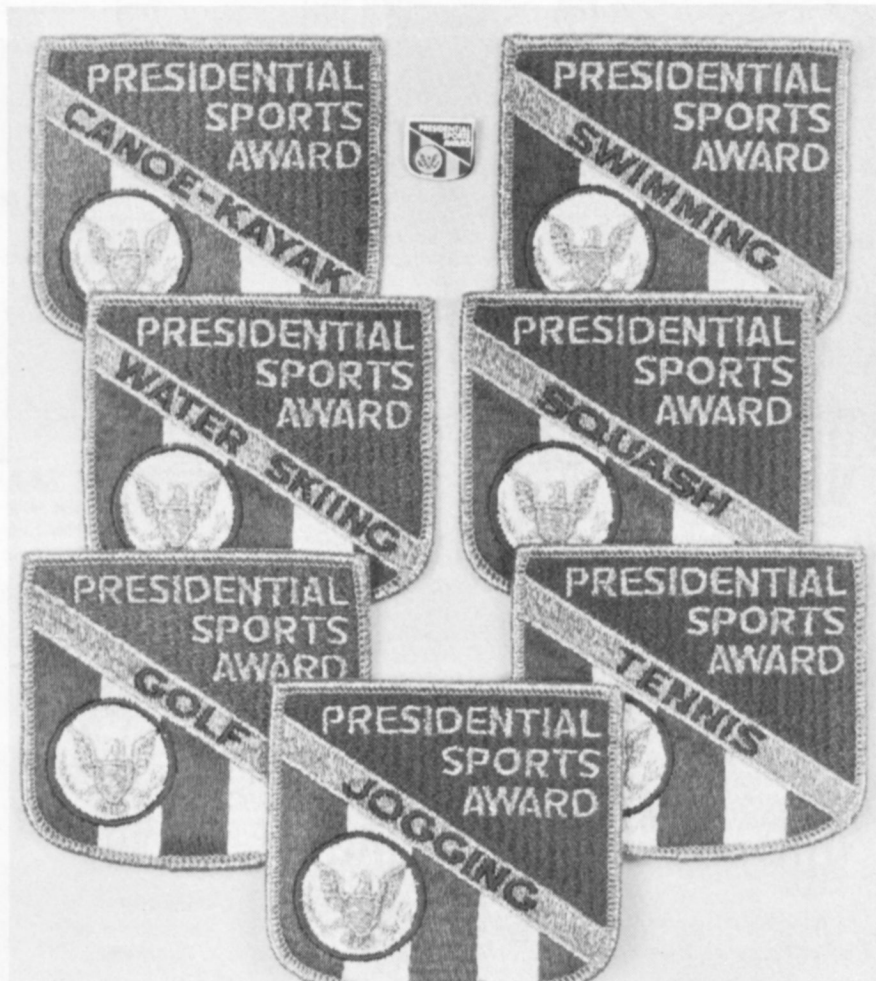
Racquetball, rifle, rowing, rugby, scuba-skin, skeet-trap, skiing (Alpine) skiing (Nordic), soccer, soft-

ball, squash, swimming, table tennis, team handball, tennis, volleyball, water skiing and weight training.

Materials Furnished

Personal logbooks including application forms and qualifying standards are available free upon request from: Presidential Sports Award, P.O. Box 129, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y. 10019. Colleges, athletic clubs, military installations, YMCAs, pro shops, recreation agencies, etc., may obtain the materials, plus large display posters in quantities.

The President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports operates the Presidential Sports Award program on a self-sustaining basis. Fees are used to pay for award materials and to cover other program expenses, including promotion and advertising.

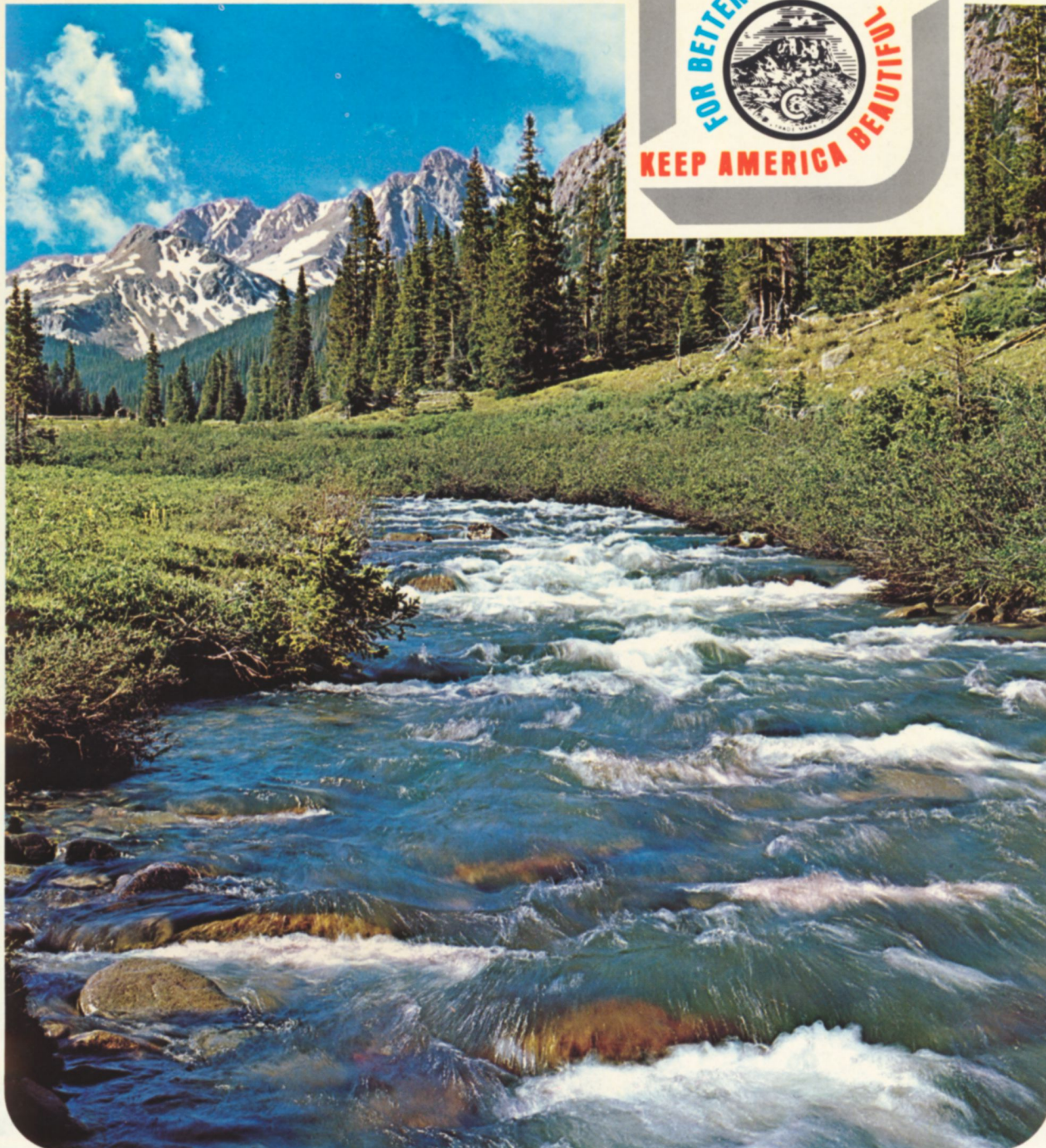

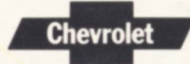
