Today's Game | AIR FORCE vs. OREGON

If the past series record between Air Force and Oregon means anything, there probably will be a lot of points out on the scoreboard this afternoon.

The series between the two intersectional rivals has generally been a high-scoring one, featuring a 35-20 Oregon victory in 1962, a 60-13 Air Force triumph in 1969 and a 46-35 Duck victory last season.

Those games really kept the statisticians busy and both teams have the offenses to come up with a similar type game today.

Oregon has senior tailback Bobby Moore, one of the most versatile college football players in the nation today, and junior quarterback Dan Fouts, who led the Ducks to victory over the Falcons last season, completing 28 of 43 passes for 396 yards and four touchdowns. Moore is a dangerous runner and last Saturday against Washington State gained 161 yards on 36 carries.

Air Force has a few weapons of its own, however. The Falcon offense had its best day of the season in the 44-28 loss to Arizona State last Saturday, rolling up 422 yards, including 242 passing. Sophomore quarterback Rich Haynie completed 13 of 30 passes for 215 yards and two touchdowns while junior quarterback Joel Carlson sparked two touchdown drives.

Today's game marks the final home appearance for 18 Falcon players, one of the finest groups to ever wear the Silver and Blue.

Appearing in their home finals will be such stalwarts as co-captains Brian Bream and John Greenlaw, fullback Kevin Brennan, offensive ends Paul Bassa and Larry Huff, linebacker Darryl Haas, offensive guard Gordon Herrick, defensive tackle John Griffith, middle guard Willie Mayfield and defensive backs Charlie Richardson, Kent Bays, and Tim Simmons.

Bream, hard-running tailback, reached two milestones in Falcon football history, becoming the first Falcon player to ever gain 2,000 yards rushing in a career. Bream's touchdown against Arizona State also made him the second leading scorer in Falcon football history, trailing only All-America Ernie Jennings.

Haas, one of the most versatile Falcons, is well on his way to setting a school record for punting if he maintains his present average of 41.7 yards per kick. He ranks among the nation's best.

Other school record holders this season have been junior cornerback Chip Hough for punt returns and Carlson for his 88-yard run that broke open the Army game.

The Falcons wind up the season on the road, playing at Tulsa next week, then moving on to Boulder for the season finale Nov. 20 against always-tough Colorado.

In a skid, the thing that can kill you is your own instinct.

A little sand spilled on a nice dry highway. A spatter of rain on an oily city street. A patch of glare ice on a bridge.

You can skid on all of them. Even with brand new tires. Even at 12 miles an hour. And, if you skid, you can count on your instinctive reflexes to try and murder you.

Because your instinct wants the skid to stop. So it tries to make you hit your brakes (figuring that brakes can put a stop to anything).

Your instinct figures wrong.

Hitting your brakes keeps your wheels from rolling. So they're forced to keep sliding. And a minor skid can turn into a fatal crash.

When you start to skid, forget your instinct and re-

member these rules:

Keep your foot off the brake.

If your rear wheels are sliding to the right, steer gently to the right until you feel the tires gripping the road again. (Don't make any fast, sharp moves.)

If your rear wheels slide to the left, steer gently to

If you **must** stop, pump your brake pedal with a hard, rapid, on-and-off action to keep your wheels from locking and skidding even worse.

Finally, if you **must** drive on a slippery road and your instinct tells you that a sudden change of speed or direction could make you skid, obey it. (Your instinct isn't **always** wrong.)



PAUL BASSA

6-5, 199-pound senior offensive end from Phoenix, Arizona


Although this year's version of Air Force football may not feature the record-breaking pass performances of Bob Parker and Ernie Jennings, it still features one of the vital cogs in that passing attack — Paul Bassa.

A two-year letterman, Paul logged 245 minutes as a starting tight end last season after lettering as a defensive end in 1969. Despite the presence of Jennings, Paul caught 38 passes last year for 445 yards and was a standout in the Sugar Bowl with 10 catches for 114 yards and a touchdown.


This year he is the leading receiver on the team and had a spectacular game in the near upset of Penn State. The Phoenix native snared eight passes for 113 yards in the game including an incredible touchdown that gave the Falcons the lead, 14-13 in the third quarter.

He is the tallest player on the team at 6-5 and was an all-stater in basketball, baseball and football at Maryvale H.S.

A computer science major, he played on the Falcon junior varsity basketball team as a sophomore.



MEET THE FALCONS



STEVE HANSEN, 6-3, 231-pound sophomore offensive tackle from Chadron, Neb. Starting right tackle in his first year of varsity play. One of the fastest offensive linemen on the team (4.8 speed in the 40), he was an all-conference pick for three years as a prep. Salutatorian of his high school class, Steve is majoring in electrical engineering.

RICH HAYNIE, 6-2, 188-pound sophomore quarterback from Florissant, Mo. Stepped into the starting quarterback spot against Wyoming and engineered the heart-stopping 23-19 win with his second half passing. Rich is also one of the top pitchers on the baseball team, recording a 2.54 earned run average last spring, third best in Falcon history. He majors in aeronautical engineering.



GREG SMITH, 6-2, 176-pound sophomore flanker from Houston, Tex. Has had the difficult task this year of replacing All - America flanker Ernie Jennings in his first varsity year. Led the freshman team in receiving last fall. Greg caught the last-second pass that beat Wyoming this year.




JIM MORRIS, 5-11, 198-pound sophomore linebacker from Duryea, Pa. Starting left linebacker having an outstanding first year. Jim is among the team leaders in tackles, tackles for losses and passes broken up. He also recovered the fumble in the last minutes that stopped a Colorado State drive for an upset win.

STEVE WALLER, 6-3, 228-pound junior offensive tackle from Carbondale, Ill. Starting left tackle for the Falcons who missed the regular season last year due to an ankle injury. An all-conference pic as a prep, he also lettered in basketball, track and wrestling. Carries a B average in a civil engineering major.



UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

The University of Oregon is a young university — not yet 100 years old. However, as of January 1, 1972, Oregon will be celebrating its 100-year centennial.

Organized by an act of the Oregon Legislature in 1872, University of Oregon did not begin operations until 1876. The first campus consisted of one building (Deady Hall) and the student body numbered 177 with a faculty of five.

Today, the University has an enrollment of 15,500 students, including more than 3,000 graduate students. There are more than 1,000 faculty members. In addition, 1,200 students are enrolled in the University's Medical, Dental and Nursing Schools located on the Portland Campus. To accommodate the rapid growth from an enrollment of less than 5,000 a little more than ten years ago, educational programs have been expanded and many new buildings have risen on the 250-acre Eugene campus.

The University of Oregon is one of seven schools in the State System of Higher Education and holds primary responsibility for instruction in liberal arts and numerous

professional schools.

Included in the University are the College of Liberal Arts, the Graduate School and seven professional schools, all on the Eugene campus, and the schools of Medicine and Dentistry in Portland. Professional training is offered in Architecture and Allied Arts, Business Administration, Education, Health and Physical Education, Journalism, Law and Music.

Oldest of the professional schools is the School of Law, which was first established as a night law school in Portland in 1884 and was later moved to the Eugene Campus. Next oldest is the Medical School which was also estab-

lished in Portland in 1884.


While large enough to rank among the leading universities in the West, the University of Oregon is small enough to permit individual attention to students' problems and provide opportunities for campus leadership that are not possible in larger schools. The main campus is located in Eugene at the head of the Willamette Valley, 110 miles south of Portland, and is a community of 80,000 in an urban area of about 175,000. This setting is ideal for the student seeking a non-metropolitan educational atmosphere.

Oregon's Honors College, a full four-year college, is unique in public higher education. Established in 1960, the Honors College offers superior students the advantages of a small, high-quality liberal arts college combined with the

resources of a large university.

The University Library is the largest university library in Oregon and one of the largest in the Pacific Northwest. The total number of volumes is over one million. In addition to books and bound periodicals holdings of photos, pictures, sound recordings, and other materials number more than one million items.

The University's Museum of Art is the largest art mu-




seum of any state university campus in the United States. The museum, housing the Murray Warner Collection of Oriental Art and other University art collections, was built in 1930.

The real measure of the University is to be found in its grauduates, who in every walk of life bear witness to the fact that this is an outstanding educational institution.

Result? General A. P. Clark gave his enthusiastic endorsement. A Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps was authorized on a one year trial basis. Three top-rated non-commissioned officers from the Academy Band were designated to work with the cadets. MSgt. G. P. Lykens, with ten years of drum and bugle corps experience at Lackland AFB, where his unit performed at the Hemisfair in San Antonio, is the musical director. TSgt. Robert T. Houlter has the drum section, and TSgt. Robert T. Long is the drill master.

The call went out for volunteer musicians with experience in brass and percussion instruments. Out of the new fourth class, 110 cadets stepped forward — plus 160 more from the

upper classes! Auditions were held, and the non-coms selected those best qualified to fill up the 80-man unit.

The Cadet-in-Charge of the Drum and Bugle Corps is John E. Allison, a talented musician, who is also editor of the Academy yearbook POLARIS.

Cadet William W. Naumann of Baltimore, with an excellent administrative and choir background, was assigned as Executive Officer. A former president of the Finney high school band (Detroit, Mich.) and winner of the John Philip Sousa Award, Cadet Allan W. Howey was designated as the Corps operations officer.

In the front position as Drum Major, C3C Wes Hester proudly leads the Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps.

No special uniform is contemplated for the Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps. Their final public performance of the current football season will be at half-time at the Falcon-Colorado University game in Boulder on November 20.

Meanwhile, the new musical organization will continue to perfect its drill, unison and magnificent sounds. They will provide martial music at Cadet Wing noon meal formations as schedules permit. In the future, it is possible they will participate in local community parades and civic functions upon request. At the Academy itself, of course, they will play on special occasions for the Association of Graduates and at special functions of the Cadet Wing.

Next fall, if the Cadet Drum and Bugle Corps receives approval to continue—there is no doubt of this in the minds of the musicians themselves—the Corps will be back. With new marches, dazzling formations and magnificent big band sound!



LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 45,028 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.


Although not lettering, several other players got valuable experience last season including junior center Ned Kintzing and senior center Truman Hall.




