CSU vs. AIR FORCE

0ct. 7 1972

Anybody got a slingshot? And maybe a rock as well.

The Rams will have quite a battle on their hands today as they square off against intrastate rival Air Force. Any similarity to today's battle and one a couple of guys named David and Goliath staged a few years back is more than coincidental.

Air Force comes into this afternoon's encounter with a perfect 3-0 slate and has one of the best offenses in the country. The Falcons of coach Ben Martin are averaging an amazing 51.3 points a game. The men from Colorado Springs opened with a 45-14 trouncing of Wyoming, "slipped" to only a 41-13 edge over Pittsburgh and last week completely destroyed Davidson 68-6.

This, alone spells woes for the Rams as their defense has been giving up an average of 30 points a game compared to a meager offensive output of just 3.5 points per outing.

The Falcons are about as even a squad as you can find anywhere in the country in regards to their personnel. Eighteen seniors and a like number of juniors are on the roster along with 24 sophomores, giving the Air Force a good, even balance.

The fierce backfield is led by senior quarterback Rich Haynie who has been completing better than 50 percent of his passes. Two-time letter winner Joel Carlson heads up the running attack. He's picked up more than 300 yards on the ground and can be counted on for about a 100 yards every time he gets into a game.

Junior fullback Bill Berry lends good support as does sophomore tailback Mike Mark.

Nov. 11 Notre Dame Nov. 18 Colorado In the receiving department, the Falcons have some dangerous men in split end Greg Smith, flanker Frank Murphy and tight end Bill Murray. The pass catching isn't restricted to these three, though, as running backs Carlson and Berry are also adequate in this category so the Rams cannot afford to let either of them slip out of the backfield unnoticed.

One real strongpoint for the Falcons is that they have four of their five interior offensive line starters



back from last season. Top man up front offensively is All-America candidate Orderia Mitchell who operates as the Falcons center.

On the defensive line things look pretty good, too, for Air Force with top ends Gene Ogilvie (another All-America hopeful) and Bob Homburg returning. The pair combined to sack opposing quarterbacks 34 times a year ago.

As if these two aren't hard enough on opponents, the Falcons can also point to junior rover Steve Heil who set a school record in the Pittsburgh game by recovering three Panther fumbles and running back an interception 15 yards.

In all, the Falcons feature 10 returning starters from last season and have the experience necessary to carry them through the season without too many worries.

There's no place like home, just ask the travelweary Rams. Three of the first four games of the season for Colorado State have been road appearances, but now they are home, for a while at least.

The Rams will leave Fort Collins only once during the month of October as, apart from the Air Force here today, they will be meeting Wyoming on October 14 and BYU on October 28. Only an October 21 date with Florida State in Tallahassee takes CSU out of Hughes Stadium this month.

The Falcons lead in the 13-game series with the Rams 10-2-1. Air Force has taken the last four in a row and tied a fifth contest before starting the all-winning streak.

The last time CSU won was in 1966 (when the Rams had their last winning season) as it raced to a 41-21 triumph.

Normally, teams play home-and-home series with each other, alternating the site of the contest. However, today's game marks the second straight appearance of Air Force in Hughes Stadium.

The Falcons came to Fort Collins last year and narrowly escaped with a 17-12 triumph in what would have been one of the upsets of the year if the Rams had pulled it off.

The Rams have not been known to play tie ball games and the series with the Academy really points this up.

In the last 154 games Colorado State has played only one draw game. As you may have guessed, that one game was with the Air Force. The two teams slugged it out to a 17-17 tie in 1967.

Quarterback Mark Driscoll has really been hot passing of late. He has clicked on 24 of 52 passes for 373 yards and one touchdown in the last seven periods of play.

He came in and played the final three quarters of the Sept. 23 West Texas State game and then started and played most of the afternoon against Utah State last week.

He put his name into prominence last week as his 32 pass attempts were the fifth most in Ram history in a game and his 15 completions were the sixth best in history.

Today's game has been designated as Legislative Appreciation Day and members of the State General Assembly are here today as special guests of Colorado State University.

Oddly enough, last year's game with Air Force was also the game at which the state legislators were honored.

Hughes Stadium celebrates

its fifth season

To many Colorado State football fans it may not seem like it, but this season is the fifth anniversary of the Rams modern Hughes Stadium.

First opened for the 1968 campaign, the stadium, in its own way, marks the beginning of so-called "bigtime" football at CSU. Not that the Rams had been playing patsies before that time, but with the building of the new stadium, the football program at CSU took a definite upswing.

In 1968, the Rams became a member of the Western Athletic Conference and it was the promise of a new facility, among other things, which prompted the WAC to add CSU. Prior to the Rams joining the conference it had been a six-team league with Arizona, Arizona State and New Mexico in the south and Brigham Young, Utah and Wyoming in the north. Expansion plans meant the addition of CSU and Texas-El Paso to move the league to eight teams, evenly divided with four schools in the north and four in the south.

The stadium was a long time in becoming a reality as the first seeds of

thought were planted way back in 1947 when Bob Davis took over as head football coach and the Rams fortunes on the gridiron began to soar.

Early in 1960, the first site was selected but was soon rejected. The early plan was to construct the facility just southeast of the present Auditorium-Gymnasium in the heart of the main university campus. Parking proved

the main campus.

In 1963, H. D. McGraw, the university's planning director, projected the future of the stadium in a master plan for the growth of Colorado State University and located the stadium in its present position. This was the first time the stadium appeared as an actual future project of the university.

The ball really began rolling in 1966 when it was finally decided that old Colorado Field was completely inadequate for the needs of the growing football program. The students then held a special election and voted four to one in favor of building the new stadium.

In August of that same year the State Board of Agriculture, CSU's governing body, approved the project and plans were made to begin the project.

Eight months later in April of 1967 the bid to build the stadium was

to be a real problem and the planners switched their attention to the foothills area just a couple of miles from awarded to the F. R. Orr Construction Company of Denver with the total cost of stadium placed at \$2.96 million. The

total cost of the project was furnished by student fees, donations from alumni, friends of the university, athletic gate receipts and preferred seating options. It is important to note that no tax monies whatsoever were involved.

One month later on May 8, groundbreaking ceremonies were held at the site of the new stadium with former CSU President Dr. W. E. Morgan, former Athletic Director Jim Williams and ex-Fort Collins Mayor Dr. Tom Bennett on hand.

Almost a year and a half later in early September, 1968, the stadium was finished and finally became a reality. The completion was none too soon, either, as the Rams moved right in and September 28 they hosted North Texas State in the first-ever game in Hughes Stadium. Some 22,000 fans were on hand to take in the game and, as luck would have it, CSU dropped a narrow 17-12 decision to the visiting Texans.


The rest is history. Since that first game in 1968, 19 games have been played in the 30,000-seat facility including this year's home opener against lowa State from the Big 8 Conference.

Fan support has been great, too. Going into today's game 335,225 people have passed through the turnstiles to take in Colorado State University football games. Broken down, that's an average of 17,643 and there are plenty of schools that would love to have such support from their fans.

Stadium attendance hit an alltime high in 1971 when 25,101 turned out for an important Western Athletic Conference encounter with defending champion Arizona State. That figure just nipped the previous high of 24,480 which came for the 1970 Wyoming game.

On a season basis, 1970 was the high water mark for CSU as five home games drew a combined attendance of 104,862, an all-time record for CSU football. The smallest crowd that season was 19,758 for the University of the Pacific game in mid-November.


The future is a bright one, too, for the facility as it is designed for additional seating at minimal expense and effort on the part of builders. The stadium can easily be completely enclosed which would shoot the seating capacity up around 60,000.




Locker rooms beneath the stadium are spacious and more than handle the needs of any team.

The Harry H. Hughes Memorial Room where many pre- and post-game functions are held.





The heart of Colorado State University is its 500-acre main campus in Fort Collins. With some 16,800 students and more than 1,000 faculty and professional staff, the campus is almost a city within itself. It has more than 100 buildings, including classrooms, laboratories, library, residence halls, sports facilities, cafeterias, theaters and assembly halls, a student center with bowling alleys, lounges, meeting rooms, ballrooms, and a bookstore, and the offices of the faculty and University administration. It also has its own security force and its own infirmary. It is a year-round campus, too, with a comprehensive program in the summer session offering a regular quarter of academic work.

Some of CSU's students also become familiar with its other two campuses. One is the Foothills Research Campus, a 1600-acre west of the main campus at the edge of the foothills to the Rockies. Many of the research facilities in agriculture, engineering, forestry, and veterinary medicine are on this Foothills Campus, and some undergraduates and many graduate students become involved in research projects in these areas. Forty-five miles west of the main campus, well into the Front Range of the Rocky Mountains, is the Pingree Park campus. This is primarily a summer campus for field instruction in forestry and natural resources, biological science, and civil engineering. These three campuses are supplemented by eleven research stations in all parts of the state.

All three campuses contribute to a varied and vital educational program at Colorado State University.

CSU also operates programs in several foreign countries adding to the experience of the faculty who teach on the main campus. Thus CSU is not only a Colorado land-grant university but also an international university.







Jerry Wampfler Head Coach


One look at Jerry Wampfler and you know he's a veteran of the coaching wars. Heavy set, muscular and eyes of steel tell you right away that he knows what the game is about.

He arrived on the CSU campus in January of 1970 and the renewed interest in CSU football became apparent from that moment on.

Involved in only one losing season in 24 years of playing and coaching prior to coming to CSU, Wampfler made his first real mark as the offensive line coach at Notre Dame from 1966-69. During his stay on the Golden Dome campus, he coached seven All-Americas and, of course, helped to establish an offensive attack which was second to none in the country.

Like so many coaches these days, Wampfler came out of Miami of Ohio in 1954 and, after earning a master's at Xavier, he became assistant at New Philadelphia High School in Ohio. Jerry also put in time at Presbyterian College and Lancaster (Ohio) High School before landing his first head job at Massillon (Ohio) High School in 1957. In 1962 he returned to Lancaster and led his team to an 8-1-1 mark and was named Central Ohio's Coach of the Year. Then, in 1963, he went back to his alma mater and served as an assistant for three years before joining the Notre Dame staff.

Born in 1932, the 40-year-old Wampfler prepped at New Philadelphia High and won four grid letters before graduating in 1950. His four years at Miami (Ohio) were memorable ones as he played one year under Woody Hayes and then three campaigns under Ara Parseghian, later to become his boss at ND.

Tireless. Experienced. Dedicated. These are just three words one can use to describe Colorado State's energetic Director of Athletics, Perry Moore.


Arriving on the scene in 1968, he immediately set about boosting the sagging image of CSU athletics. To say he's more than accomplished his goal would be an understatement. However, he's also the first one to admit there is still a lot more work to do.

Moore came to CSU from the University of Florida where he had served as assistant to the Director of Athletics Ray Graves since 1964. Prior to his assisting Graves, he had served as an assistant basketball coach and concessions manager for three years.

A 1958 graduate of the University of Maryland, the CSU AD showed his versatility as an athlete for the Terrapins. He played basketball and ran track for three seasons and in 1958 he won the Atlantic Coast Conference Award of Excellency and the Herbert K.

Evans Memorial Award as UM's most outstanding trackman.


Born in 1931, the 40-year old Moore received his high school education at Belpre (Ohio) High School and the Linsley Military Institute in Wheeling, West Virginia. In 1950 he enrolled at Ohio State but left there a year later to



enter the U.S. Naval Academy Preparatory School. He served as a Navy airman until 1954 when he returned to college at Maryland.

A firm believer in helping his fellow universities, Moore was national chairman for the Wichita Fund following the tragic air crash in the Colorado mountains which claimed the lives of 13 members of a Wichita State University traveling party on its way to play Utah State University in 1970.







OTTO WERNER

Colorado State University's band program has long been one of the school's greatest sources of pride and the Ram marching band is certainly no exception to the rule. The Rams marching band is well known to followers of the Colorado State University football team as the CSU musicians perform at every Ram home game.

The band is composed of 150 members who receive one hour of credit for participation. All majors and colleges on the campus are represented in the band and the right to participate is done completely on a voluntary basis.

Heading up the Ram band is director Otto Werner, a veteran band director who has been at Colorado State University since 1961. Before coming to CSU eleven years ago, Werner served in the Colorado and Illinois public school systems. He is a graduate of Western Illinois University and also teaches in the CSU Department of Music.

Werner explains that each home game halftime program is built around one central theme. "We usually attempt to keep current with music that is happening or we try to keep up with current events," Werner said.

Yearly, the band will perform with the CSU "Golden Girl" during the halftime ceremonies.



CSU President - - -A man for all seasons

There are some schools where you have to look pretty hard to see the President at an athletic event. Such is not the case at Colorado State. CSU's President Dr. A. R. Chamberlain is one of the Rams biggest boosters and makes it a point to attend as many home athletic encounters and functions as he can. In fact, it's not uncommon to see him at an away game or two.

Dr. Chamberlain took over the presidency of CSU in 1969 after having worked his way up the administrative ladder on campus.



In 1951 he received his initial degree from Michigan State University in engineering and then obtained his master's a year later at the University of Washington. He came to CSU in 1952 and completed studies for his doctorate in engineering in 1955. Following completion of his advanced degree he spent the remainder of 1955 and most of 1956 at the University

of Grenoble in France on a Fulbright Grant.

Returning to CSU in 1956, he became an associate professor of civil engineering and a research co-ordinator.

He became a full professor and chief of civil engineering research in 1957 and then acting engineering dean in 1959. In 1966 he



became the executive vice president of the University and then in 1969 he was named the vice president for administration. A short time later he stepped up to the office of the Presidency.

A member of numerous fraternal and honorary societies, the 42-year-old Chamberlain was chosen by the Jaycees as one of the Outstanding Young Men in Colorado in 1961.

An All-American . . . On and Off Football Field

by RUBE SAMUELSEN, Mr. Rose Bowl and Past President, Football Writers Association of America

In 1924, Walter Camp named him on his All-America team. In 1943, UCLA, under his coaching, made their first appearance in the Rose Bowl. In 1965, after courageously undergoing extremely delicate brain surgery for Parkinson's Disease, he was named "Patient of the Year." In 1969, he was named to football's Hall of Fame.

Such a man is Babe Horrell.

Sports has produced many notable headliners, yet a select few rate a salute as champion among champions . . . and they stand tall. Horrell belongs.

Moved to Pasadena

Now 70, Horrell was born in Jackson, Mo. When three, his family moved to Pasadena, a city which has figured prominently in his life. He was the youngest of ten children—hence the nickname Babe. Horrell Field, then Pasadena High School's practice area was named after him and his four football-playing brothers Bill, Cam, Steve and John.

As a prep, Horrell was an All Southern California football choice at center besides lettering in basketball, track (shotput, discus, 440 and relay), swimming and tennis, Yes, he also played center in basketball. What else?

At California, Horrell captained the frosh and also the varsity as a senior. Four memorable firsts were involved. The Bears' "Wonder Team," after going undefeated again in Babe's sophomore year, declined a third straight bid to play in Pasadena's famed New Year's Day game. So it was that Horrell did not play in the Rose Bowl. And yet he did. After that historic stadium was built, Babe played in its very first game, when California thumped USC in October of 1922. Along with playing their home schedule in the Rose Bowl that fall, the Trojans, after the Bears bowed out, met Penn State on the following New Year's Day in the inaugural holiday frav.

As a junior in 1923, when the Berkeleyites' new stadium was opened with California beating Stanford, 9-0, Horrell scored eight of the winning points. Six resulted from the stadium's very first touchdown after Babe blocked Ernie Nevers' punt and fell on the ball in the end zone. Tackling Scotchy Campbell behind the goal line for a safety netted the other two points.

Couldn't Be By-Passed

Walter Camp came west to scout personally the brilliant Californian in the Bears-Stanford traditional in 1924. Even though he had decided upon Army's Ed Garbisch as his first team's center, convinced by what he saw, the renowned originator of post season top honor elevens concluded Babe could not be by-passed. Accordingly, he was placed at guard. Shortly after, he was a member of the first Shrine game's West squad.

That was Babe Horrell, football player.

For some years Horrell was a parttime and then full assistant coach under Bill Spaulding at UCLA. When Spaulding retired, Babe became the Bruins' head coach in 1939, acceding to the players' urging and unanimous endorsement. The school's first unbeaten season ensued.

Continuing his collection of firsts, he led UCLA to its initial victory in history over USC in 1942. The New Year's Day intersectional of 1943, against Georgia, followed. The Bulldogs won, 9-0.

That was Babe Horrell, football coach.

Because of widespread business interests, Horrell left coaching in 1944. Then a physical handicap, which was to reshape his entire life, began to make inroads. It was Parkinson's Disease.

Nonetheless, Horrell continued active pursuit of his enterprises. Embraced was major ownership in a 493-acre orange grove, a 150-acre apple orchard, three packing houses which processed 3,000,000 boxes last year, a large produce market and two golf courses, Singing Hills and Alondra Park, all in California.


That is Babe Horrell, business man.

Horrell resides with his delightful wife, Winnie, in a Beverly Hills hill-top home. Their two daughters, Mrs. J. Dudley Rookus and Mrs. Warren D. Cutting and eleven grandchildren live relatively near while their one son, Steve, manages Singing Hills, located near San Diego. This close-knit group is already sharing in Babe's holdings.

That is Babe Horrell, family man.

Being a Parkinsonian, the disease so ravaged Horrell that he 'had to abandon full direction of his business interests in 1958. Such was the tremor in his arms that he couldn't shave, cut his meat or don his clothes in less than an hour.

The only way out was delicate surgery. Even then, the chances of survival were but 50-50. It was performed under local anesthesia. This, through necessity, enabled Babe to voice his reactions when nervousness was at its height.

Delicate Surgery

Above his left eye at the top of his skull a candula was inserted six inches to the pallidus region at the brain's base there to deposit a pure alcohol solution. The less demanding freeze method, now used, was discovered later. Control of his right arm was the objective. The operation took two hours. The following year, Horrell underwent similar surgery from the right side.

Inspiring success ensued. He soon was able to shave, cut his steak and dress in ten minutes. Now, Babe frequently plays three sets of tennis doubles at one outing. He also drives his car 20,000 miles a year. In total respect, Horrell, "For his example of hope and courage to his fellowmen," was named Patient of the Year in 1965 by the United Parkinson Foundation.

That is Edwin Chilion Horrell, the man and the Babe, an All-American both off and on the field.

Air Force

The mission of the United States Air Force Academy is to educate and train career officers for the United States Air Force. The curriculum of instruction is designed specifically for this purpose. The Federal Government pays the expenses of each cadet through four years to obtain a nucleus of Air Force officers who will provide leadership for this branch of the military service.

The Air Force Academy accomplishes this mission through a four year program of academic studies, leadership and military training, physical education and athletics. Completion of the curriculum entitles the cadet to graduate with a Regular Air Force commission and a

Bachelor of Science degree.

Inherent in the mission are the

following broad objectives:

To provide each cadet with the academic knowledge essential to his career as an Air Force officer.

To provide each cadet with a broad military education as a foundation for his progressive development as a professional Air Force officer.

To provide the necessary leadership

training opportunities for the cadet to develop his capabilities and skills as a

To develop in each cadet the ideals of duty, honor, and service to his country.

To develop in each cadet the physical attributes and skills necessary to meet the requirements of cadet and commissioned officer life.

The mission of the Air Force Academy makes the school different from a civilian college or university. Cadets must maintain a regulated daily schedule, conform to strict discipline, live by an honor code, and develop qualities of leadership and dedication to service in the Air Force. Since cadets are preparing for a career of service to their country, the Academy must exercise discipline and control to insure that they evolve into enlightened officers with strong moral character, physical fitness, and leadership ability, and professional skills.

A new cadet is sworn into the Air Force when he first arrives at the Academy. His ability to live under military discipline is tested during the next six weeks when he undergoes a rigorous basic cadet training program. The training is highly demanding mentally and physically. It challenges the young man and measures his endurance through continuous training Upperclass cadets are and pressure. leaders of this summer program under the supervision of Air Force officers known as

Air Officer Commanding.

During the cadet's entire first year he is expected to abide by fourth class rules which restrict his personal activities and confine him to concentrating on the Academy program of instruction. As the cadet progresses into his upperclass years, he is molded into a leader and the rules are gradually relaxed as he assumes leadership roles. However, an upperclass cadet must continue to abide by military rules and to maintain required standards of performance in academic studies as well as leadership and physical training.

The Academy curriculum offers many opportunities and challenges. It provides a general education in the sciences and liberal arts to equip all graduates with a broad background necessary to meet a variety of situations in their Air Force careers. The curriculum offers a wide scope of academic majors, enrichment courses and graduate programs. Cadets study the armed forces of the United States and foreign nations and gain first hand knowledge through field trips and special assignments to military installations. They receive an indoctrination to Air Force flying and may participate in many intramural and intercollegiate sports.


The Academy expects a majority of its graduates who are physically qualified to fly to enter flying training and become Air Force pilots or navigators within a year following graduation. Academy graduates with flying ratings are committed to remain in the Air Force for at least five years after completing flying training. Nonflying graduates are obligated to serve for five years following graduation from the Academy. Most graduates are expected to remain in the Air Force for a career. The curriculum of the Air Force Academy is designed to prepare and motivate cadets for such a career.







"We decided to open up our offense a little and Mark seemed to be the logical choice," remarked Ram head coach Jerry Wampfler. "He's our best passer and we need to get some spark going in the offense. I think he's done a fine job these past two games and I don't think anyone can deny the fact he is a very good throwing quarterback."



DO-IT-YOURSELF STATISTICS

Every football fan knows that the score doesn't always give a good picture of a game. A few statistics, like those that can be kept on this page, can make the picture clearer, show what the individual stars contribute and help to win post-game "debates." Besides, it can be fun to second guess the official scorer whose statistics will appear in tomorrows papers. But before you start, here are some pointers on being a statistician:

- 1. Keep cumulative totals to be informed "up to the minute" and to simplify your figuring to team totals. Example; Jones gains 3,6,9,2 yards and you write 3 9 18 20 on his line.
- 2. Be satisfied if you come within 10-15 yards of the official team totals. Individual judgments as to the line of scrimmage can make quite a difference in the totals.
- 3. Remember that it takes 10 yards to make a first down—that last inch can be as important as a yard and must be scored as one. Wait until the official places the ball and then go by the official down/yard marker on the sidelines.
- 4. Be sure to credit first downs on scoring plays originating from lines of scrimmage beyond the 10-yard line.
- 5. On plays involving penalties measured from the point of the foul, credit the rusher or pass receiver with yardage only to the point of the infraction.
- 6. Charge gains and losses on fumbles to the player who, in your judgment, contributed most to the error.
- 7. Don't score two-point conversion attempts after touch-downs as rushing or passing plays.

Ram Roundballers Ready For Rugged Road

The schedule, in a nutshell, is tough. Fact is, it strongly resembles something put together by a masochist. It's bad enough that the Rams must go through a 14-game Western Athletic Conference schedule, but they've got even tougher opponents lined up for non-league outings.

The top attractions on the non-league schedule are a pair of tournaments, the University of Kentucky Invitational and the Rainbow

Classic in Hawaii.

In the former, the Rams will meet the University of Oregon in the opening round game while host University of Kentucky takes on the University of Nebraska in the nightcap. The winners then collide for the title. All of this happens Dec. 15 and 16 in Lexington, Kentucky.

Things are a little different in the Rainbow Classic as the Rams must meet their host, Hawaii, in the first round over there. The Rainbows are extremely tough to beat at home so CSU will be in for a real struggle. The tourney is an eight-team affair running from Dec. 27 through the 30th in Honolulu. WAC rival Utah is also in the field along with several other powers such as Washington and Louisville.

Pleasingly, though, coach Jim Williams should have the talent on hand to be able to handle

the tough schedule.

Honors candidate Gary Rhoades will be the headliner for CSU in the 1972-73 campaign. Rhoades, 1 6-3 senior guard from Denver, averaged 19.0 points a game last year and was CSU's number two scorer behind the graduated George Price. Rhoades was also the number two rebounder with an average of 9.0 carooms per game hauled in.

The Rams number three scorer is also back, there are nine letter winners from last season listed on the pre-season roster, in senior guard Paul Ball. A 6-0, 170-pounder, Ball dropped in 11.7 points a game (even better in WAC play at 13.1 and contributed 4.7 rebounds.

Three other men of note coming back for another go-round are Mark Nordin, Brent Baum and Rudy Carey. Nordin is a 6-7 junior center from Thornton, III., who scored at a 6.2 clip last season while Baum, also a center, scored an average of 4.8 points a game. Carey operates as a guard and will carry over a 4.0 scoring mark from a year back.

There are no junior college transfers listed on the pre-season roster, but there is one redshirt from last year who is now eligible. The player in question is 5-10, 170-pound guard Mark Williams who transferred to the Rams from the University of Kansas. A dedicated player, Williams is being counted on to make the offense go this year.

A good crop of sophomores will be on hand from last year's 11-7 freshman team. Heading the way is 6-6 forward Tim Hall who led the frosh in scoring with a 14.9 average. He also topped the yearlings in rebounding with a

9.7 average.

Joining him will be 6-8 center Como Pontliana who averaged 13.5 and plucked off an average of 6.6 rebounds per outing. Also figuring in the plans are 6-4 guard John Alaniva (11.2), 6-9 center Doug Cook (10.0) and 6-2 guard Dave Giocomo (8.0).

Hughes Stadium "Showcase of the Rockies"

Colorado State University's Rams play their football in the "Showcase of the Rocky Mountains," beautiful Hughes Stadium. The 30,000 seat structure was completed in the fall of 1968.

Begun early in May, 1967, the \$2,960,000 stadium is being financed by student fees, donations from alumni and other friends of the university and athletic gate receipts. No tax funds are involved.


The structure combines the best features of major college stadiums throughout the country. All seats are slanted toward midfield for the best possible viewing.

The west stands rise 72 rows high from seven to 88 feet above the playing field. There are 46 rows of seats on the east side.

Located under the concourse at the south end of the stadium is the locker area, housing several different types of facilities - dressing and shower quarters for teams and game officials, trainers' taping rooms, photography darkroom and a coach's press conference room.


The stadium is named in honor of the late Harry Walker Hughes, who earned regional and national prominence in service as athletic director and football coach at CSU for more than 40 years. He was head football coach from 1911 through 1941, winning or tying for the conference championship eight years.

He was director of athletics from 1911 until retiring July 1, 1953, only 25 days before his death.
