



"BRING ME MEN"

Bring me men to match my mountains
Bring me men to match my plains
Men with empires in their purpose
And new eras in their brains.



Those few words from the poem "The Coming American" by the late Sam Walter Foss very appropriately describe the cadets who make up the Air Force Academy, youngest of the nation's service academies.

What does it take to produce such men?

For one thing, four very difficult years at the Air Force Academy, years marked by tough requirements in discipline, study and physical endurance. Those who pass the requirements have committed themselves to a life of high moral standards and service to their country. These men eventually will be the backbone of the Air Force and will form the nucleus of career officers dedicated to aerospace purposes.

The Air Force Academy began on a hot day in July, 1955, when the first class of 306 cadets was sworn in at Lowry Air Force Base in Denver. It's been only 17 years since that

day but the Air Force Academy has come a long way since then.

First of all, there is a unique "major for all" program. A cadet receives a general undergraduate education together with an academic major in one of 21 fields. They are available within the fields of science, engineering, social studies and humanities. For the exceptional cadet, there is an in-depth graduate program.

Since its birth in Denver, the Academy has moved to a majestic complex of buildings located on a rolling, 18,000-acre pine-covered site in the foothills of the Rampart Range of the Rocky Mountains north of Colorado Springs. One of the top tourist attractions in the state, the Academy combines natural with architectural beauty. The backdrop of the Rockies blends with the gleaming facades of the academic and residence halls.

Unlike a civilian college or university, life at the Air Force Academy is based on a rigid daily schedule, strict discipline and constant emphasis on what it takes to become a leader. Through this, the cadet learns the fundamental military knowledge and skills required of a junior officer, skills which develop him toward the highest command and staff positions.

New buildings, new subjects, new recreational facilities and new ideas will help keep the Academy vital and in tune with the times. It will help turn out better men for the most complex and challenging jobs in the U.S. Air Force.

MISSION

To provide instruction and experience to each cadet so that he graduates with the knowledge and character essential to leadership and the motivation to become a career officer in the United States Air Force.

AIR FORCE ACADEMY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Guiding the Air Force Academy athletic program is the Air Force Academy Athletic Association.

The Association is an unincorporated, nonprofit organization established as a non-appropriated fund activity of the Department of the Air Force. It is an organization through which the Academy superintendent exercises control over the intercollegiate athletic program.

The Association is governed by an Executive Committee consisting of five members—the faculty representative of intercollegiate athletics, who will act as chairman; the director of athletics, who will serve as president of the Association; a representative of the Dean of Faculty; Vice Commandant of Cadets; and Academy Chief of Staff.

Current members of the Executive committee are: Colonel Philip Erdle, chairman, Colonel Mark Wilt, Colonel Roger Bate, Colonel Frank Merritt and Colonel Hoyt Vandenberg, Jr.

The purpose of the Association is to support the 18-sport intercollegiate program, as well as several others on the junior varsity and freshman levels; maintain athletic facilities; provide supplies and equipment; employ coaching and administrative staff; and support the intramural and physical education programs.



LT. GEN. ALBERT P. CLARK SUPERINTENDENT

Lt. Gen. Albert P. Clark became superintendent of the U.S. Air Force Academy on Aug. 1, 1970, replacing Lt. Gen. Thomas S. Moorman, who retired.

General Clark came to the Academy after serving two years as commander of the Air versity at Maxwell AFB, Ala. Born at Schofield Barracks in Hawaii, General Clark gradul from West Point in 1936 and completed flying training a year later at Randolph Field,

He then served at Selfridge Field, Mich., and in June 1942 went to England as second in command of the 31st Fighter Group, the first American fighter unit in the European Theater of Operations. He was shot down over Abbeville, France, in July 1942, and was a prisoner of war until April 1945.

After World War II, he progressed through key staff assignments with Tactical Air Command, Continental Air Command and Air Defense Command prior to a tour of duty at Headquarters U.S. Air Force.

General Clark commanded the 48th Fighter Bomber Wing in France in 1955-56 and then served as chief of staff of the U.S. Air Force in Europe (USAFE). His next assignment was as chief of the U.S. Military Personnel at Headquarters U.S. Air Force for four years beginning in 1959 and was then assigned to Okinawa as commander of the 313th Air Division.

In August 1965, he was named vice commander of the Tactical Air Command (TAC) and assumed duties as commander of Air University in August 1968.

A command pilot, he is a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College and the National War College.

His military decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, Air Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal and the Purple Heart.

He and his wife, the former Carolyn Wilbourn, are the parents of two daughters, Carolyn and Mary, and a son, Capt. Albert P. Clark, Jr., of the U.S. Air Force.



COL. FRANK MERRITT
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Colonel Frank Merritt, fifth athletic director in Air Force Academy history, is in charge of one of the most extensive athletic and physical education programs in the nation.


A native of New Jersey, Colonel Merritt assumed the athletic director duties in Ju-1967. He has watched the Academy grow steadily and was one of the original staff bers, serving as assistant athletic director from 1955 until 1959.

Col. Merritt is a 1944 graduate of West Point, and as an undergraduate was a starting tackle on the Army football teams of 1942 and 1943, receiving All-America honors both years. Since then, he has posted a distinguished record as a U.S. Air Force officer.

A veteran of 130 tactical air missions during the Korean Conflict, Colonel Merritt compiled an impressive record following his first tour at the Air Force Academy. He was the first airlift commander at Leopoldville, Congo, in support of the United Nations operation and also has served as mission commander for the airlift of U.N. troops into Kindu and Goma and for transporting Ethiopian troops into Katanga. He also was vitally involved in the troop movement during the Berlin Crisis of 1961-62.

After returning to the United States in 1963, he attended the Naval War College in Newport, R.I., and received his master of arts degree in international affairs from George Washington University.

A command pilot, Colonel Merritt's decorations include the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, Air Medal with five oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal with oak leaf cluster and the Air Force Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters.



MAJOR HANK EGAN Head Basketball Coach

Major Hank Egan begins his second year as head varsity coach, after serving as freshman coach for two seasons and chief scout and recruiter during the 1970-71 season. From 1966 to 1968 he was the Academy's junior varsity basketball coach.

Last season, the Falcons posted a 12-13 mark in Egan's varsity coaching debut. He had an 18-6 record as head freshman coach, posting excellent 9-3 marks in both 1969 and 1970.

He is a native of New York City where he earned all-city basketball honors at Brooklyn Prep High School. After his graduation in 1955, he entered Niagara University and was captain of the freshman team as well as being the class president before his appointment to the Naval Academy.

At Navy, Coach Egan earned three varsity letters as a guard and twice played on teams that appeared in national collegiate playoffs.

After graduation in 1960 he chose the Air Force and was stationed at Whiteman AFB, Mo., and Newfoundland before being transferred to Colorado.

He continued to play basketball for several years, including two seasons of service ball and a year with a Topeka, Kan., A.A.U. team. He has also coached on both the military and National A.A.U. levels.

Last June he was the Air Force liaison for the U.S. Olympic Basketball Team Trials held at the Academy.

Coach Egan and his wife, Judy, are the parents of two children, a son, John, 9, and a daughter, Kelly, 6.

THE ASSISTANTS



CAPT. REGGIE MINTON

Captain Reggie Minton begins his second year as assistant varsity coach after two years as assistant freshman coach. A native of Bridgeport, Conn., he graduated from College of Wooster, Ohio, in 1963 where he was a three-year letterman in basketball as a guard and forward. His last two years he was cocaptain of the team and won all-conference honors his senior year. Captain Minton has played on numerous Air Force service teams and made the All-Air Force squad for five straight years starting in 1964. He was also an alternate on the 1964 U.S. Olympic team. As player-coach of the basketball team at South Ruislip Air Station in England, his teams posted a 65-24 record in three seasons, twice winning the United Kingdom title. In 1967 the team finished as Air Force runnerup and Air Force Europe champion in 1969. Last June, he was one of the coaches at the U.S. Olympic Basketball Team Trials.

CAPT. KEN PICHETTE

Captain Pichette begins his second year as assistant coach serving as head freshman coach last season. He was an assistant varsity coach during the 1970-71 season and junior varsity head coach in 1968 and 1969. An outstanding collegiate and service basketball player, he is a 1958 graduate of Georgetown University where he was selected to the All-East team and honorable mention All-America. He has played and coached for many Air Force teams and played on Armed Forces All-Star teams as well as numerous interservice, AAU, Pan American and Olympic trial teams.



COL. ROBERT R. LOCHRY OFFICER REPRESENTATIVE

Colonel Robert R. Lochry permanent professor and head of the department of mathematics, is serving his second year as the officer representative for the Falcon basketball team.

In this capacity, he is the liaison between the basketball team and the academic department and is the administrative head of the squad on all trips away from the Academy.

A graduate of the U.S. Military Academy, Colonel Lochry holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and a Ph.D. from the University of California.

1972-73 PRESEASON OUTLOOK

Youth will once again hold the key to the fortunes of Air Force basketball.

Hank Egan, starting his second season as Falcon head coach, has five returning lettermen and lost only three but all three started on the front line.

Gone are starting forwards Dave Kapaska and Truman Hall and starting center Dan Pflueger. Returning starters include Tom Blase and Mark Englebretson at the guards. In addition, Air Force has returning lettermen Rich Nickelson, Steve Gulasey and Steve Gast.

"We have guards and forwards returning who gained good experience last year," said Egan, whose Falcons were 12-13 in his first season. "We will also get some help at forward and guard from sophomores. The biggest problem will be to fill the middle position. As it looks now, incoming freshmen will supply some needed size."

A size problem is nothing unusual at Air Force. Nickelson is 6-5, Englebretson 6-2 and and Blase 6-1.

Blase, the team captain, led the squad in scoring last year with an 11.6 average, and also paced the team in free throw shooting, assists and minutes played. Nickelson was the second-leading scorer at 10.8 while Englebretson averaged 6-3 and shot a good 47 per cent from the field. Gulasey averaged 5.3 and Gast 2.0.

Top frosh scorer last season was 6-4 forward Jim Eken who averaged 17.5 and was also tops in rebounds with an 11.2 mark.

Three freshmen are considered good bets to stay with the varsity and all three could help the Falcons' height problem. They are 6-7 Jeff Steig, 6-6 Greg Schneider and 6-5 M Sevier.

"The accent is definitely on youth," Egan added. "The key to the season will be how fast the young players develop. The schedule is tougher, particularly early in the season, so we will find out about the young players very quickly."



FALCON CAPTAIN



24 — TOM BLASE, 6-1, 175-pound senior guard, St. Louis, Missouri (Northwest 1969)

Last year's most valuable player, Blase is the Falcons' leader on the court. A consistent player on both offense and defense, he was the leading scorer last year with an II.6 average and the second-leading scorer during the 1970-71 season. The two-year lettermen is also one of the top free throw shooters on the team, hitting for an even 80 per cent as a sophomore and leading the team with a .776 mark last season. Had best games of 17 points against both Regis and Colorado State. Scored in double figures in 18 contests. Earned a baseball letter for three years in high school. President of his high school class two years, was class valedictorian and member of the National Honor Society. His hobbies include golf, skiing and motorcycling. Carries a B average in an engineering management major.






31 — LARRY GARNER, 6-5, 186pound freshman forward, Colorado Springs, Colorado (Palmer 1971)





CADET FIELD HOUSE RATES WITH BEST

One of the most impressive sports buildings in the country is the Air Force Acade, field house, a modern versatile structure with seemingly endless uses.

The \$5.6 million building is five stories high and 396 feet by 426 feet, the size of three football fields laid side by side.

The structure is divided into three areas: basketball arena, ice hockey arena and a massive multipurpose area. The three sections have a combined seating capacity of 11,000.

The building provides space for competition in basketball, indoor track, wrestling, fencing, gymnastics, lacrosse and ice hockey.

Practice facilities are also available for football, basketball, track, soccer, golf, and tennis, as well as for intramural events.

Both Tartan and Astroturf surfaces were utilized in the building. The basketball court and indoor track are covered with Tartan surfaces. The basketball court is not as hard as the conventional wooden courts and provides good traction.

The one-sixth-mile track also is covered with Tartan surface, but a rougher version. It requires less maintenance than the normal track, and provides greater traction to the runners.

Inside the track is a netted area, 119 by 125 feet, which includes a baseball infield and half of a football field.

Spectators for both the hockey and basketball games are seated above the playing surface, with participants on the lower level. The lower level includes dressing rooms, supply areas, medical rooms and laundry.

Also on this level are the offices of the department of athletics.

The hockey arena, where one of the 1969 National Collegiate Championship games was contested, seats 3.400.

One of the innovations is a press box located between the hockey and basketball arenas. It's 80 feet long, and allows reporters to observe both areas from the single vantage point.

THE AIR FORCE ACADEMY ...

- ... is located 10 miles north of Colorado Springs (metropolitan population 270,000) at the base of the Rampart Range of the Rocky Mountains.
- ... has one of the nation's largest college campuses with 18,000 acres. In addition to the main cadet academic area, the Academy has two housing areas with more than 1400 homes for support personnel, a high school, two elementary schools, a shopping center, hospital, the Academy Preparatory School, a vehicle service and supply area, a golf course and a 3500-foot landing strip that serves the light plane, sailplane and parachuting activities of the cadet airmanship program.
- .. was authorized by Congress April 1, 1954, and the first class entered July, 1955, at temporary facilities at Lowry AFB, Denver. The Cadet Wing moved into its permanent facilities near Colorado Springs in August, 1958, and the first class graduated in June, 1959.
- ... draws more than 11/2 million tourists each year, making it one of Colorado's top tourist attractions. The Academy's biggest attraction is its 17-spire, all-faith chapel which is 150-feet high and is divided into sections for Protestant, Catholic, Jewish and other faiths. Graduation week, known as June Week, also is a big attraction.
- ... has more than 100 miles of paved roads. Mule deer, wildcats, coyote, porcupines, weasels, squirrels, jack rabbits and cottontails, bear, raccoon and elk can be found on the Academy site.
- The academic area, which is 7,200 feet above sea level, is remarkably appropriate the location to educate future leaders for space technology and exploration.
- ... has a Cadet Wing of approximately 4,200 and 40 squadrons with an authorized strength of 4,417. The cadets are housed in two dorms, one of which is Vandenberg Hall, the largest building at the Academy.
- ... offers a commission as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force and bachelor of science degree to its graduates. The balanced program of instruction requires a cadet to take 145½ semester hours of academics, 27 semester hours of military training, and 14½ semester hours of physical education. Upon graduation, cadets have a military commitment of five years.
- ... has a teaching faculty that consists mainly of military officers, all volunteers, who have established outstanding records of performance and career dedication. Faculty members are required to earn master's degrees in their fields and many obtain doctorates.
- . . . conducts a pilot orientation and navigation training program.
